EAR St. James's,


I am excited to share an incredible opportunity for our church community to engage in a transformative experience for the young students within our community. Our mission trip to Ecuador will run from June 27th to July 5th and we will be in partnership with Partners for Andean Community Health (PACH). This trip is designed for students entering 9th-12th grades, though we welcome students in the summer before their first year of college as well. We have designed the experience to offer a unique blend of volunteer work, cultural immersion, and adventure.

PACH is an organization that St. James's has worked with in the past. They have done truly excellent work supporting long-term sustainable health care initiatives for the Andean community. Our students will support their mobile medical caravans working alongside local healthcare professionals to provide essential medical services such as visual acuity exams and patient intake. We will also support the various community projects that address local needs, providing educational support and aiding local construction efforts. We will also have the opportunity to interact with local families and students fostering friendship, community, and cross-cultural understanding.

In addition to this work, we will have the opportunity to explore the Ecuadorian countryside and culture. This includes a guided tour of historic Quito and the "Mitad del Mundo" museum. We will explore the famous waterfalls of Ecuador and zipline above the jungle rivers. Students will also have the opportunity to horseback ride on the slopes of Volcano Cotopaxi.

Now that we are in the new year, we will be forming our team and engaging the wider St. James's community with fun and engaging fundraising opportunities to cover the cost of the trip. We are currently working with PACH and the airlines to get the best price available for our travel. The cost will include airfare, private ground transportation, lodging, all meals, and the bi-lingual guide for our group. There is limited space on our team, but you can help us by getting the word out as we invite our young friends and their parents to consider making a commitment to join us. Once our team is formed we will work together to offer useful fundraising projects to help us achieve our goals. Please help us engage this team of students with useful fundraising projects that can help get us across the finish line!

This mission trip will enrich the lives of those we serve, but it will also cultivate leadership skills and cultural competence among our youth. Most importantly, there is no better way to be formed in our faith than through acts of love and service. Please join us, in whatever way you can, on this important mission of love and service in the name of Christ.

APPY New Year! I can't believe that we are in January 2025. That just sounds crazy. As we look to the New Year, we have so many wonderful events coming up.

Mondays Music & More (3Ms) will return on January 6 after a Christmas break. 3Ms has grown and now has 19 children between three and third grade most Monday evenings. I love this program and love that the children are learning Bible stories and beautiful music every Monday, plus we get the joy of hearing them sing in church, which is amazing! I truly love working with Michelle Horsley and Lou Strillacci in this incredible ministry! 3Ms will not meet on Martin Luther King Day, January 20 or President's Day, February 17.

Youth Group will start with the always popular Commando Church on Sunday, January 5 from 5:00 to 6:30. This is a great game that the kids always enjoy playing and it is finally dark enough. Join us for dinner and the game. Wear black or dark clothes and bring your friends. I am happy to report that our youth group is growing each month. In November, we invited the fifth graders to join the group and they are adding a lot of energy to the evening. Thank you to all the parents who encourage their children to join us at youth group. Making those friendships is key to a successful confirmation program and mission trip in the future. Most of us are much more likely to get involved in something if we have friends involved.

As we head into 2025, I am excited by all the energy at St. James's. I hope and pray that most of you will take advantage of the incredible opportunities for you and your children. During Kids for Christ (KFC) we will be studying a mixture of Old and New Testament lessons because Lent starts late this year with Ash Wednesday not until March 5.

As I have said before, I see my job as the Director of Family Ministries as twofold: First, I see my job as helping the children of this parish develop their spiritual lives. This involves helping them to have some useful tools in their spiritual toolbox. Included in these toolboxes are things like the Lord's Prayer, knowing how to say a prayer of thanksgiving and forgiveness.

The second part of my job is the education part. I try to teach the children the basic stories of the Bible, so that when they see these themes in literature, they will recognize them. That is where you parents and grandparents come in. One of my favorites is The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe, by C.S Lewis. When Bob and I read this to our son, Robby, when he was in kindergarten, he proudly proclaimed, "Aslan is Jesus!" These types of connections with the Bible can help them to see the relevance of the Bible in their lives and help them to be better students.

So, in these weeks of thinking about New Year's resolutions, I would like to suggest one to consider: As parents, let's try to help our children to build up those "Spiritual Toolboxes." Let's work with them to grow to be spiritually mature young people who have a basic knowledge of Bible stories. How can that be done? One way is to come to church and Sunday school with your children. Then, to go home and talk with them about what you learned. Make church a priority for you and your children. You will be glad you did.

From the Organist & Director of Music

Why We Sing

"It is not you that sings, it is the church that is singing, and you, as a member ... may share in its song. Thus all singing together that is right must serve to widen our spiritual horizon, make us see our little company as a member of the great Christian church on earth, and help us willingly and gladly join our singing, be it feeble or good, to the song of the church."

(Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Life Together)

As the year wraps up and another begins, I find myself reflecting again on why we do what we do. What is it about these tunes that have made them the chosen soundtracks of our faith and why is the simple, communal singing of them so absolutely integral? Certainly, for as long as people have worshipped in churches, they have sung. In our psalmody and hymns, we find the faithful, throughout generations, singing their prayers. In the best of times and the worst of times, with a voice however strong or timid, in our singing we connect to our faith stories and to those who wrote the songs. Perhaps you are already familiar with some of them.

Eternal Father, Strong to Save was written by William Whiting in 1860, after nearly dying during a fateful storm at sea. He had no idea that his tune would later be adapted as the Royal Navy Hymn and sung by countless military personnel. Nearly 100 years later, after the assassination of John F. Kennedy, this was the funeral hymn chosen to be sung by a nation in mourning.

