From the Organist & Director of Music


EAR siblings in Christ, It has been a very full fall season in the music ministry of St. James's! In August, members of our adult choir were invited to be part of the Albert Schweitzer Organ Festival at Trinity College, alongside Chorus Angelicus, Gaudeamus, St. Joseph Cathedral Schola, and the Trinity College Chapel Singers in a large concert that culminated in the performance of Bernstein's magnificent Chichester Psalms. Then, in October we hosted renowned British a cappella octet VOCES8 and welcomed a sold-out audience of 500 to see their concert. The month closed out with the wacky, family-friendly Halloween musical spectacle that is PipeScreams, which brought many organists and organ enthusiasts from all over to our church. Then, in November we premiered an insane original musical called Theoretta & the Dissonants, presented by the children and youth of the church in collaboration with an adult choir "antsemble," 4-piece band, costumes, theater lighting, staging, choreography, guest coaching and special appearances. The entire show is now on Youtube (search: Theoretta & the Dissonants - I promise you, there's only one out there!). The event transformed the Parish Hall into a theatre, which was packed to standing-room only with extended family members, neighbors, and a considerable number of music educators from all over the state. I could not possibly be more proud of how well the kids did and how much we all learned in the process.

Most recently, our adult choir presented O Radiant Dawn, a Lessons & Carols style Christmas music offering featuring a chamber orchestra (string quartet, two oboists, & organ/harpsichord) performing selections from Bach's Cantata No. 62 in addition to other Baroque works by Buxtehude and Handel along with pieces by McDowell, Tavener, MacMillan, Vaughan Williams, and a new work by local organist extraordinaire, Christopher Houlihan. And by the time this article is in your hands, we will have done our Christmas Eve service - the traditional afternoon pageant, led by the children/youth of the church, followed by a late-night candlelight service featuring the adult choir along with several vocal/instrumental guests, including Sam Moffett on various woodwind instruments (saxophone, clarinet, flute, piccolo, oboe) and John Kramer on violin.

January will be the first month without at least one large-scale parish music event, but we will be using it to prepare for two exciting programs on back-to-back weekends in February. On Sunday, February 8th at 7:00pm we will be presenting a unique musical offering called Let There Be Light in collaboration with an Emmy Award-winning filmmaker and digital projection artist. This program is made possible by a grant we were awarded this past May by the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving via the Greater Hartford Chapter of the American Guild of Organists. In a similar concept to Lessons & Carols programs, we will be presenting readings about each of the 7 days of creation, as written in the Bible, with corresponding musical works. This will all be presented in a darkened sanctuary, which will be gradually illuminated with original animated visual projections on the ceiling to depict each day of creation (the heavens, the animals, the oceans, etc.) This is certainly something that has never been done before at St. James's (or anywhere that we know of!). Don't miss it! Then, in a much more traditional vein, our adult choir is collaborating with the adult choir of St. John's Episcopal Church (West Hartford) for a joint Evensong program, hosted offsite at St. John's - Sunday, February 15th at 5:00pm. These services are always so musically rich and an important part of our Episcopal music traditions. Please come!

As always, thank you for being part of this wonderful community and for your support of the music ministry here at St. James's. Blessings abound!

any years ago, when I was a substitute with the West Hartford Public Schools, I wrote my newsletter sitting in a Physics Class at Hall High School. I know that may seem like a weird place to be writing a newsletter article, but back then I fit things in when I could. The thought for the day that day at Hall was: "Life is a balance of holding on and letting go," by Rumi, a thirteenth century Sunni Muslim Poet. I am not sure that I would have really understood this idea when I was in high school, but I remember thinking then in my mid-fifties that I knew that to be very true. Now, at almost 62, it rings true still.

Most people I know these days seem to be grappling with this balance. I have friends who are dealing with being empty-nesters—not sure how to deal with the idea that their children are grown and don't need them in the way they did when they were children. I have friends dealing with career challenges, realizing that some of their career goals might go unmet. I have friends accepting the fact that their bodies are not what they used to be. There might be a few more wrinkles and sags where there used to be smooth skin. There are hundreds of more examples of people I know trying to find this balance. One thing I know for sure, balance can be hard to achieve or even impossible without help and support.


That is where we as a Christian community come in. As we come to grips with our own humanity, our faults and our flaws, the church is here. We are here to listen. We are here to pray with you. We are here to sing with you and we are here to love you, just as you are and just where you are, right now. However broken or unbalanced you think you are, we are here.

As Newton's third law says, for every action there is an equal and opposite reaction. (Remember I was in high school Physics.) We at St. James's are the counterbalance. When you are stressed by all that life throws at you, come to church. Sit in the pews. Listen to a sermon. Sing a song. Pray. Make some sandwiches. Being a part of this community can give you the balance that you are seeking. Rumi and Newton were both right. It is all about balance.

"Life is a balance of holding on and letting go." As you face the challenges of January and February in cold New England, remember that we are here at St. James's. We are here as a strong worshipping community, helping each other to live the lives we are each called to as followers of the Living God. As we all know, January in Connecticut is challenging. It is cold. There are those post-holiday blahs. It can be a time of feeling isolated and alone. Just remember you are not alone. We are here! Let go of the cold hard stresses of life. Hold on to the warm, welcoming love of this beautiful community.






The Star that Led to the King

Treasurer's Report / January—November 2025

Summary of Current Position:

Through the end of November, the church had a deficit relative to budget of \$35,933. At the end of October, the church had a deficit of \$38,905. The improvement in the YTD variance is due to continued improvement in the expenses relative to budget. As of the end of October, income was \$40,100 less

than budget but ended November \$46,955 below budget. Lower than projected pledge payments are the primary contributor to the income shortfall. Expenses were \$1,200 less than budget as of the end of October and ended November \$11,022 lower than budget.

Income: Year-to-Date (YTD) actual income is \$46,955 below budget (or 5.4% below budget). As of the end of October, income was \$40,100, or 4.9%, below budget. The following components impacted the income position through the end of November: Regular Contributions (Current-Year Pledges, Prior-Year Pledges, Seasonal Offerings and Unspecified Offerings) ended the month \$46,626 below its \$591,648 YTD budget, or 7.9% below budget. At the end of October, Regular Contributions were \$48,100, or 8.8%, below budget. Current Year Pledges, the largest of the components in Regular Contributions, are \$44,984 below budget through the end of November. At the end of October, Current Year Pledges were \$47,800 below budget.

Facilities Income: Actuals trail budget by \$974, reflecting the timing of rental payments. The year-to-date budget is \$75,960.

Special Contributions: The General Purposes category contains the one-time gifts from the Rector's Annual appeal and usually accounts for a significant portion of the balance in this account. However, in April, we received a refund from the IRS of taxes that were overpaid in 2020. That income was booked to the General Purposes account and contributes to the \$11,762 positive variance relative to budget.


Expenses: YTD expenses are \$11,022, or 1.3%, below budget. As of the end of October, expenses were \$1,200, or 0.1%, below budget. The consistent change from the reports earlier in the year is that most of the expense categories are above budget. The categories with the greatest variances are:

Property: Actuals exceed budget by \$12,305, compared to a budget of \$110,787. Water, General Maintenance and Repairs, and Lawn Care/Grounds are the subcategories contributing to the negative Property variance.

Personnel: Now is \$27,400 less than budget.


Martin Luther King Forum followed by a Day of Service Sunday, January 18 / Monday, January 19
