

From the Rector's Desk

N July of 2012 at the 77th General convention of the Episcopal Church, Michael Curry (elected the next Presiding Bishop of the Episcopal Church this summer at the 78th General Convention) preached the closing sermon to a few thousand Episcopalians; lay persons, priest, deacons and bishops. The Sermon was entitled "Crazy Christians: A Call to Follow Jesus." This sermon later became the basis for his book by the same name. Michael Curry is a rhetorical genius. Through his deep faith, profound understanding of the Bible and Christian history, and Spirit-filled preaching style Curry not only helps us understand how we can become disciples of Jesus, but gets us (at least me) excited about the possibilities.

This is the person of faith that the Episcopal Church has chosen to lead us into the future – and I, for one, can't wait to see where we are headed. Our beloved Episcopal Church, like most faith communities in the United States, has had a hard couple of decades. Many once faithful parishioners have faded away into a culture of "spiritual, but not religious" (whatever that means) and Sunday youth sporting events. Resources for mission—spiritual, human, and financial have become scarce, and I believe that we all are the worse for it.


As Christians we are taught and called to a faith and understanding of new beginnings/ new life. This is the message of the empty tomb. My prayer for the Church of my childhood, the Church in which we have raised our children, and the Church where I serve as priest is a prayer for new life—a reimagining of what it means to follow Jesus, and a reinvigorating of what it means to serve Jesus and the world. Like all journeys, this one must begin at home in our parishes and communities.

This fall St. James's is rolling out two new and exciting ways to be Church, to engage our hearts' desire to be disciples of the one who calls us by name. We are in the process of developing ways to be a part of God's reconciling mission in the world. For years we have called this "Outreach," but with a renewed and expanded vision, we are now using the language of "mission." St. James's new "Mission Commission" is working hard developing new ways of encouraging all of us to get and be involved.

The lay and ordained leadership of St. James's believes strongly that this is a good time for all of us to gather together and begin a conversation about how we as a faith community can be a part of God's work here and now. As I said earlier "all journeys must begin at home." St. James's 2020 – ENVISION OUR FUTURE is the starting point for this new segment of our journey together. Keep an eye out for much more information and please be a part of this very important conversation.

In his sermon, Bishop Curry's excitement for the future of a Church founded in and following Jesus is not the rhetorical mastery of a great preacher, but the joy of a person of great faith. 

Vestry Corner

Treasurer's Report—May 2015

Current Position: Overall, the church ended May with a surplus of a little less than \$20,000. This figure represents an improvement from the \$17,000 surplus reported at the end of April and also gets the church to where it was financially at the end of March. As mentioned in previous reports this year, pledge payments made earlier than expected continue to help the surplus position of the church. As the year progresses, we expect the budgeted pledge payments to catch-up to the actual

payments, reducing the positive variance contained in the box below. Year to date expenses remain below budget. However, the financial benefit of lower expenses declined during as expenses moved from \$5,400 less than budget at the end of April to the \$2,726 figure contained in the table below. During the summer, expenses will be monitored.



<u>Income</u>: Year-to-date (YTD) actual income is \$17,808 above budget (or 7.6% better than budget). As of the end of February, YTD income was \$13,200 above budget (7.2%).

Expense: YTD expenses are currently \$2,112, or 1.1%, below budget. As of the end of February, expenses were \$7,900 (6.1%) below budget. Most of the expense categories are slightly under or over budget.



From the Assistant Rector

OT so long ago I learned of a breathing exercise practiced by our bishop suffragan, Laura Ahrens. As a typical breathing exercise goes, she breathes in while meditating on one word and then breathes out meditating on another. The words she chose for this particular exercise were "disciple" and "apostle."

Perhaps these verge on archaic Christianese, words we hear all of the time but never really think about unless forced to explain them to someone for whom they are unfamiliar. Just in case you fall into this category, a disciple is a follower or student of a particular teacher; an apostle is one who is sent to be a messenger. In the case of Christianity, a disciple is a follower of Jesus, while an apostle is someone sent by Jesus to spread his message.

When you think about it, Bishop Laura's breathing exercise is the meditation of a healthy Christian congregation. Disciples are breathed into the worshipping community every Sunday to listen, learn, and experience the Living God through Christ in the liturgies of the Word and Table. Then at the moment we are dismissed, apostles are breathed out into the rest of the world to be messengers of that experience of the Living God. We are breathed out to be apostles and evangelists.

We talk a lot in the church about how "evangelist" is a dirty word, but we rarely get too specific about what evangelism might look like for us (if it doesn't look like sidewalk scream-preaching with sandwich boards).

I mentioned in a sermon recently that on Facebook, as well as in many venues, we are evangelists of our own good news. We don't post the bad stuff, which perpetuates a not-so-subtle myth that it's not okay to not be okay. In reflecting further on this, I started to ask what keeps people who go to church from sharing with others the goodness that they find in that community and worship.

When someone becomes a grandparent, they hardly go five minutes without whipping out a few photos of the precious little one—and there's *always* a story to go along with the photo.

