

From the Clergy

Deep within the recesses of the St. James's Parish House, the rector, Bob, and his trusty assistant rector, Curtis, contemplate the outward and visible presentation of the St. James's worshipping community.

Bob: I've been thinking that it may be time to augment the look of our publications to more stylistically express the richness and depth of St. James's, while keeping with tradition.

Curtis: Of course.

Bob: Of course, so what if we started with our cross.

Curtis: Are you asking me to design something?

Bob: I'm not so much asking as I am...

Curtis: Gotcha, well tell me about the cross we currently use on bulletins, newsletters, advertisements, et cetera.

Bob: As you know, our current cross was a different form of what is commonly called the Jerusalem Cross. This symbol contains one large, central cross with four small Greek crosses in each quadrant. Although interpretations vary on the meaning of the symbol, the central cross may be said to represent Christ, while the four represent the four evangelists: Mark, Matthew, Luke, and John.

Curtis: I've heard that the four crosses can also represent the wounds of Jesus, one on each arm and leg.

Bob: That's true, there are probably many associations, but ultimately, the Jerusalem Cross iust looks wicked cool.

Curtis: Yes. Yes it does. Didn't the Jerusalem Cross have some unfortunate beginnings?

Bob: Yes, soldiers used it during the crusades, a bloody stain on the history of Christianity, after Godfrey of Bouillon adopted it for his coat of arms.

Curtis: The beef cube guy?

Bob: You're ridiculous, but bouillon *is* French for broth, and Godfrey *was* French, so...yes... the beef cube guy.


Curtis: So the cross originated during a particularly bloody period of Christian history?

Bob: Yes, and for two hundred years it was the symbol for the Kingdom of Jerusalem. It is still used by the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem.

Curtis: And the Franciscan order that serves all of the major Christian sites in the Holy Land uses the cross, as do many churches (Episcopal and otherwise).

Bob: And we use it because a sword through a clamshell, the symbol for St. James, just isn't as marketable or identifiable as a sturdy, symmetrical cross. I'd like to play with the cross, maybe to simulate stained glass and incorporate the shape within a circle...

Curtis: ...which symbolizes the Holy Spirit...



Treasurer's Report—February 2015

Current Position: Although it's difficult to use two months of experience to identify and depend upon trends, the church ended February with more than a \$21,000 surplus relative to budget. Unlike 2014, where income trailed budget through most of the year, income is now more than \$13,000 above budget. This is primarily due to pledge payments that have been made sooner than anticipated in the budget. Expenses also contributed to the surplus position as they are \$7,946 less than

budget. This result is primarily due to some expense entries, such as maintenance and repair items, that can be difficult to determine exactly when they will occur; these entries have started the year on a quiet note. Surprisingly, the snow clearing budget is \$200 below budget! Again, it is too early in the year to hang our hat on trends. In the next couple of months, we should gain a better perspective on any emerging trends.

<u>Income</u>: Year-to-date (YTD) actual income is \$13,218 below budget (or 7.2% better than budget).

Expense: YTD expenses are currently \$7,946, or 6.1%, below budget. Most of the expense categories are slightly under or over budget.

From the Organist & Choirmaster

HORTLY after you read this letter, Easter Sunday will be celebrated and the choir will turn its attention to our annual dinner, Pentecost Sunday, Recognition Sunday, and the many other liturgies that take place before the choir's summer holiday. But we will also turn our attention to long-term plans, such as fundraising for our trip to sing at England's Hereford and Bristol Cathedrals in July of 2016.

If you stopped by the Christmas Tree Sale in December, you may remember that the choristers organized and executed a masterful bake sale, which included various Christmas-themed accourtements such as ornaments and nativity scenes. Combined with a successful Yankee Candle fundraiser, our England fund got off to a great start.

While we will include many more one-time and short-term fundraising events into our financial plan, we have an extraordinary opportunity right now to raise money for the choir simply by going about our daily lives.


How, you ask? If you buy a dozen eggs (free-range or enslaved), 5% of that purchase price will go directly into our England fund. If you buy more than that, such as \$500 worth of groceries, \$25 will go directly into our England fund. The only catch is that you buy those items at Stop & Shop.



If a significant amount of that money were spent at Stop & Shop, we could greatly reduce the cost of the trip for our young choristers and their parents, and ensure that no one is kept from going.

