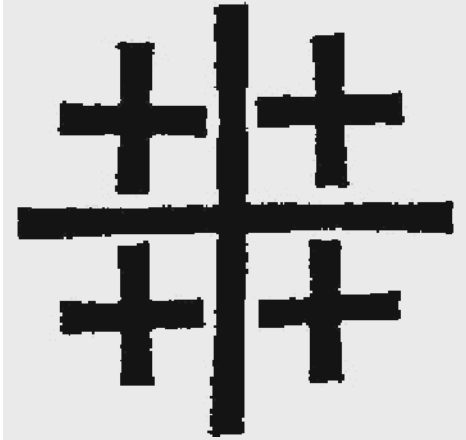

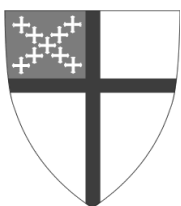

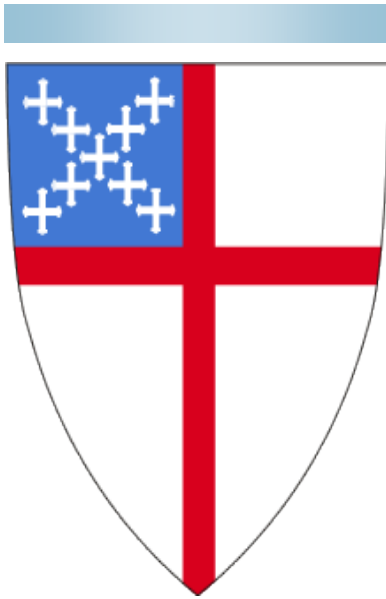

Vestry Corner

Treasurer's Report—October 2014

Current Position: During the month of October, the church saw an improvement in its overall financial position. However, as noted in the box below, the results continue to show an overall negative variance to budget. The \$2,199 negative variance at the end of October was \$6,251 at the end of September. The reasons for the shortfall are consistent with what has been reported in most months this year – pledges that trail expected levels (currently \$11,200 below budget)

balanced by expenses that are less than budget. Total income improved from \$18,600 below budget to \$12,734 below budget during the month. Expenses experienced a slight deterioration during the month but still remain more than \$10,000 less than budget. During the final two months of the year, we hope to see pledge payments increase and fall more in line with budget while we continue to monitor expenses.

Income: Year-to-date (YTD) actual income is \$12,734 below budget (or 2.1% worse than budget). As of the end of September, this figure was \$18,590 less than budget (3.4% of budget).

Expense: YTD expenses remain more than \$10,000 below budget. As of the end of October, expenses were \$10,535 below budget; this difference represents 1.7% of the budgeted amount. Expenses were \$12,338 (or 2.2%) below budget at the end of September.

From the Assistant Rector

HAVE you heard of an “electronic leash?” I’m not talking about those collars that shock dogs when they bark or leave the front lawn; I am talking about the mobile phone, the tablet, the laptop, or whatever. If not used very carefully, these useful tools—modern technological marvels—can become electronic leashes.

In two of my favorite films, *Hook* and *The Devil Wears Prada*, the workaholic main characters, full of stress and anxiety finally say “no” to their electronic leashes and throw their mobile phones out the window, in the snow, or in a fountain; apparently they weren’t aware of the “off” button. Nonetheless, they triumphantly end their workaholicism and cut their electronic leashes, as they find an enlightened way of living in an otherwise chaotic world.

A few years ago, I decided to commit to turning off my phone from sunset on Fridays to sunset on Saturdays. One Saturday night I turned on my phone to 59 unread messages, or, 59 reasons I needed to not check my phone the day before. And several months ago, Antonio and I were so sick and tired of the addictive habit we had developed of waking up to grasp for our iPhones on the nightstands, that we decided to leave all such devices downstairs, plugged into slumbers of their own.

They recharge, and so do we; the beep beep that follows plugging in separates rest and work. much the same way the traditional Sabbath ritual of havdalah marks the separation of rest and work with candles.

There is an extensive history of using candles to signify the separation of rest and work—to make a distinction between peace and chaos. “The sages explain the origins of the havdalah candle with a story: Adam (of the whole Adam and Eve thing) was frightened at the end of the first Sabbath, and God gave him the flickering havdalah candle as a promise that Sabbath would return” (Winter, 112). Adam was then able to live those other six days with hope for the seventh.

I think the 80’s music group “*Loverboy*” called this “working for the weekend.”

In our own tradition we use candles to signify moments of worship, and during Advent we use them to signify the light of Christ coming into our world.

