

From the Rector's Desk

Dear Members of the St. James's Community,

As hopefully you all know St. James's new(ish) assistant rector, The Rev. Joe Rose, will be ordained to the priesthood 6:30pm on Tuesday, January 31 by our new bishop, The Rt. Rev. Jeff Mello. Everyone is invited to attend, and we hope that you will and bring the kids. There will be a reception afterwards. Helping Joe plan his ordination and to be a part of his journey these past few months has made me somewhat reflective of not only my own ordination but the path that God has led me on ever since.

Many of you know my journey before ordination: lifelong Episcopalian turned stockbroker turned priest. With my family being at the core of my life as well as a deeply held understanding of the power of the incarnation and God's Grace.

When I first started thinking about reflecting with you all on my ordination, I first thought I would write about the day itself. Nothing went as planned. It was January 1995 and Northern Virginia, where we lived, received 30 inches of snow in 24 hours. Washington D.C. shut down, as were all the airports and train stations. A friend of mine remarked that she knew hell would freeze over before I got ordained – and it did. The service was postponed for two days and several good friends who had planned to attend were never able to make it.

While a funny story (now) not at all that important in my life and ministry over the years.

What is important is the work that I have been a part of and the wonderful people I have done it with along the way. Priscilla and I have made lifelong friends we now consider family. You/They have walked with us in some of the darkest moments (such as the loss of our mothers) and during the most joyous (such as the birth of our children and our granddaughter). We have grieved together as we have walked with you in your dark moments and celebrated at the peaks. During it all, God's presence has been fully known.

I try to remind the newly ordained that this life is full of surprises and God's Grace will lead you through. It's not just the people but the experiences. I have had the opportunity to travel to distant lands experiencing God at work: from medical missions in Haiti; to the Caribbean and South America with high schoolers doing God's work and exploring how they can make a difference; to walking days on end across Spain meeting and seeing the diversity of God's creation. And many more life-changing experiences and opportunities here at home.

God, my family, and you have formed me into the priest that I am becoming as well as the father, the husband, the friend and the man that I am. My priesthood and my ability to know God in the work that I get to do and the people who do it with me is a privilege that I hope to never take for granted.

From the Assistant Rector

EAR St. James's Family,

As we journey together from the Christmas season into Epiphanytide and Lent in the coming weeks, I wanted to share a daily prayer practice that keeps me grounded in gratitude.

Every morning, when I wake up, I say these words before my feet hit the floor next to my bed: "I love you, God." When I recently shared this little tradition with Jeffrey Mello, Connecticut's new bishop diocesan, he asked me if I ever heard God respond. Frankly, it caught me off-guard. I held and pondered the bishop's question through Advent. Have I heard God respond to my daily proclamation of love? Well, yes. Yes, in so many ways.

This is a topic that I will explore on a deeper level with Alan Murchie during our upcoming Lenten coffee-hour series on C.S. Lewis' book "The Four Loves." But I would also like to take this opportunity to let you know that I have found God's answer in community with all of you since Heidi and I arrived in September.

I hear God's answer in the work, prayer, fellowship, imagination, and faithful commitment to discipleship at St. James's. I hear it in the glorious unison of the choir. I heard it in the life-giving cacophony of children dressed as shepherds and stable animals during the outdoor nativity walk in December. I have heard it in the rustling of bread bags while we make sandwiches for Loaves and Fishes after church. I think I've even heard it in the rumble and sigh of our disobedient furnace. It's hard to put God's answer to me into words. It's ineffable. It is part of the peace that Paul writes about in Philippians 4 -- a peace that "surpasses all understanding."

As I prepare for my ordination to the priesthood on January 31 and continue to serve as your assistant rector, I am reminded of how God's love for me – and for all of us -- is abundant. I am seriously in a place of great joy.

In divine love, I hear God reply: Follow Jesus in joy. Serve in joy. Be stubborn and steadfast with that joy. Bottle it up! In fact, Bishop Mello's question to me inspired the scripture readings that I chose for my ordination service. Philippians 4:49 will be part of the night. This passage points us, as followers of Christ and keepers of the light, to be mindful that the sorrows and troubles of this broken world aren't the final word. It urges us to interpret both happy times and dark times by the light of God's kingdom. In fact, we are called to practice joy as an act of defiance.

In Paul's prison epistle to the Philippians, his joyful words, inked amidst brutal hardship, are an invitation to see not only our triumphs and celebrations but our struggles and sacrifices as participating in the bigger story of Jesus.

It's helpful to know Paul's story. Much of the apostle's ministry was a lesson in affliction. Paul was shipwrecked, beaten, snake-bitten, hunted by assassins and frequently jailed for long periods. The church in Philippi was the first Jesus community that Paul started in Eastern Europe. Filled with retired soldiers, Philippi was a Roman colony where patriotic nationalism was rampant, making life hard for people trying to be faithful to the way of Jesus. Being in a Roman prison was no picnic, but Paul thanks his supporters in Philippi for their support. All things considered, he seems to be in a pretty good mood about his situation and calls on the Philippians to rejoice with him in his adversity. The words "joy," "rejoice," and "be glad" appear a combined sixteen times in the short letter. Paul isn't encouraging Christians to throw a party in response to suffering and hardship. Rather, he is imploring us not to surrender our joy to fear and cynicism.