LLELUIA, Christ has risen! The Lord has risen indeed, Alleluia! This acclamation from the Easter service is so full of joy. As we enjoy the season of Easter, how do we, as Christians, go forth into the world rejoicing in the power of the spirit? A few years ago, as part of my Lenten discipline, I read each day from a Lenten devotional. In this series of devotionals, quotes from literature were used as a jumping off point for prayer. One such was from High Tide in Tucson by Barbara Kingsolver.

"A great many people will live out their days without ever seeing such sights, or if they do, never gasping. My parents taught me this – to gasp, and feel lucky. They gave me the gift of making mountains out of nature's exquisite molehills."

Wow, what a gift that is, "to make mountains out of nature's exquisite molehills." When I first read this paragraph, I was touched by how sad it is to be the person in the first sentence, "to live out [your] days and never gasp." I know many of these people. People who are so overwhelmed with their own fears and insecurities that they miss the joy and beauty in their lives. That being said, how do we make sure that we still gasp and feel blessed? How do we as parents, not miss the joy of raising children when it is so easy to be overwhelmed by fear and doubt? I believe that it helps to live in community and share your lives with others. How do we help our children to see joy and beauty in the world around them? I am no expert but maybe, one way is by making sure that you don't miss out on it yourself.

Last year, we started offering a program that definitely makes mountains out of nature's exquisite molehills. I started offering Rhythms of Grace, a worship and faith experience for children and families with special needs. This is a great

worship and fellowship opportunity for all families, not just those with special needs. Last month, we only had one amazing family that attended the service, but it still managed to leave me gasping. When the small group of us gathered for communion in the chapel sitting on the floor, with pre-consecrated bread and grape juice, the holiness of the occasion was so palpable I could taste it. I was gasping at the joy that God has bestowed on all of us in these precious children and afterwards praying about how we could get more families to experience this truly sacred liturgical experience.

I will admit than when I was a young mom, I spent far too much time worrying about stuff that really didn't matter. What a waste of time. I should have been gasping.

So my Easter prayer for all of you is that you continue to, "make mountain's out of nature's exquisite molehills" that you cherish and gasp at the beauty that surrounds us all. Look out the window at the trees in bloom. Search for the first crocus of the spring. Come to Rhythms of Grace! Hold your child's hand. Worship together. Enjoy the beautiful music that makes this place so special. Gasp. Go forth into the world rejoicing in the power of the spirit! We are truly blessed.

Outreach at SI—Walk Against Hunger

T. JAMES'S is sponsoring a team in The Walk Against Hunger, which will take place on

2015 with registration at **12:30pm** at Hartbeat Park, 140 Garden Street in Hartford. The walk begins promptly at 2pm. Barbara Schiller is the contact person for St. James's. This is the 32nd Annual Walk Against Hunger, which is sponsored by Foodshare. By participating in the walk, St. James's can benefit both Foodshare and Loaves and Fishes. Over 128,000 people, including 50,000 children, are in need of emergency food assistance in greater Hartford each year.

For every \$30 Foodshare receives, it can distribute enough food for one person for a month. This year, Foodshare will distribute enough food for 12 million meals to local programs that serve hungry people in Hartford and Tolland counties. This year's goal is to raise \$650,000.

Operation Fuel Update

HIS year's outreach campaign for Operation Fuel was a success! During the months of January and February we collected a total of \$490. These monies are used by Operation Fuel to help families and individuals in need of energy assistance during the winter months. Thank you to all who contributed!

Feeding the Children at St. Vincent's Center

S spring approaches, we are so excited about our new project at St. Vincent's Center for Handicapped Children in Port-au-Prince.

100 Gardens has partnered with the Friends to set up an Aquaponic Training System in April. A sustainable system that allows for regular harvests of fish and continuous harvests of vegetables. The students in the Horticulture Program at Stonewall Jackson Youth Detention Center have built and tested the prototype system. This system is a scaled down version of the University of the Virgin Island's Commercial Aquaponic system, built with materials that can be acquired in Haiti such as plastic barrels, concrete blocks, and plastic sheets.

Our farm will be so important for many reasons. It will educate the students at St. Vincent's in agriculture, math, and science while producing food for the children. And it will provide an additional financial stream for St. Vincent's besides donations, building St. Vincent's capacity for self-sustainability.

Our education specialist is now working on a pre-K to 9th grade curriculum to teach aquaponics. This is not an easy project since NEW signs have to be invented to teach the deaf students and all the teaching materials have to printed in braille for the blind students. We will also design the garden for all the children who will able to participate.


