
While those were the most notable happenings in our life together this past year, the year also was a continuation of many years of faithful witness to God's love in the world through the worship and work of the good people of this parish.



Treasurer's Report—November 2017


Current Position: At November 30, 2017 the Church's finances continued in the black vis a vis the budget. Although year-to-date total income was \$1,487 under budget, total expenses for the same period were \$20,178 less than the budgeted amounts. As a result, the Church's net financial position at the end of November, 2017 was \$18,691 better than the budgeted amounts.

Income: Through November 30, 2017, Year To Date Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) totaled \$5,955 more than the respective budgeted amounts. Of these four accounts, Prior Year Pledges was behind budget by \$2,665 and Unspecified Offerings by \$1,141. Current Year Pledges were \$9,038 ahead of the budgeted amount. Income from the Parish House was \$1,598 ahead of budget and that from Other Facilities was \$2,650 under budget for a total shortfall of \$1,052. Special Contributions for General Purposes were \$3,910 less than the budgeted amount and Special Fundraising also was under budget by \$3,741.

Expense: Major contributors to the November 30, 2017 Expense results were the following: Property: Year to date Property expenses were \$15,344 under budget due primarily to less than budgeted payments for gas (\$3,544), electricity (\$2,277), general maintenance and repair (\$8,492), maintenance supplies (\$1,761) and insurance (\$1,727). Personnel: Personnel expenses through November were \$2,297 under budget reflecting less than budgeted amounts paid for Clergy and Lay Pensions and for Lay Life & Health Insurance. Of the remaining expense categories five were under budget and five were over, the net amount being \$2,537 less than budget.



From the Organist & Choirmaster

ear Parishioners,
Progress on the organ project continues at Hartford's Austin Organs, Inc. Below is a list of what's been done and what still needs to be done. I am very happy to show anyone the inner workings of the organ, especially while the pipes are safely removed during the renovation. Please flag me down after church, and I'll give you a tour!


Since removing the organ, workers and technicians have:

- 1. Stripped the console (from which the organist plays) of all analog electronics.
- 2. In consultation with me, designed the new custom digital control system and ordered it from Solid State Logic, Inc.
- 3. Refinished the console cabinetry.
- 4. Sent keyboards to specialist for refurbishment and repair. Ivory keyboard tops are lightly sanded down to remove the indentations caused by 60 years of practice and performance.
- 5. Ordered replacement pipes, some of which are being built at the Austin factory.
- 6. Cleaned and repaired most of the nearly 4000 original pipes. Workers use an ultrasonic cleaner to remove dirt and dust from metal pipes. Workers also use rags to remove heavy dirt. Within the pies, reed pipe specialist Sam Hughes removed the shallots, tongues, weights and sliders from each reed pipe, individually cleaning and repairing them to original condition.
- 7. The Great foundation stops and Swell chorus reeds (trumpets and oboe) are in the process of being re-voiced to sound richer and less abrasive.
- 8. Re-actioning that is, the replacement of every pneumatic control device underneath the pipes is completed.
- 9. Electronic relays, which bring the instant electronic signals created from the keyboards, have been manufactured and await installation.


To be completed:

- 1. Reassembly of the organ console, including installation of the new digital control system.
- 2. Installation of new relay system.
- 3. Shipment of remaining parts and pipes to Austin factory for modification and installation.
- 4. Re-installation and voicing of pipes at St. James's. This process will take two to three weeks
- 5. Replacement of Swell and Choir shade motors These shades open and close to let more or less sound out of the enclosed divisions of pipes. This is the only mechanism with which an organist can control how loud or soft an individual pipe speaks to the listener. Prior to this project, the shades didn't fully close or open, limiting expressive range.

An organ project like ours is similar to a building renovation. Progress is measured in steps and phases, and each component of the project is interrelated. As we get closer to the re-installation of our organ this winter, I want to express my gratitude to everyone who contributed to the campaign, making this and the other improvements to our church facilities possible!

S I write this newsletter, I am sitting in a physics class at Hall High School. I know that may seem like a weird place to be writing a newsletter article, but with my wacky schedule these days, I fit things in when I can. The thought for the day today at Hall High School is: "Life is a balance of holding on and letting go," by Rumi, a thirteenth century Sunni Muslim Poet. I am not sure that I would have really understood this idea when I was in high school, but now as I approach my midfifties, I understand this balance all too well.