Whoever conjured up the idea of Advent, a season of expectant hope, was either incredibly wise or had an especially sick sense of humor; it seems cruel to give us a season in which we are to expect, wait, hope, and pray in joy, when the world tells us to shop, stress, plan, and buy and get on your phone and check your messages: **YOU’RE GOING TO MISS SOMETHING!!!** Perhaps there is something to this candle lighting tradition that can help us during Advent to prepare for Christmas without being consumed by the chaos it seems to bring along.


Candlelight, in a very practical way, helps us to see; but when our stress and anxiety act as blinders that keep us from noticing the needs of others and ourselves, a ritual of candle lighting can lighten the world around us to help us see where there is need. If something as simple as this electronic leash has the ability to keep us preoccupied in a chaotic inbox, then something as simple as this candle might have the ability to help us recognize where God is bursting into our world.

While our culture makes true Sabbath near impossible, Advent gives us the opportunity to really understand our need for moments of havdalah—moments of separation.

We can turn off our phones for 24 hours every week. We can use candles to make peaceful moments in our homes. If you’re so inspired, make your own Advent wreath, light the first candle on Sunday night, say a prayer, and witness the amazing difference that even the flickering flame of candlelight can make.

If we take advantage of this opportunity of Advent, we may just catch a glimpse of God bursting through the chaos.

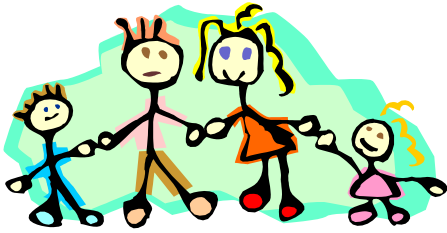

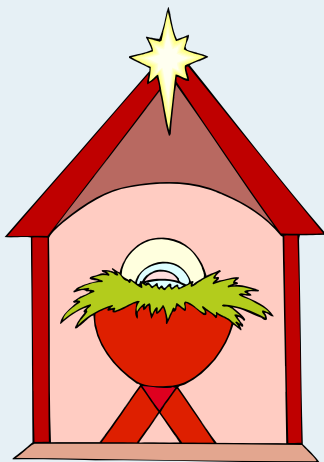

HERE at St. James's, we began a ministry last winter called, Rhythms of Grace—a liturgical offering designed for children with special needs. We have had Rhythms of Grace now several times and I have to say, it has become one of my favorite church events each month.

The Rhythms of Grace liturgical experience presents Bible stories in an interactive way that uses music and movement, story cards, and tactile activities to develop communication skills. Most importantly, it gives families the opportunity to worship without worrying about verbal disruptions or distracting movements or gestures.

In November, we concentrated on All Saints for the Rhythms of Grace service. We had several activities, decorating small wood crosses with beads, drawing self-portraits and playing ring toss, to name a few. We also put little halos over primitive drawings of ourselves to symbolize that we are all saints and members of God's family.

In the Rhythms of Grace curriculum, it said that the ring toss game would help cement the idea of halos, and that we are all saints. I have to say, I was doubtful about that.

Then, it happened. The children started taking the rings for the ring toss and putting them over their heads like halos. I was pleasantly surprised.

It occurred to me, especially this month that Rhythms of Grace as a liturgical experience would be good for all children, not just those with special needs. Having an opportunity to hear Bible stories and explore them through crafts and activities AND having the opportunity to experience communion

on a more intimate level is something that every child should experience—or for that matter every person in the parish.

So, that being said, I am extending an invitation to you all. **On Sunday, December 14 at 4:00** we will have a special Nativity Rhythms of Grace. If you have children, bring them. If you are a child at heart, come. I promise it will not disappoint.

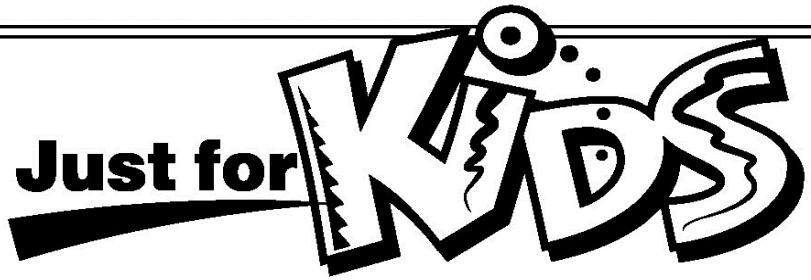
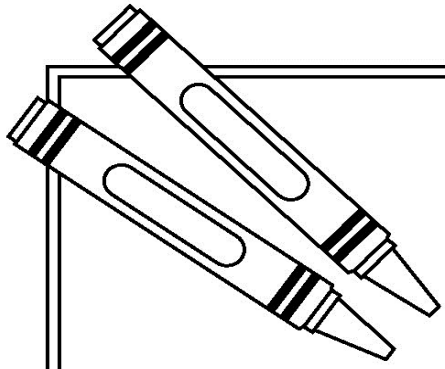

