VER the past few days I have been asked more than once "How did stewardship work out?" or "Were we able to balance a budget for 2015?" At first, I found these to be interesting questions as I thought I had spoken to both of these points, but I guess not. After a little conversational investigating it became clear to me that while I had spent a fair amount of time letting you all know about the ever expanding stewardship needs of St. James's, it has come to my attention that I have not let you all know how it turned out. I think by the end of January/February we were all a little tired of "money talk."

I can happily tell you that, although it took a lot longer than we had hoped, through the continued generosity of so many of you, we did received the pledges needed to balance the 2015 budget without any significant cuts and even a few line item increases.

Here are some numbers:

Pledging Units/Households: **192** New Pledging Units/Households: **24** Total Pledge Dollars: **\$531,405.00** (100.6% of last years number) Final Budget Income Numbers: 2015 - **\$756,900.00** as compared to: 2014 - \$751,839.00, 2013 - \$733,753.00, 2012 - \$732,679.00 Average Household pledge for 2015: **\$2767.73**

So, Thank you. Thank you for your faithfulness, your generosity, and your prayers. It is because of you that St. James's is able to do the work that God has called us to.



Vestry Corner

Treasurer's Report—March 2015

Current Position: As our cold winter seems to have finally given way to warmer spring weather, the church's finances continue the strong start reported as of the end of February. Overall, the church ended March with almost a \$20,000 surplus relative to budget. This figure is close to the \$21,000 surplus figure reported through the end of February. The reasons for the continued surplus are similar to those reported last month. For example, the income figure is impacted primarily by pledge payments that have been made sooner than expected. Expenses also contributed to the surplus position as they are \$2,112 less than budget. The lower than expected expenses are due to the property and administration related expenses falling below budget. As mentioned last month, it is too early in the year to hang our hat on trends. As we move through the second quarter of the year, the trends for the year should become clearer.

Our contributions to our church's operating budget might not seem like a big deal, but how we give and why we give are important not just for our own spiritual health; when we show this world that genuine generosity reigns above increasing profit margins, we show this world that money is not our god.

St. James's doesn't just make me feel good about myself and tell me what I want to hear. It challenges me to think about how I can make the world better and then it gives me and opportunity to make a difference and make friends at the same time.

Income: Year-to-date (YTD) actual income is \$17,808 above budget (or 7.6% better than budget). As of the end of February, YTD income was \$13,200 above budget (7.2%).

Expense: YTD expenses are currently \$2,112, or 1.1%, below budget. As of the end of February, expenses were \$7,900 (6.1%) below budget. Most of the expense categories are slightly under or over budget.

From the Assistant Rector

EAR Ones, In my sermon on the Second Sunday of Easter, I mentioned John C. Clark Elementary School, which sits across the street from the Hartford Catholic Worker. Clark was unexpectedly closed after PCBs were found in the school. Many children were informed of the closing when they arrived to the school to find locked doors and a cardboard sign. Now these children are without their normal school for the rest of this school year and perhaps much of the next; the three schools they are temporarily attending do not have adequate space or resources to offer them all things like music, gym, and art.

I said it once and I will say it again, you can bet that if such a thing happened to a West Hartford school, there would be no end to the outrage and publicity until appropriate accommodations were made. This is not a simple situation, but clearly some priorities are out of whack—the Yardgoats stadium is underway while young children are carrying heavier burdens than they already were.

They should not be the ones to carry these burdens. The powers that be have a responsibility to these children to offer them a safe place with all of the resources most other children in this area receive in order to learn and grow.

The way of ignoring the needs of the vulnerable is not the way of God, and calling those needs someone else's problem is not the way of God, and it is not the way forward for the church.

That being said, there are things we can do to help. At Chris Doucot's suggestion, I am asking that before you finish reading this newsletter you write a letter or email to the Hartford Board of Education, stating your concern for the well being of these children and perhaps asking the board to visit the community this closure affects. Perhaps if they learned about the lives of these children, they would begin to understand the burdens they carry with them already. The board needs to know that people are watching and are concerned about the well being of these children.

Talk with your children, grandchildren, friends, and neighbors about issues like these. Do what you can to raise awareness. And this applies to everyone, remember that many of the burdens people carry are invisible—we won't be able to recognize them unless we lose our tendency to

judge for the sake of having more meaningful encounters.

Look for more opportunities to focus your tremendous capability for generosity on issues of justice around our community. Bring these issues to others' attention, and remember that, "Let us go forth into the world rejoicing in the power of the Spirit" isn't a dismissal from the service as much as it is a rallying cry to engage in the kind of service which characterizes Christian discipleship.



Rhythms of Grace

Sunday, May 10

A worship and faith formation experience for children and families with special needs is held at St. James's Episcopal Church in West Hartford on the second Sunday of each month.

The service, which is between an hour and an hour and half, involves storytelling, therapeutic play and Holy Communion. The roots of Rhythm of Grace are in the Episcopal tradition, but all are welcome.



AY is here! It is hard to believe that we are finished with that long, cruel winter, but we have finally made it. In this post Easter time of year we can all say, "Alleluia" to that! Here at St. James's we will be bringing most of the program year to an end this month, including Sunday school for all ages.

