From the Rector's Study

"Gospel Math"

But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift.... The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ.... But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knitted together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love.

Ephesians 4:7,11-12 &15-16

COUPLE of weeks ago my sermon included the idea that the Bible can be seen as a users manual to a life lived in community and in God's vision, or what Verna Dozier (contemporary theologian and writer) used to call "God's Dream." The fourth chapter of Paul's letter to the Ephesians encapsulates this idea beautifully. This letter is primarily a celebration of the life of the Church as a unique community established by God through the work of Jesus. It teaches us that the Kingdom of God, and by extension, the Church, is greater than the sum of its parts. In other words, we can do far more together in the name of Christ than we could ever do individually. This is what I like to call "Gospel Math." While we learn in school that 1+1=2, and popular culture and politics seem to prefer to use the math of scarcity, "Gospel Math" is about abundance.

The letter to the Ephesians tells us in no uncertain terms that we have been given all that we need to do the work of the faithful, to build up the Church in love and through this each other and the worlds we live in. We are *all* equipped, with different skills and gifts, and joined together by the very reality that we are the beloved children of God, to hear and heed the Gospel call, to share the love of Christ and to live into that love. The Grace of God and the love of Christ are perfect examples of this "Gospel Math." In sharing, in the very act of giving them to others, they grow and multiply in us.


We build up the Church by building up others. To do this, however, we must be spiritually grounded through a life and practice of prayer and study. What are you doing to take care of yourself, of your heart and your soul? What are you teaching your children? How can we, as a community of folks struggling to be faithful, lift you up and journey with you along the way? As the conversation here at St. James's continues about how we are called to go deeper in faith together and as individuals, I hope that you will be a part of this. Share your thoughts, your dreams and your prayers. Be a part of the liturgy, of wonderful formation opportunities for young and old alike and the wider life of the parish this fall and let us, like Paul, celebrate this grace filled and divine gift that we call the Church, the Body of Christ.

Treasurer's Report



St. James's Treasury Report Reported Results Year to Date through August, 2014

<u>Current Position</u>: In the three months since the prior financial report was distributed to the parish, the church's financial position has improved. As seen in the table below, the finances are now \$5,377 better than expected through the end of August. This compares to a \$11,835 shortfall as of the end of May. The primary reason for the improvement is expenses that are more than \$11,500 less than budgeted through this point inn the year. At the end of May, expenses were \$1,000 above budget. While income continues to trail its budgeted figure, the last three months have seen an improvement in this figure as well. At the end of May income was \$10,749 below budget. It is now \$6,160 below budget. Expense monitoring will continue during the final third of the year.

<u>Income</u>: Year-to-date (YTD) actual income is \$6,160 below budget (or 1.2% worse than budget). This figure is an improvement from May's income figure that trailed the budgeted figure by \$10,750 (3.0% of budget).

Expense: YTD expenses experienced a significant improvement during the summer months. As of the end of August, expenses were \$11,537 below budget; this difference represents 2.3% of the budgeted amount. Expenses were \$1,100 (or 0.3%) above budget at the end of May.

From the Assistant Rector

ear Sisters and Brothers,
Rather than risk contracting a virus from the latest issue of People Magazine, from which Jill and Derick of '19 Kids and Counting' stare at me promising to enthrall me with details of their newest child, I am contemplating the idea of a check-up.

Yes, I'm at the doctor's office.

A year ago, I was in this chair, eagerly waiting to utilize my newly established health insurance. I was new to St. James's, and I was new to domestic bliss with now-husband Antonio.

What an adventure this year has been!

But I won't reflect on that now. Instead I want to share with you one of the most precious rituals Antonio and I share with each other. Every Sunday night, as we're getting ready for bed, Antonio and I ask each other four questions; we haven't missed a week in more than two years. Even if we're not particularly happy with one another, we find common ground in that ritual.

Essentially, our relationship gets a check-up every week.

The four questions, since you're curious by now, are:

How did I make you feel loved this week?

What do you have coming up this week?

How can I make you feel loved this week?

How can I pray for you this week?

It's this kind of inventory that helps us to keep to a similar

rhythm.

I find the same model of introspection to be useful in prayer. I don't currently have a spiritual director, but I have before and I will again. One of the things I do in spiritual direction is take stock of where I've been and where God has been in my relationships and activities. I intentionally look for ways in which God dances around in my life, and then I try to prepare myself to be a better dance partner.

I recently had a conversation with someone who steadily contemplates prayer but struggles to find traditional modes of prayer to be useful or relevant. As we talked about life's challenges, bewilderments, and joys, we discovered that our conversation itself had taken the form of a prayer.

Prayer is, of course, more than a spiritual checkup, but a visit to the doctor can be analogous to checking in with a loved one and with God. Some basic questions need to be asked. Sometimes there are things we need to change (our diets, medications, exercise habits, or into a hospital gown, as is currently the case), and sometimes we discover something new about ourselves that helps us along the path to wholeness.

Many of us are already caught up in the business of the program year; it's harder to take stock right now, and that means it's super important. So sit down on one of these cool, crisp mornings and try a little prayer—whatever form it takes.

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From the Organist/Choirmaster


S THE choirs and I have settled into our second week of rehearsals, I've been thinking a lot about the role our institution plays in greater Hartford. What do we offer people and with whom do we share it? It's hard not to reflect on what makes St. James's unique because I've been a part of so many other parishes, beginning with my chorister days at the Cathedral of All Saints in Albany and through many other formative experiences at parishes of all kinds.

St. James's has so much to offer the greater Hartford area. Our Sunday morning services are vibrant and energetic and our weekday programs are strong and active. We also share the resources of our abundant space with the surrounding community. For these reasons, we are truly a community-centered church. People from all walks of life come through our doors each week to be fed in one way or another.

As your music director, my role at St. James's is complex because I am charged with overseeing a music program that adheres to the needs of a diverse people who pass through the red doors on Sunday morning – people who've experienced a wide swath of musical traditions before coming to our parish. My first priority with the choir and my own organ playing will always be to present the Episcopal music tradition at its highest possible level because it is at the heart of who we are. However, I also want to program music outside of the Anglican tradition because as a suburban Connecticut parish in the year 2014, we must provide worship resources that reflect the people of our time and place.

Last year, I had the great fortune of playing a service for which the Rt. Rev. Neil Alexander, Dean of the School of Theology at Sewanee, was the preacher. Neil is both a brilliant preacher and liturgist, and he recently gave a talk to the Diocese of Southwest Florida in which he addressed the difficulty and importance of presenting our traditional way of worship in a rapidly changing society: "Rituals are memory-laden, time-sensitive, a repeatable action that is chosen, not required, but is missed if one fails to do it." He then added that to keep a tradition, it must not be too fixed: "Tradition is always moving, and a viable tradition is actually quite fluid, but you've got to honor the skeleton."

Here at St. James's, Bob, Curtis and I share these ideas about liturgy and music; we believe that traditions are at the heart of who we are as a church but that they must remain moving. Whenever we introduce new music or prayer, we do so to keep our worship both relevant and vibrant. I hope you find the work we put into this will help you experience an even more fulfilling Sunday morning.

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
October and November Outreach ... **Intergenerational Event** "Let's Stuff Stockings!"