Paul's letter invites us to focus on what is true and life-giving – to keep a faith that gives us, as individuals and as a community, the ability to see beauty and hope in any circumstance.

Looking around, walking with you, I see beauty and hope in so many places at St. James's. You may not realize it, but I see and hear a church family constantly saying, "I love you, God."

Over the next two months, I encourage you to open your ears and your heart to hear God's response. I pray that it brings you a joy that is hard to put into words.

From the Associate for Education & Music

The Extraordinary Spiritual Riches of "Year A"

TS name is rather ordinary and prosaic — Lectionary Year A, we've deemed it — yet the riches it holds are anything but. Named "Year A" because it is the first in a sequence of three year-long cycles of scripture readings for Sunday mornings, the year we've just entered will offer us lots of Matthew and just a bit of Luke alongside many of John's most poignant vignettes. It's a year that will bring us the visit of the Magi; the Sermon on the Mount; Jesus's poignant encounters with Nicodemus, the man born blind, and the unnamed Samaritan Woman; the raising of Lazarus; a mystical encounter between Jesus and two disciples along the road to Emmaus; and more. Here's what we can look forward to in the coming months:

+It's a Matthew year.

Years A, B & C follow a simple pattern: We read Matthew in Year A, Mark in B and Luke in C. All have a bit of John sprinkled in. Until next December, therefore, we'll be hearing a lot from Matthew. What shall we expect from this vivid, passionate and eloquent evangelist whose gospel was known for centuries as the church's most prized?

beautiful and challenging teachings

Matthew appears to have structured his gospel in five "books" of teaching, perhaps suggesting a new Torah to stand alongside (though not replace — Matthew is clear about that) the older one. It's in Matthew that we are exhorted by Jesus, for example, to offer the other cheek in response to being struck, to give up our possessions, and to love our enemies. Expect to hear Jesus reinterpret the law for a new age, the Kingdom age that has arrived with and in him: a long-promised realm of true justice, mercy, and peace. Jesus calls us into this kingdom reality.

a profound meditation on power

At its heart, Matthew is about power: from the very beginning, we watch as, for example, Herod's self-serving human power is vividly juxtaposed with the divine power that inspires Joseph to put aside his own needs and anxieties in service of God's loving and love-giving vision for the world.

a new family

It's not the expected elite, but a band of Zoroastrian stargazers who make it to Jesus's bedside as Matthew's gospel open. That's a lovely story, but, much more profoundly, the "three kings" point to the new family we see built in Matthew — a family with no limits, into which we are all known as God's beloved.

Iots of symbolism

Matthew will puzzle us at times. Why, for example, does he present his genealogy of Jesus in three sets of fourteen generations? Well, as it turns out, fourteen is a potent symbol of David in Jewish thought (D+V+D = 14). And why are twelve prophecies fulfilled? For Matthew, that's one for each tribe of Israel, or perhaps for each disciple. What's critical for us here is to see the heart of Matthew's project: He is connecting our past to our present and future. God's eternal promises live on; the promised Messiah has come! A new reign of peace, justice, truth and love has begun.

[†]And it's also peppered with glorious moments from John.

•The designers of Year A knew we'd need a break from the ever-intense Matthew from time to time. And so we anticipate several glorious weeks with John: Lent this year will be filled with his deeply-moving quest stories, vignettes in which Jesus brings interlocutors to enlightenment, to life in the Spirit, and to, as he puts it, the "eternity" of knowing and abiding Jesus.

I look forward to sharing this adventure with you!



Treasurer's Report: January—November 2022

Summary of Current Position: The church ended November with a deficit relative to budget of more than \$8,400, a significant improvement from the \$32,000 deficit position as of the end of October. An increase in pledge payments during the month as well as a successful (and fun!) fundraising auction improved the income component. Expenses continue to be a challenge, especially for property related items.

Income: Year-to-date (YTD) actual income is \$23,667 above budget (or 3.0% above budget). At the end of October, income was 1.1% below budget. The following components impacted the income position through the end of November: Regular Contributions (Current-Year Pledges, Prior-Year Pledges, Seasonal Offerings and Unspecified Offerings) are \$7,064 above their \$524,869 budget (or 1.3% above budget, an improvement from last month when contributions were 2.9% below budget). Current-Year Pledges, the largest item in this category are \$10,400 above budget. At the end of October, Current Year Pledges were \$10,500 below budget. **Special Contributions:** The Special Contributions, General Purposes category primarily contains contributions from the rector's annual appeal. This category exceeds its budget by \$3,800.

Expense: YTD expenses are currently \$32,085, or 4.1%, above budget. As of the end of October, expenses were 3.4% above budget. The Property expense category continues to be the greatest challenge: Property: Currently \$24,660 above its \$111,463 budget. At the end of October, Property exceeded its budget by \$19,170. Gas expenses are more than \$9,000 higher than budgeted and Electricity is \$2,500 higher than budgeted. General Maintenance is \$6,000 higher than budgeted and is being reviewed. Administration: \$4,400 above its budget due to office supplies, telephones, and the annual audit.