From the Organist & Choirmaster

THE seasons of Advent and Christmas will feature many contemporary choral works, and I would like to take this opportunity to introduce two of them here. The first piece will be heard on Sunday, December 14 during the Offertory. Though this particular service is held on the third Sunday of Advent, it is also the two year anniversary of the tragedy in Newtown, Connecticut. I therefore thought it was fitting to have the choir sing James MacMillan's *A Child's Prayer*, a piece written shortly after the 1996 shooting at Dunblane Primary School, Scotland, where 16 children and one teacher lost their lives. MacMillan is Scotland's leading composer of choral music and here he brilliantly captures the solemnity and sense hope in these words:

Welcome Jesu,
Deep in my soul forever stay,
Joy and love my heart are filling
On this glad Communion day.

On the fourth Sunday of Advent, we'll hear Mark A. Miller's 2012 composition, *God has work for us to do*, with text by Carl Daw. Miller is on the faculties of the Yale Institute of Sacred Music and the Drew Theological Seminary and is highly regarded for composing anthems in a style that is both interesting and relatable to contemporary musical tastes. Many of Miller's pieces deal with issues of social justice, and in the theme of Advent, the text he chose for this piece is a reminder of our mission in the community and world at large:

'Til all the jails are empty and all the bellies filled; till no one hurts or steals or lies, and no more blood is spilled: God has work for us to do, 'til God's will is done and all things are made new, God has work for us to do! 'Til age and race and gender no longer separate; 'til pulpit, press, and politics are free of greed and hate: God has work... In tenement and mansion, in factory, farm and mill, in board room and in billiard hall, in wards where time stands still,.. In classroom, church and office, in shops, or on the street, in every place where people thrive, or starve or hide, or meet. God has work... By sitting at a bedside to hold pale, trembling hands, by speaking for the powerless against unjust demands. By praying through our doing, and singing though we fear, by trusting that the seed we sow will bring God's harvest near: God has work...

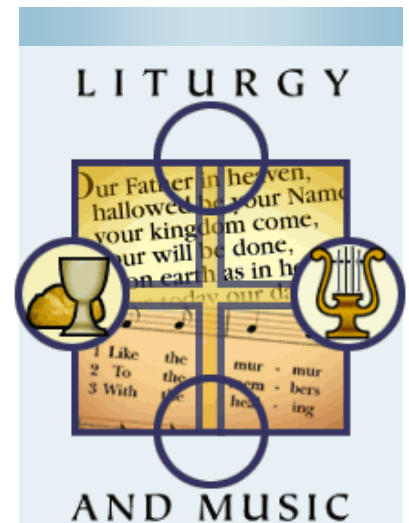

Vestry members must be:

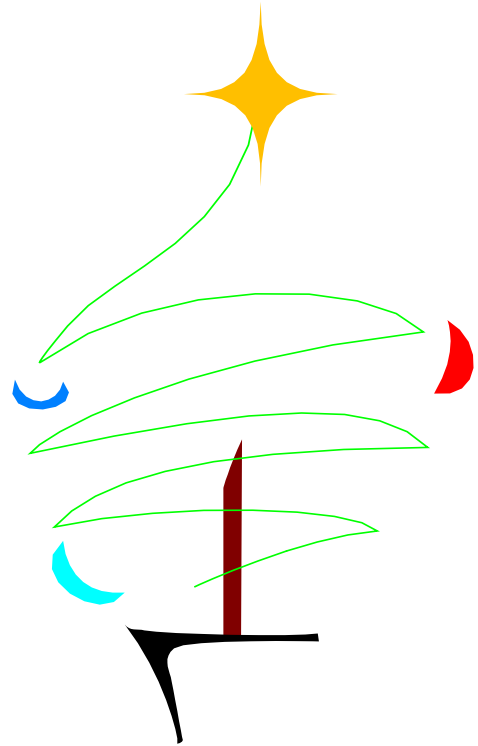
1. committed to Jesus Christ;

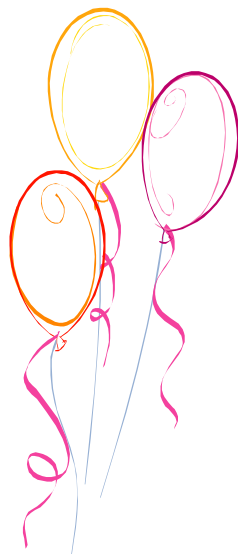

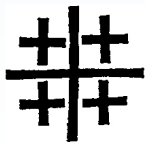
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