That's evangelism, in a sense. Evangelism is when you can't help but tell people about some good news. Notice it has nothing to do with coercing anyone else into being more like you in any way; grandparents don't share pictures of their offspring's offspring in order to pressure you into becoming a grandparent. They certainly rarely (if ever) imply that not being a grandparent is in any way inferior to being one...well, I can't speak for the grandparents in your life.


So ask yourself, if you're coming to church on a somewhat regular basis, why are you coming? How does it feel while you are within this community? Do you ever leave after a service regretting that you went? Is there anything keeping you from sharing this truth with others?

If these questions lead you to the conclusion that being part of the worshipping community is generally a good thing, ask yourself why it's a good thing and what it is about that good thing that is worth sharing with others.

Note: Evangelism does not have to include an invitation to church, though all are welcome.

What might we gain as individuals, or as a community, if we allowed ourselves to soak in the Word like the first disciples and then to squeeze out every last drop between Monday and Saturday? What if we intentionally lived into our callings to be disciples *and* apostles in deeper ways?

S we begin the program year, I wanted to fill you all in a few changes that will be happening with the Children's Liturgy and Sunday school here at St. James's. Over the past couple of years, attendance at Sunday school after church has been waning. I think this has happened for many reasons. 1) Families are extremely busy. 2) Our Boys & Girls Choir has grown in the past few years, due to the hard work of Vaughn Mauren and Jason Roberts before him. By the time Sunday after church rolls around, these children have spent a tremendous amount of time at St. James's including arriving at church on Sunday by 8:30 a.m. 3) Many families have younger children who are ready for lunch and naptime after church.

I also felt that the children were bored with the Rotation Model of Sunday school we were using. We had done the really great curriculum multiple times. I decided that to reenergize our Sunday school, it was time for a change.

So, with that in mind, I did some research and after talking to some parents and Bob, came up with a new plan for Christian Formation for children. During the 9:30 service, instead of Children's Liturgy of the Word, the preschool through elementary school children will leave with me and a parent volunteer for a lectionary-based Sunday school lesson. After looking at several curricula, I have chosen Living the Good News by Church Publishing. This is a great curriculum available online with many great options. Each Sunday I will be asking for a parent volunteer to come with me and help with the children.

Just as in the past, the children will return at the Passing of the Peace and be with their parents for communion. After a quick snack at coffee hour, the preschool children will go to their room for supervised play, we will need parent volunteers for this as well. The elementary school children will come upstairs for supervised play, led by me. While there, I will go over the Gospel for

the day and open it up for discussion with the children.

Our middle schoolers will still be meeting in their movie room after the 9:30 service. We will still be using the Cokesbury's Reel to Real curriculum with movies. Our middle schoolers love it and it brings about some lively discussion. Volunteers are needed for this as well.

So, if you noticed, I am making some changes. But one thing that hasn't changed is the need for volunteers. We cannot make this program a success without parents and others to lead. I have changed the arrangements of things so that little knowledge of the Bible is necessary to help out. All you need is the desire to help these children in their spiritual journeys. That's all it takes.

As Ann Cooke announced, as a part of these changes, Bob, Ann and I decided that my title at St. James's should change as well. In the past few years, my role here has shifted from Director of Christian Formation to more of a Director of Family Ministries. In this role, I find myself more and more often a resource for parents on helping their families continue on their faith journeys. My plan is to embrace this change and delve further into this role.

In an effort to sign up as many volunteer parents as possible, I am going to have a short meeting with all the parents of Sunday school age children (preschool through middle school) on **Sunday, August 23 after the 9:00 service in the parish hall.** At that time, I will go over the changes that will be made, answer any questions and be asking for parents to sign up to help.

I am really excited about the changes to the Sunday morning schedule, and my new title. I think it is going to be great for the kids and get more parents involved in enriching their children's faith.


From the Organist & Choirmaster

ESPITE the choir's summer holiday, it has been very busy around St. James's! The weeks since Recognition Sunday have been taken up by a need to clean out and update the undercroft/choir room and lounge, and organize the music library.

The first priority was to apply fresh paint to the choir room floor. It has been seven years since it was last painted, and the over one thousand rehearsals since then had worn down the original coat. Once the floor was partially done, I gathered a team of eight older choristers to move the choral library into the undercroft. This opened a lot of space in the lounge – space that will make it more comfortable to gather before and after rehearsals and services. It took us five hours to individually vacuum, organize, and move the 700 boxes to the undercroft. I would be remiss if I did not thank Miley Cyrus and Luna Pizza for their supporting roles in the effort.

The second phase of the project is a cosmetic renovation of the choir lounge. Once used as the primary rehearsal space, this room still contains the original florescent light fixtures, which are unattractive and unnecessarily eye-popping in their brightness. After much research, I found four inexpensive but nice replacement fixtures, and they will be installed shortly. The room will also be completely repainted and the linoleum floor stripped to reveal its original color.

These projects were a priority because in the next year alone, the typical chorister will spend at least 100 hours inside these spaces. They need to be comfortable, warm and inviting places to work and be together in fellowship. Make sure you come down and take a look!

June Outreach Update Paper Towel and Toilet Paper Collection