Most people I know these days, seem to be grappling with this balance. I have friends who are dealing with being empty-nesters—not sure how to deal with the idea that their children are grown and don't need them in the way they did when they were children. I have friends dealing with career challenges, realizing that some of their career goals might go unmet. I have friends accepting the fact that their bodies are not what they used to be. There might be a few more wrinkles and sags where there used to be smooth skin. There are hundreds of more examples of people I know trying to find this balance. One thing I know for sure, balance can be hard to achieve or even impossible, without help and support.

That is where we as a Christian community come in. As we come to grips with our own humanity, our faults and our flaws, the church is here. We are here to listen. We are here to pray with you. We are here to sing with you and we are here to love you, just as you are and just where you are, right now. However broken or unbalanced you think you are, we are here.

As Newton's third law says, for every action there is an equal and opposite reaction. (Remember I am in high school Physics.) We at St. James's are the

counterbalance. When you are stressed by all that life throws at you, come to church. Sit in the pews. Listen to a sermon. Sing a song. Pray. Make some sandwiches. Being a part of this community can give you the balance that you are seeking. Rumi and Newton were both right. It is all about balance.

"Life is a balance of holding on and letting go." As you face the challenges of January and February in cold New England, remember that we are here at St. James's. We are here as a strong worshipping community, helping each other to live the lives we are each called to as followers of the Living God. As we all know, January in Connecticut is challenging. It is cold. There are those post-holiday blahs. It can be a time of feeling isolated and alone. Just remember you are not alone. We are here! Let go of the cold hard stresses of life. Hold on to the warm, welcoming love of this beautiful community.




Mardi Gras Celebration Saturday, February 10

What I Get From Celtic Worship By Tom Neal

his past summer when Molly Louden asked me if I would be interested in joining a group of folks from St James's, St. John's, (and beyond), to help put together a Celtic Liturgy, I was fascinated but also a little perplexed. What could I, a Doubting Thomas with a sometimes tenuous hold on my faith, add to this process (and why did we need any more accolades laid at the feet of Larry Bird?) I was vaguely aware that Molly and Susan Pinkerton had gone on a trip to Iona, an island off the coast of Scotland (not Ireland as I figured at first) to study a kind of spirituality that dated back to before the Romans came to the British Isles. To me it conjured druids, sprites, Fairport Convention, animal skins, The Wickerman, even paganism.

What I found was a group of dedicated and thoughtful people who were looking for a spiritual connection to something deeper than the every day. We all speak about looking for more spiritual connection. Just a few weeks ago Bob Hooper preached on making the time of Advent a time for reconnection to the spirit inside us, and I feel that Celtic Worship offers a real avenue to jumpstart this very search.

Together, our little group has worked with love and careful consideration to fashion a still evolving combination of poetry, music, liturgy, chanting, healing, blessing, and silence. Our services have a theme related to the time of season and the traditional church calendar (this month it was Gratitude, on January 7 it will be Pilgrimage). Much of the inspiration and guidance in what we do comes from the natural world around us and the sacred female in all of us.

Although our service begins at 4:30pm, around 4:15 we begin with live acoustic music as we set up the church with a table of Celtic Saints (sorry no Larry, but I think Bill Russell may qualify one day), one for healing, and one for anyone to write a prayer, light a candle, or hold a prayer stone. The music has a soothing effect and is often of the many wonderful folk traditions throughout the British Isles, Appalachia or the Deep South, and beyond. This is followed by an extended silence, a time to cool down, turn off what's in your head or in your pocket, and reflect. The service itself involves poetry, music, a reflection, and chanting from any and all disciplines and

cultures. On any given Sunday you might hear something from a Native American blessing, a poem by E.E. Cummings, as well as the New Testament. The chants are uplifting and create a feeling of peace, connectedness, and well-being.

So as you can probably tell, I really like this stuff. And rather than replace "Sunday Morning Church," it has only served to amplify and deepen my connection to God and the Holy Spirit. It has been a long, strange trip to find myself involved on "the inside" of "making liturgy," but it has also given me a deep closeness to God that I, and I think many of us, struggle to connect with during our busy, over scheduled, hyper-booked lives.

I invite you to check out Celtic Worship and see if it could be something that deepens your connection to God and to yourself. Services are the first Sunday of each month at 4:30pm at St. John's Episcopal Church in West Hartford.