As we look toward the summer months, I would like to draw attention to a place near and dear to my heart and that is, Camp Washington. Camp Washington is located in the Western part of the state near the town by the same name. It is a beautiful camp, with wonderfully maintained facilities including cabins, a lodge, a swimming hole, Arts & Crafts Cabin, and much more. It is an incredible place to experience God through the glorious natural beauty of this amazing part of the world, but that is not what I am going to write about today.

From the time I was in third grade until I was 19, I went to an Episcopal camp in a very different part of the country. Camp Crucis, which was then owned by the Diocese of Dallas. This camp by outward appearances couldn't begin to compete with Camp Washington. Our cabins didn't have plumbing in them, the tennis courts were cracked, the swimming pool smelled like rotten eggs and did I mention it was in Texas? It was 100 degrees most days and the only airconditioned spot was the dining hall. Sounds pretty miserable, right? Well, to me it was a place of life-saving grace.

In my elementary school and junior high years, I was a camper at Camp Crucis every summer for just one week. I had a very full life during the academic year, with dance classes, gymnastic, and regular church attendance, but the week at camp was always my favorite week of the year. I had friends at school, but I had a more intimate friendship with my camp friends probably because our relationships were fused by our shared love of Jesus Christ. I could try and describe how this all happened, but I think the words from the chorus to the Camp Crucis song do it best.

Crucis, the place where I laid down my life,

for brothers and sisters and for Jesus Christ.

It was here I learned laughter and a new part of me,

It was here that the Lord set me free.


I truly believe that I would not be the person of faith that I am today, if I had not gone to this amazing church camp. Although I have not ever been a camper at Camp Washington, I hear story after story of people who share the same experience at this beautiful place.

If you are planning your child's summer, please consider sending them to a session at Camp Washington. For many, it is the first time they take responsibility for their own faith. It is an experience that is hard for me to put into words. For me it was life-changing.

From the Organist & Choirmaster

"For the Mouse is a creature of great personal valour. For the Mouse is of an hospitable disposition."

"Let Nimrod, the mighty hunter, bind a leopard to the altar and consecrate his spear to the Lord."

UT of context, would you believe that these verses are taken from one of Benjamin Britten's choral masterpieces, *Rejoice in the Lamb*, Opus 30? St. James's Choir will sing this incredible cantata for Evensong on Sunday, May 17 at 5pm.

Back to the text, you might be wondering what mice and warriors have in common. According to the author, 18th century poet Christopher Smart, warriors and mice praise God in their own way – equally beautiful and faithful. The idea that every living being praises God, or in the words of Smart: "Nations, and languages, and every creature, in which is the breath of Life...magnify his name together," is central to *Rejoice in the Lamb* and Smart's *Jubilate agno*, the 1,200 line poem from which Britten derived Opus 30's libretto.

Britten wrote *Rejoice in the Lamb* during a very important and fertile time in his life. At the onset of World War II, Britten and his partner Peter Pears escaped England for the safety of a friend's house on Long Island. There they enjoyed a bohemian existence, meeting many artists and musicians from New York City, which at the time was avant garde in almost every creative field.

Britten wrote *Rejoice in the Lamb* in 1943, just two years before he would return to England and compose *Peter Grimes,* an opera that proved to be a watershed moment for British music, culture, and the revival of operatic prominence in that country.


What's interesting about the connection between *Peter Grimes* and *Rejoice in the Lamb* is that they feature both direct and subtle references to oppression. In the opera, the title role suffers ridicule and societal isolation due to his inability to communicate with the local townspeople. In short, people think he is awkward. Since Grimes is a fisherman, spending long periods out at sea, he operates in isolation, and it does not help that one of his young apprentices drowns during a voyage. For this he is put on trial and accused of murder, yet there are no witnesses – only the absurd assumption that a loner by default is not trustworthy.


The connection between the oppressed Peter Grimes and *Rejoice in the Lamb* is that Christopher Smart was similarly oppressed by the people around him. In 1757, he was accused of lunacy and committed to a London asylum for four years. Whether he deserved this diagnosis is not entirely clear. His father-in-law is believed to have had him committed as a punishment for old debts.

Britten's interest in themes of oppression and marginalization are present throughout his operas. Many scholars believe this preoccupation stems from having to hide his relationship with Peter Pears in a country where homosexuality was illegal. As a point of reference, England's former ban on homosexuality is featured prominently in movies featuring the story of Alan Turing, the gay mathematician who, despite cracking the Engima code, thus helping to win the war for the Allies, was chemically sterilized by his own government just a few years later.

I believe Britten's interest in themes of oppression led him to select one of the most powerful verses of Smart's text:

"For I am under the same accusation With my Savior, For they said, He is besides himself. For the officers of the peace Are at variance with me, And the watchman smites me With his staff. For the silly fellow, silly fellow, Is against me, And belongeth neither to me Nor to my family. For I am in twelve hardships, But he that was born of a virgin Shall deliver me out of all, Shall deliver me out of all."

Christopher Smart composed this verse and the remainder of his *Jubilate agno* during his confinement, spending the long hours of each day reflecting on many things, including his own theology. It is astounding that even in such a bleak setting, he is able to find incredible beauty and faith in his daily routine and observations. I will leave you with one such verse, speaking about a cat named Jeoffry, his only companion at the asylum:

"For at the first glance Of the glory of God in the East He worships in his way. For this is done by wreathing his body Seven times round with elegant quickness. For he knows that God is his saviour. For God has bless'd him In the variety of his movements. For there is nothing sweeter Than his peace when at rest."
