VOICES OF HOPE COFFEE HOUR

CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTION INFORMATION

If you are older than 70 and ½, did you know that you can make donations directly from your IRA to St. James’s – and not pay taxes on those donations? Further, you can use these qualified charitable distributions (or QCD for short) to help meet your required minimum distributions (RMDs) once you reach age 73. Because RMDs represent income, they can sometimes push people into a higher tax bracket than they would otherwise be in, potentially triggering more income tax, a Medicare surtax, an increase in Medicare Part B and D premiums and taxation of Social Security benefits. So re-directing some or all of your RMDs to St. James’s and/or other charitable organizations may be a smart tax strategy while helping you support the church. If you’re interested in exploring this, please check with your financial advisor or institution that holds your IRA account(s), and/or your tax advisor.

NOTE: If you’re of any age, you also can donate to St. James’s or another charity any appreciated stock with embedded capital gains, take a tax-deduction (if you itemized your deductions) and not have to pay capital gains taxes!
