### From the Assistant Rector's Desk

Dear Community of St. James's,

As I compose this article in late June, I find myself aware that we are roughly halfway through Bob's sabbatical, and I wanted to take some time to reflect on what has happened in these last couple of months and what will happen in the next couple of months until he returns in August.

Bob left from Easter services to catch his flight to Spain, and so my first day solo in the office was the following Tuesday. Within my first two hours in the office I was contacted about a wedding, a funeral, a baptism, and an ordination, and I worried about the pace of the months ahead! But things slowed down. (Sort of.)

We moved ahead with our fundraising for the mission trip. Our Mission Mountain went up. (And yes, it definitely looks like a Christmas tree.) Our "Small Plates for a Big Mission" Brunch organized by Rita Neal and Loretta Waldman was well-attended and full of incredible food. Our Mission Trip Car Washes (which were greatly aided by the organizational wizardry of Kate Jackson) had fantastic participation from hardworking car washers and from parishioners and neighbors who brought in dirty cars. The three car washes combined made close to \$3000 for our trip to Ecuador. Between all of these efforts as well as online fundraising, letters written to family and friends, and the generosity of this congregation we are almost at our fundraising goal! Thank you to everyone who participated in so many different ways.

Even beyond mission trip preparations, there has been a lot going on! We sold hundreds of strawberry shortcakes on Memorial Day. We've made thousands of sandwiches after church. We sang Evensong. We rededicated our organ as we enjoyed the incredible musical talents of our organist, Vaughn Mauren. We had a couple of very busy Sundays: a parish picnic and confirmation on one Sunday; Pentecost, a baptism, a mission trip car wash AND a mission trip brunch on another Sunday. (Note to self: maybe next time spread things out a little more?)

Now we are just a couple of weeks away from the trip to Ecuador, and the final preparations begin. What to pack? What will the weather be like? How many alpacas can I bring home with me? (Eric says none. I disagree.)

Our planning is also underway for the next program year, and my thoughts turn to questions of how we want to learn, grow, and care for one another this year. As part of that process, I'm including some questions that I would love for you to join me in thinking about and praying with in the weeks and months ahead:

What brings you joy? What breaks your heart? Where does God show up in your life? What question do you wrestle with? What are some fundamental truths you believe in?

Our answers may surprise us. I invite you to share them with each other and with me. I can't wait to see what God has in store for us!

# From the Organist & Choirmaster


I highly recommend coming to hear VOCES8 [pronounced voh-ches-eight (eight voices)]. VOCES8 is one of the very few leading choral ensembles in the world. We are truly thrilled to have them come to St James's on Tuesday, October 22 at 7pm. Tickets are available at www.eventbrite.com.

VOCES8 has performed at many notable venues including Wigmore Hall, Bridgewater Hall, Elbphilharmonie, Cité de la Musique, Vienna Konzerthaus, Tokyo Opera City, NCPA Beijing, Mariinsky Theatre Concert Hall, Victoria Concert Hall Singapore and the Palacio de Bellas Artes Mexico City. This season they will add the Sydney Opera House, Muziekgebouw aan' t IJ and La Seine Musicale Paris to that list. Keen musical collaborators, this season will see concerts with the Academy of Ancient Music, Manchester Camerata, the Edvard Grieg Kor, Hugo Ticciati, the Orchestre Philharmonique de Monte-Carlo, and with baroque violinist Rachel Podger, with whom the critically acclaimed 'Guardian Angel' project will continue. Touring highlights of the season include concerts throughout the UK and Europe, across USA and Japan, and debut visits to Australia and Lithuania.

With an on-going programme of recordings, videos and live broadcasts, VOCES8 is heard regularly on international television and radio. The ensemble is a Decca Classics artist and has released acclaimed recordings that have all reached the top of the classical charts. A new album is planned for 2019. VOCES8 has premiered commissions from Roxanna Panufnik, Alexander Levine, Alec Roth, Ben Parry, Ola Gjeilo, Philip Stopford, Graham Lack, Thomas Hewitt Jones and Owain Park. 2019 will see the premiere of a commission by Jonathan Dove to mark the culmination of his period as the group's Composer in Residence.

VOCES8 is passionate about music education and is the flagship ensemble of the music charity VCM Foundation. Engaging in a broad range of outreach work that reaches up to 40,000 people a year, the group runs an annual programme of workshops and masterclasses at the Foundation's home in London, the Gresham Centre at St Anne & St Agnes Church. Dedicated to supporting promising young singers, the group awards eight annual choral scholarships through the VOCES8 Scholars initiative. These scholarships are linked to the annual Milton Abbey Summer School at which amateur singers of all ages are invited to work and perform with VOCES8. The ensemble is proud to be the Associate Ensemble for Cambridge University and delivers a Masters programme in choral studies.

