Dear Friends,



From the Lay-Curate

In the Cozy Mid-Winter

MID-WINTER is one of those things that plenty of us like but no one can admit to liking. I am firmly in the pro-winter camp. There is nothing better than coziness and the blissful blanket of quiet that comes after a snowstorm. And being centered is much easier with the pressures of the holidays behind us — the perfect time for an Epiphany!

Speaking of revelations, did you know that The Episcopal Church has its own official dictionary? Of course we do. Here's how An Episcopal Dictionary of the Church: A User-Friendly Reference for Episcopalians defines Epiphany season:

A season of four to nine weeks, from the Feast of the Epiphany (Jan. 6) through the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday. The length of the season varies according to the date of Easter. The gospel stories of this season describe various events that manifest the divinity of Jesus. The coming of the Magi is celebrated on the Epiphany. The Baptism of our Lord is observed on the Sunday after Epiphany. The gospels for the other Sundays of the Epiphany season describe the wedding at Cana, the calling of the disciples, and various miracles and teachings of Jesus. The Last Sunday after the Epiphany is always devoted to the Transfiguration. Jesus' identity as the Son of God is dramatically revealed in the Transfiguration gospel, as well as the gospel of the baptism of Christ. We are called to respond to Christ in faith through the showings of his divinity recorded in the gospels of the Epiphany season.

This year, Epiphany season runs from January 6 until February 27. That's a good chunk of time, and I'd encourage you to think about how you might use that time to encounter Jesus anew. After all, there is a reason we celebrate Epiphany every year: encountering the divine identity and miraculous reality of Jesus is an ongoing process. Many Epiphany-appropriate devotional resources exist — feel free to reach out if you'd like some suggestions.


Epiphany season is also the ideal time to renew and reconnect with our ancient and particular Christian tradition. In that spirit, I will be offering an adult formation series exploring the past, present, and future of The Episcopal Church over the course of three Sundays in January and February — specific dates and times to be announced shortly. If you have any burning questions — or questions that have been in the back of your mind for ages — please let me know so that we can address them during the series. It will be a fun and slightly meandering affair, covering topics from Transubstantiation to the origins of liturgical colors. The more ideas for us to discuss, the better!

Lastly, on a personal note, I'd like to express my deep gratitude for the warm welcome I have received since arriving at St. James's in September. This is a tremendous place, and I am very glad to be here.

Treasurer's Report / January—November 2021

Current Position: Through November, the Church's 2021 finances were positive vis a vis the budget. Total Income for that period was \$1,852 greater than the budgeted amount and expenses were \$27,451 less than budget. As a result, the Church's net financial position at the end of November 2021 was a positive variance to budget of \$29,293.

Income & Expense Summary:

Income: For the first eleven months of 2021 Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) in total were \$352 more than budget. Current Year Pledges were \$1,809 less than the budget amount but Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings totaled \$2,161 more than budget. Income from outside groups using the Parish Facilities was \$240 less than the amount budgeted. Special Contributions were \$5,642 over budget.

Expense: Major contributors to the January – November expense results were the following: Property: Total Property expenses for the period were \$793 over budget. Personnel: Personnel expenses were \$22,775 under budget for the period primarily reflecting changes in both the clerical and lay staffs.

Of the remaining expense categories, five were over budget and five were under, the net amount being \$5,469 under budget.

On Sunday, December 19, we had a successful evening of caroling around the Walden Street neighborhood. Every time I go caroling with people from St. James, I am struck by how





Advent Celebrations at St. James's!



WE found new ways to celebrate Advent this year with a series of outdoor events to bring parishioners of all ages together safely and share our joy with the community. The festivities began with our first Nativity Walk on Thursday, December 2. The event was organized by Priscilla Hooper as an alternative to our traditional indoor pageant on Christmas Eve, and coincided with the annual Holiday Stroll in West Hartford Center.

More than 40 children participated in four nativity scenes staged on church grounds, with guides ushering about 150 visitors through each one and explaining its significance.

THE following Sunday, December 5, the Rev. Canon John Mitman revived an activity introduced during his time as rector at St. James's for the Second Sunday in Advent. Instead of giving a sermon from the pulpit at the 9:30 service, he took a chair at the foot of the altar and invited children in the congregation to participate in a manger craft to prepare for the arrival of the baby Jesus. Here he is explaining the contents of the manger craft kits with Hunter, Lara and Bowden Swales—with a little help from Bob. John and Ruth Mitman placed a bit of straw and a construction paper crib in bags and asked the children to put one piece of straw in the manger each time they were kind or did a good deed.

THEIR mom, Heather Swales, said the kids were trying all afternoon to do things to allow them to put in extra straw. They commented several times that it was, “very special” to be at church Sunday and sit with the priest. Sunday night, after they made the mangers, Bowden said, “I’m going to try to do kind things without being asked, like picking up toys and putting my dishes away.” On Monday, Lara asked if her mom thought the, “baby Jesus comes only if there is enough straw in the manger or if he will come anyway just because it’s Christmas?” “What do you think?”, Heather said, to which Lara replied, “Maybe I should try hard to put straw in every day, just in case.”



OUR final Advent celebration event was held on Sunday, December 19. Members of the congregation gathered for some caroling in the St. James’s neighborhood, followed by some hot chocolate back at church to cap off the night.


