THE LITURGY OF THE TABLE

AT THE OFFERTORY 💎 O Quam Gloriosum 🤍 Tomás Luis de Victoria (1548-1611)

Translation: O how glorious is the kingdom, wherein all the Saints rejoice with Christ! Clothed in white robes, they follow the Lamb wherever he goes.

This selection is possibly the most well-known of this influential Spanish composer of the Late Renaissance. Published in 1572, this motet contains the kind of mystical nobility and masterful counterpoint associated with his music, employing text-painting throughout - from celebratory, repeated chords which then move outward in expansive motion for the opening, "O how glorious" and then a sequential, "following," motif for the lyrics, "they follow the Lamb," at its conclusion.



HARTFORD CATHOLIC WORKER FOOD PANTRY