As official Ambassadors for Edition Peters, the ensemble publishes educational material including the 'VOCES8 Method'. Developed by Paul Smith, co-founder of VOCES8, this renowned and unique teaching tool is available in four languages and adopts music to enhance development in numeracy, literacy and linguistics. Also available are two anthologies of its arrangements, and an ever-expanding 'VOCES8 Singles' range. This season the ensemble becomes Ambassador for the Tido App, an inspirational resource and learning tool created by Edition Peters. The VOCES8 Method and music arrangements will be made available via Tido during the 2018/19 season.

ELL, it is that time again, time for me to write my newsletter article. I decided to write about the three parts to the Trinity of Christian Formation of children: attending church, reinforcing your faith at home, and taking responsibility for that faith either through attending camp or going on a mission trip.

I began to write about attending church regularly, and my article got a little preachy for my taste. I sounded like I was an expert of raising faithful children. I feel that I should admit to you all, I am not.

While I am confessing, I must say, in a lot of ways I was not always the best parent. I did not always check my kids' homework. I made boring lunches with the same meals day in and day out. I was never consistent with making them hang up their coats and put their boots away. Many times I put away their backpacks myself or carried their laundry upstairs because it was just easier than making them do it themselves. One thing Bob and I were consistent on was coming to church. Because Bob and I both work here, church was never an option on Sunday morning. Our kids had to be here and they were, Sunday in and Sunday out. We also tried hard to reinforce our faith at home with prayers before meals and bedtime.

When my children were younger, I did my best to help them grow up to be faithful people. I think the idea of the Trinity of Christian Formation, is correct, but I have to say ...

There were influences on them far greater than my own. When I talk to my grown-up children about what had the most influence on their faith development, the thread that seems to weave throughout all of their experiences was being an integral part of this place. Both Maddy and Henry sang in the choir. Robby and Henry were both acolytes. So as they say, by the

grace of God, my children grew up to be people of faith, not perfect people, but people who know God loves them.


When Henry and Maddy were in the choir, they learned to sing many different versions of the Nunc dimittis, otherwise known as, The Song of Simeon. In this beautiful song, it says, "For these eyes of mine have seen the Savior, whom you have prepared for all the world to see:" How do we help our children to, as the song says, see the Savior? One way is by encouraging them to make the most of all that this community has to offer: from Sunday school to youth group to making sandwiches to singing to worshipping. In all of these different places and in many different ways we see Jesus among us. Once we see Jesus among us in our faith community, we can take Jesus with us out into the greater world; and I believe that is ultimately our most important mission as Christians. We are called to be the church in the greater world which is much easier to do if you have been raised in a beautiful faith community like this one. My children are each on their own faith journey, and I am thankful to say that they have faith.

So my advice for helping your children grow up to be faithful adults is this:
Come to church. Come to Sunday school and youth group and compline. Go on the youth mission trip. Go to Camp Washington. Spend a lot of time around church. It seems to rub off on you if you do.

# **Vestry Corner**

## Treasurer's Report / January-May 2019

Current Position: For the first five months of 2019 the Church's finances were negative vis a vis the budget.

Total Income for that period was \$2,428 under the budgeted amount and expenses for the five months were

\$8,222 less than the budgeted amounts. As a result, the Church's net financial position at the end of May, 2019 was a negative variance to budget of \$5,794.

"What I'm trying to do here is get you to relax, not be so preoccupied with getting, so you can respond to God's giving. People who don't know God and the way he works fuss over these things, but you know both God and how he works. Steep yourself in Godreality, God-initiative, God-provisions. You'll find all your everyday human concerns will be met...The place where your treasure is, is the place you will most want to be, and end up being." ## **Income & Expense Summary:**

<u>Income:</u> For the first five months of 2019, Year To Date Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) were \$3,971 less than the total of the four budgeted income sources. Current Year Pledges accounted for \$2596 of this shortfall. Income from outside groups using the Parish Facilities was \$1,185 less than budget. Special Contributions were \$3,400 more than the total budgeted amount.

**Expenses:** Major contributors to the January – May Expense results were the following: Property: Total Property expenses for the period were \$4,735 less than budget because the categories of Electricity, Gas, Water and General Maintenance were under budget by the aggregate amount of \$4,963. The remaining categories were over budget by \$228. Personnel: Personnel expenses were \$289 under budget for the five month period. Of the remaining expense categories, seven were under budget and three were over, the net amount being \$3,201 under budget.