Robert Pattinson, a young boy in the mid 1700's who struggled with alcoholism and gambling after his father died, stumbled into a church one day and was so inspired by a sermon that he wrote the hymn, *Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing*, later dedicating the rest of his life to ministry. *Amazing Grace* was composed by John Newton after a storm nearly sank the slave-trading ship on which he worked. He experienced a spiritual conversion and turned from slave-trader to early abolitionist and pastor. The tune *Abide With Me* came to Henry Francis Lyte, an Anglican minister of the early 1800's, on his deathbed as tuberculosis was claiming his life.


Our African-American siblings kept their fortitude despite unimaginable horrors by singing spirituals together, at times bloodied and barefoot. ("My Lord, What a Mourning when the stars begin to fall.") Joan Baez led a crowd of 300,000 in a massive chorus of We Shall Overcome during a 1963 civil rights march in Washington. And of course, in his last sermon, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. recited the words from this same hymn. ("Deep in my heart, I do believe. We shall overcome someday.") As women fought for their voting rights, suffragettes adapted the hymn Onward Christian Soldiers to the text "Forward, sister women! ... Bondage is behind you; freedom is before!" In 1912, as the Titanic was sinking and thousands of people were looking into the vast ocean, awaiting their deaths, what did they do? They sang a hymn. ("Nearer, My God, to Thee ... Still all my song shall be nearer, my God, to Thee.")

Our songs of faith also express our most ecstatic joy! The Christmas season is particularly filled with exclamations of "Hark!," tuneful melismas of "Gloria," and calls to repeat the "sounding joy." We often sing these songs loudly, raising whatever voice we have to join the chorus of the faithful. Consider the tune *Engelberg*, which is often set to the following lyrics:

"When in our music God is glorified; and adoration leaves no room for pride, it is as though the whole creation cried, Alleluia!"

The whole creation. That means *all of us*. God challenges us to speak up and to sing out. In times of joy and in times of trouble, we sing on. ("My heart is steadfast, O God; my heart is steadfast. I will sing and make melody. Awake, my soul! Awake, O harp and lyre! I will awake the dawn" Psalm 57:7-8 NRSV).

Psalm 100 opens with, "Make a joyful noise unto the Lord, all ye lands!" While it's certainly my job to be concerned with the quality of music, my friends also like to remind me of this specific wording in the Bible. It does not say, "make a pretty noise to the Lord," nor does it instruct us to make a trained noise to the Lord. We are simply tasked, invited, and challenged to show up and sing out - together.

O be joyful in the Lord all ye lands; serve the Lord with gladness and come before his presence with a song. Psalm 100:1 As we enter this new year with infinite unknowns about our country, state, and our personal lives, I believe God challenges us again to respond in song. Regardless of where you are on this journey or what your relationship is like with the music that lives inside of you, perhaps we can answer like Mary with openness of spirit and shouts of exaltation - with souls that *magnify* God.

I feel exceptionally lucky for these past few months at St. James's and I feel deeply excited about the future of our music ministry, from our children's choir and choristers to the adult choir and the myriad of special programming throughout the year in addition to our weekly offerings. It is a tremendous honor to be part of this community that is so welcoming, generous, and mission-focused. And each Sunday I am amazed by the sound I hear - our collective joyful noise - when the first verse of the first hymn begins and the swell of our voices unite for the first time each week. When I'm alone in the sanctuary, I can still hear remnants of that sound. Perhaps it's the wind. Perhaps it's the voices in my head. (There are many.) Or perhaps it's God, gently encouraging. I hear your joyful noise, my children. Sing out. I'll be upstairs at the organ console, hoping you do.



Treasurer's Report: January—November

Summary of Current Position:

Through November, the church is short of its budget by \$33,505, an improvement from the \$70,300 shortfall through the end of October. Income and expenses both contributed to the shortfall as income is \$31,946 below budget, due to lower than projected pledge payments. Expenses are \$1,559 above budget due to higher than projected property and personnel expenses.

Income: Year-to-Date (YTD) actual income is \$31,946 below budget (or 3.7% below budget). As of the end of October, income was \$60,000 or 7.6%, below budget. The following components impacted the income position through the end of November: Regular Contributions (Current-Year Pledges, Prior-Year Pledges, Seasonal Offerings and Unspecified Offerings) ended the month \$47,981 below their \$579,852 budget, or 8.3% below budget. At the end of October, Regular Contributions were \$65,100 (or 12.1%) below budget. Most of the shortfall in Regular Contributions is due to Current Year Pledges which are \$38,863 below budget (or 7.0% below budget), an improvement from last month's \$56,000 shortfall (10.9% below budget). Contribution statements were sent on December 8 and that will hopefully close the gap between pledges and contributions made. Facilities Income: Finished the month \$2,803 above budget, about \$700 higher than last month's variance. The variances each month are due in part to the timing of payments received. Special Contributions, General Purposes: The primary component in this category is the Rector's Appeal contributions. At the end of November, actual receipts were \$5,025 higher than projected, a reduction from October's overage of \$6,800. This variance has decreased each month and is expected to decline during December.

Expense: YTD expenses are \$1,559, or 0.2%, above budget. As of end of October, expenses were \$10,600, or 1.3%, higher than budgeted. A few key expense categories in terms of their contribution to the overall variance through the end of November are: Property: \$4,375 over budget, an deterioration from last month's overage of \$2,840. with Gas and Electric continuing to be more than \$11,700 above budget. At the end of October, Gas and Electric were \$10,000 over budget. Personnel: \$10,500 over budget. At the end of October, Personnel was \$9,030 above budget. Components of the personnel expenses are being reviewed.




Martin Luther King Forum followed by a Day of Service
