James 3:13-4:3, 7-8a

Who is wise and understanding among you? Show by your good life that your works are done with gentleness born of wisdom. But if you have bitter envy and selfish ambition in your hearts, do not be boastful and false to the truth. Such wisdom does not come down from above, but is earthly, unspiritual, devilish. For where there is envy and selfish ambition, there will also be disorder and wickedness of every kind. Love Bade Me Welcome David Hurd (b. 1950) Lyrics: George Herbert (1593-1633)



He currently is the Music Director at Church of St. Mary the Virgin in Times Square and is one of the judges for the Albert Schweitzer Organ Festival this weekend in Hartford.

HARTFORD CATHOLIC WORKER FOOD PANTRY




