From the Assistant Rector

EAR Sisters and Brothers, During our first full day of work in the Dominican Republic, our group of high schoolers officially became 21st Century Episcopal Missionaries. Let me explain:

There we were, sitting in the nave of Santísima Trinidad after a morning of painting and eating some traditional Dominican cuisine. Children began pouring into the church—eventually about fifty of them. At first though, there were a few little pockets of them, sitting with friends, brothers, and sisters. For a few minutes, our high schoolers remained together on one side of the room.

I remember thinking, "C'mon ya'll, go introduce yourselves!" I didn't want to outright tell them to do so. I sat down next to two boys who were in the back of the church.

We started chatting; one of them showed me a game he had on his phone. I speak Spanish, but not as fluently as I once did.


After a few minutes, our high schoolers began, one-by-one leaving the comfort of their group to begin communicating with other children. Keep in mind, our group had a variety of skill levels with Spanish—it was a big deal to try and talk to people who might not understand.

When our wonderful group of high schoolers ventured out into a somewhat vulnerable situation with the goal of learning a culture and language with strangers, they became 21st Century Episcopal Missionaries.

I highlight this seemingly banal example of missionary work because I believe it is a model of the kind of behavior we all are empowered to have when we meet strangers—abroad or at home. If we truly believe that behind all of creation, on this planet and others, is God—a being of order and love—then surely work of God must be being expressed through all people in some way. Whether or not we can totally understand each other is irrelevant.

We don't have to go on trips to exotic locations; we can seek and utilize moments during every day life to allow vulnerability to open them to new relationships. Participants in God's mission look for expressions of the Good News with all people and celebrate with them, all the while struggling for the common causes of justice, peace, and reconciliation. I was thrilled to witness this among our high schoolers as well as among those with whom we visited in the Dominican Republic.

On behalf of our group, I would like to thank each and every one of you for your support—whether you supported us in thought and prayer or with a financial gift. We appreciate your support and look forward to each and every moment in which we can proclaim the Good News together.



Treasurer's Report



St. James's Treasury Report Reported Results Year to Date through May, 2014

<u>Current Position</u>: With summer on our doorstep, the church finds itself in a position similar to what has been reported during the first five months of this year. The church continues to face an overall shortfall (the \$11,835 figure in the box below) and a significant portion of that shortfall is due to income that is lower than expected through the end of the month. On the positive side, we are moving in the right direction as the total shortfall reported in last month's report equaled \$15,370. Income improved during the month as we moved from \$15,800 below plan at the end of April to \$10,749 at the end of May. Most of the improvement comes from pledges that are closer to their budgeted amount. Pledges, however, are still \$7,300 less than expected through this point in the year. Overall, expenses continue to track relatively close to budget. The Walden St. stairway had major work done to it during the month. The funds to cover that expense came from the church's Major Maintenance Fund and did not directly impact the figures reported in the table below.

<u>Income</u>: Year-to-date (YTD) actual income is \$10,749 below budget (or 3.0% worse than budget). This figure is an improvement from last month's income figure that trailed the budgeted figure by \$15,800 (4.9% of budget).

Expense: YTD expenses continue to track relatively close to budget. As of the end of May, expenses were \$1,086 above budget; this difference represents 0.3% of the budgeted amount. Expenses were \$429 (or 0.2%) below budget at the end of April.


St. James's Episcopal Church of West Hartford, Connecticut, is pleased to announce the appointment of Vaughn Mauren as its organist/choirmaster. Currently associate organist at Christ Church Bronxville, he is also Music Director of Young at Arts, the church's outreach performing arts program. There he directs three choirs that both sing in church and also participate in presenting staged theatrical productions. Vaughn has had extensive experience working in and with youth choirs, having begun his choral experience as a treble in the cathedral choir of men and boys in Albany, New York. Since then he has gained experience accompanying choirs and coaching singers, has himself sung with choirs on tour in England and in Argentina, and has held a number of church organist positions.

Vaughn is no stranger to Connecticut. He is a graduate of Trinity College, where he studied organ with John Rose and conducting with Gerald Moshell. and he served as assistant chapel organist from 2004 through his graduation in June of 2007. Following graduation and until 2009 he held the position of organist for the Episcopal Church at Yale, from which he received the Master of Music in Organ Performance in 2009, and was simultaneously music director at the parish of St. Paul and St. James in New Haven; in the summer of 2007, moreover, he was assistant organist at St. Joseph's Cathedral in Hartford.

Not only is Vaughn an experienced church organist and choir director, he has also played recitals in many venues. Among these are the American Cathedral in Paris; the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, St. Thomas Episcopal Church on Fifth Avenue, and St. Mary the Virgin in New York City; and he is scheduled to perform at the National Cathedral in Washington at a date to be determined and at the Organ Historical Society's Berkshire regional convention in 2015.

Significantly for St. James's, Vaughn lists among his special skills "training the young voice, musical pedagogy, and singers' diction."

Vaughn Mauren will begin his duties at St. James's late this summer. The members of the search committee are pleased to present him to the parish. Please accord him an exceedingly warm welcome!




