





Treasurer's Report—December 2014

Current Position: The church finished the year with a \$4,551 surplus relative to budget. This figure represents 0.6% of the budget. Income, which had trailed its budgeted figure through most of the year, finished the year \$12,461 below budget. Regular contributions (which include current year pledges and other offerings) and fundraising trailed budget by more than \$10,000 in aggregate. Expenses finished the year more than \$17,000 less than budget, due primarily to lower personnel expenses when the

church was without a full time organist for most of the summer.

The full year Treasurer's report and detailed financial exhibits are contained in the St. James's Annual Report.


Allow us to introduce, the Taste of St. James's Brunch!

From the Organist & Choirmaster


ACH year the season of Lent brings many changes to the liturgical practice within the Episcopal Church. In the choir loft, we take this opportunity to recite the psalms with plainsong. Plainsong is simpler in its musical construction than other forms of psalm singing. Instead of chanting in four-part harmony as we do in Anglican chant, plainchant utilizes just one note at any given time. It is some of the earliest church music, dating back to the first centuries after Christ's death. Its roots go back even further to music from the Synagogue and the Greek modal system. Though the Greeks invented the first system of musical notation, their method was lost somewhere in the first millennium A.D., and music was disseminated vis-à-vis aural practice.. With plainchant a system of musical notation was revived and bears a strong resemblance to the one we use today.

As human beings continued to develop art and music, plainchant underwent a radical change in the 9th century when a second line of music was sung simultaneously with the original. This practice is called "organum" and it is the earliest known or recorded example of harmony. At first, the practice of organum was simple: while one singer would recite the traditional plainchant, another would sing a single low note called a bourdon. In another variation called "parallel organum," the two parts were sung in parallel fifths.


The most creative innovations in organum were made at la Cathédrale Notre-Dame de Paris, where composers Léonin and Pérotin created compositions and pushed the art-form to such an innovative state that harmony in church music would eventually need more than two independent melodic lines. It was in Paris that Léonin and Pérotin sparked the creation of polyphonic music, or music that contains multiple independent lines.

While plainchant has been sung continuously through the centuries, it has enjoyed a revival of interest in the past four decades, as Western culture has grown more interested in "spirituality" as a generic way of feeling outside of ourselves. In the late 1990s and early 2000s, Gregorian chant albums sold at a high rate. People wanted something to make them feel more connected to their cultural roots and world history, and they craved a simpler music that was beautiful and had meaning.

In the season of Lent, where we live more simply, we offer plainchant as a way of getting back to basics. Put simply, plainchant is unadorned by complicated harmony yet it ornaments the incredible psalmody to bring it more meaning and resonance. It is also quite simple in structure, so if the reciting of psalms is something you include in your prayer life, consider creating your own psalm tone – the same sequence of notes to which each verse of the psalm is sung – and you might find that it gives you a more connective experience with the words and our history.

6 Bring a Friend to Church

t's February here at St. James's! It may be cold outside, but here at church things are warming up! Back in December, I looked at our elementary school Sunday school and decided to make some changes. Because parents had expressed an interest in their children learning about baptism and communion, I decided to explore these two areas with our children in the time before Easter. We have begun with a unit on baptism and will explore communion during Lent. I also decided to restructure the classes to make the most of our resources. We are now meeting together, all children in kindergarten through fifth grade, for a large group session, usually at the beginning of our Sunday school time, and then moving into small groups where the children choose from two or three activities in which they would like to participate. So far, this is working well. It leaves the heavy teaching part of the curriculum up to me, and allows parents to just be involved in the activities. We will try this and see if we get the desired results, children with a more meaningful understanding of the sacraments. Fingers crossed that it works!

In middle school our children have been watching the film, *Soul Surfer*. This is a good film that tells the true story of a teenage girl surfer who lost her arm in a shark attack. She was an active member of her church before the accident, and the film explores how her life and faith develop after the accident. This is a great topic for the kids and I am thrilled that Kim Lytle has agreed to lead this unit. Thank you, Kim!

For a special Lenten opportunity, we will have an intergenerational Lenten book study on the first Sunday in Lent, February 22. I have chosen the book, *Glory Be* by Augusta Scattergood. This book takes place in Hanging Moss,

Mississippi, in the summer of 1964. Hanging Moss is in turmoil over the Civil Rights movement and that movement reaches into Gloriana Hemphill's life when the community pool where she has always celebrated her birthday is closed.

I thought this book, which Amazon says has a reading level of 8 and up, would be a great opportunity for us to talk about segregation and inequality as our world still struggles to deal with these issues today. I found this book on the NPR best books for children list; then did a search for it here in the West Hartford Public Library system, only to find that no school library in town had the book, which meant that most likely none of our children had read it. It is a great book and should be an excellent source for some great discussions. Books are available for purchase after church on Sundays. My thought is that this could be an awesome opportunity for families to read a book together, and for our church family to have some great discussions!

So, that is about it! During these cold and snowy months, make sure that you make church and Sunday school a priority for you and your family. You will be glad you did.





Outreach at SJ—Operation Fuel



MAGINE living without heat or electricity yearround because you couldn't afford this basic necessity. For families living close to the margin

of self-sufficiency, a medical bill, a cold spell or other unexpected expense can mean the difference between paying a heating or utility bill and meeting other basic needs such as groceries and rent.

Operation Fuel is a private, nonprofit organization that provides emergency energy assistance to state residents who cannot pay their utility bills and do not qualify for government assistance, or have exhausted their benefits and have nowhere else to turn.

One in five Connecticut households cannot afford energy, but the other four can change that! You can be part of the change; give the gift of heat and light. During the month of February, we will continue to collect funds to help these families in need. 
Women's Evening Group


