Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As most of you know by now, St. James's Assistant Rector, Charlotte LaForest, has been called to be the next rector of St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Longmeadow, Massachusetts. Charlotte's last Sunday with us will be January 5. It has been a real pleasure to work with her, and I am happy to have made a new friend in ministry. While I will miss Charlotte's collegiality, pastoral insight, wonderful preaching, and programmatic skills, I am very excited for her to begin this new chapter in her life as a priest. This is a great opportunity for the whole LaForest family. St. Andrew's has a great rectory for a family of five; Longmeadow is a shorter work-commute for Eric than West Hartford, and the community has very good schools for the 3 youngest LaForest scholars. You, the people of St. James's, are a gift to the whole Episcopal Church.

Over the next few months I will be conducting a national search for the next Assistant Rector of St. James's. I will keep you up to date as best I can and hope that all of you will be patient this winter and spring. I know that many of you will step up to cover those things that might otherwise fall through the cracks. Please let me know how you would like to be a part of this moment of transition and stage in the life of our beloved parish.

I am so grateful for the ways you have supported and encouraged me during my time at St. James's, and I hope you know that forming young clergy is an important part of your identity as a parish, as well as a gift you give not only to the diocese, but to the wider church as well. I am certain that you will continue this important work with your next Assistant Rector.

Please know that you will remain in my prayers. I will always be grateful to each one of you. You will always be an important part of the story of my ministry, and I will take so many things I have learned here from you into my next call.

I'll close my final letter to you with my favorite blessing that I have blessed you with many times:

Life is short, and we do not have to much time to gladden the hearts of those who travel the way with us. So be swift to love, make haste to be kind, and may the blessing of God almighty, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit be with you this day, and forever. Amen.

# From the Organist & Choirmaster


Concerts at St James's will present two performances in January and February of 2020, beginning with Jeremy Filsell, Director of Music and Organist at St Thomas Fifth Avenue, on Friday, January 24th at 7:30 p.m. The concert is presented free of charge, thanks in large part to the generous co-sponsorship of the Greater Hartford Chapter of the American Guild of Organists.

Jeremy Filsell is an internationally renowned concert organist and pianist. Originally from the United Kingdom, Dr Filsell was organ scholar at Keble College, Oxford, assistant organist at Ely Cathedral, music tutor at Eton College, and a countertenor Lay Clerk at St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle. He has recorded extensively on both the organ and the piano, including the complete organ works of Marcel Dupré, the subject of Dr Filsell's Ph.D. thesis. In 2019, Dr Filsell succeeded Daniel Hyde as Organist and Director of Music at St Thomas Church Fifth Avenue.

On Sunday, February 23rd, pianist Alan Murchie returns to present his third collaborative concert for our series. This time he will be joined by the formidable clarinetist Romie de Guise-Langlois, a frequent performer with the Chamber Music Society at Lincoln Center and a soloist with Orpheus Chamber Ensemble at Carnegie Hall. Hailed as "extraordinary" by The New York Times, Ms de Guise-Langlois has performed as a chamber musician at such notable venues as the Kennedy Center, the 92nd St Y, the Metropolitan Museum of Art, the Royale Conservatory, the Rivinia Festival, Wigmore Hall, and Concertgebouw. As an educator, Ms de Guise-Langlois has presented masterclasses through the United States, Europe and Asia and she is an educator with Musical Connections at Carnegie Hall. Tickets for this performance will be available at the door and are only \$25 for adults and \$15 for seniors and students.

I hope you will join us for these wonderful concerts, presented on the heels of performances by the Vienna Boys Choir, VOCES8, and Christmas Angelicus. Invite your neighbors, friends and family, to enjoy great music in a great space.


Nurturing your children's spiritual life from birth through high school

S we head into 2020, I am excited by all the energy at St. James's. We have some great Sunday school lessons planned for all ages from preschool through adulthood. I hope and pray that most of you will take advantage of these opportunities for you and your children. We will be continuing with some Old Testament lessons in January. We began Old Testament lessons before Advent, and I am excited that I have found a great resource of online stories that really grab the children's attention from the youngest to the oldest. This resource really makes the stories come to life and then, fingers crossed, they might remember the stories after class.

As I have said before, I see my job as the Director of Family Ministries as twofold: First, I see my job as helping the children of this parish develop their spiritual lives. This involves helping them to have some useful tools in their spiritual toolbox. Included in these toolboxes are things like the Lord's Prayer, knowing how to say a prayer of thanksgiving and forgiveness.

The second part of my job is the education part. I try to teach the children the basic stories of the Bible, so that when they see these themes in literature, they will recognize them. That is where you parents and grandparents come in. For instance, if you are reading that wonderful tale of The Velveteen Rabbit with your child, use that as an opportunity to discuss what it means to be really loved by your creator. If you are watching a film with a biblical reference in it, explore it! While watching Spiderman with a bunch of middle school students, one student shared that when Spiderman was tempted by the Green Lantern it was just like when Jesus was tempted in the wilderness! Help your children to make these connections with the Bible and modern stories, which will help them to see the relevance of the Bible in their lives and help them to be better students.

So in these weeks of thinking about New Year's resolutions, I would like to suggest one to consider: As parents, let's try to help our children to build up those "Spiritual Toolboxes." Let's work with them to grow to be spiritually mature young people who have a basic knowledge of Bible stories. How can that be done? One way is to come to church and Sunday school with your children. Then, to go home and talk with them about what you learned. Make church a priority for you and your children. You will be glad you did.



# Treasurer's Report—November 2019


**Current Position:** For the first eleven months of 2019 the Church's finances were positive vis a vis the budget. Total Income for that period was \$2,583 more than the budgeted amount and expenses for that period were \$17,813 less than the budgeted amounts. As a result, the Church's net financial position at the end of November, 2019 was a positive variance to budget of \$20,396.


**Income:** For the period January through November, 2019, Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) were \$6,703 more than the total of these four budgeted income sources. Current Year Pledges were \$10,456 ahead of budget. However, income from outside groups using the Parish Facilities was \$4,164 less than budget. Special Contributions were \$3,482 under budget whereas Special Fundraising was \$3,521 ahead of the budgeted amount.

**Expense**: Major contributors to the January – November results were the following: Property: Total Property expenses for the period were \$2,697 less than budget. Utility expenses (Electricity, Gas and Water) were under budget by a total of \$1,769. The remaining Property categories were under budget by the total amount of \$929. Personnel: Personnel expenses were \$9,831 under budget for the eleven months primarily due to the timing difference between budget and payment of Lay Life & Health Insurance expense (\$3,058) and as a result of the one -time refund of certain Federal employment taxes (\$6,233). Of the remaining expense categories, eight were under budget and two were over, the net amount being \$5,283 under budget.


