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

From the Associate Rector

D EAR Ones, Adam West died recently, and though I would associate Michael Keaton or Kevin Conroy's voice as my childhood Batman, his death leaves a mark.

I am often asked about my fascination with the masked vigilante, especially given my profession. To some, Bruce Wayne is merely a spoiled brat who was never able to cope with childhood trauma and gradually became a rich vigilante. This is a fair enough interpretation...though I see the beloved anti-hero in a different light.

As one who believes in all people and the inherent goodness of humanity, Batman desires to be a protector from those who would threaten others. To go about pursuing justice, Batman attempts to be nonviolent. And although he is inevitably drawn into the violence of the given situation, he avoids inflicting lethal harm—one of the recurring storylines involves his resistance to forces that urge him to seek vengeance instead of justice.

Though the various authors of different Batman franchises may not have meant to brush against theological claims, Batman seems to have some deeper belief in a heavenly, universal mercy, and he seeks to be a player in bringing about a more just world under ethical guidelines he has set for himself.

And Batman always works in community. Whether it's the parental pushback of Alfred, Bruce's trusty butler, Dick Grayson's (Robin's) yearning for equal footing in crime fighting, or the sometimes-conflicted connection with the state (Commissioner Gordon), Batman always relies on his relationships to do what he does and make it out of every situation in one piece.

This is perhaps where Batman stories become a mirror to my struggle and that of many of us: He is tempted to do it alone. He wants to take care of his problems and the problems of the world without help. He doesn't want to admit that he needs support of all kinds to be successful. Of course, he always learns that he does need to sacrifice a bit of pride and even the way he believes something ought to be done to actually do it the right way.

If you have ever been part of a group project—in school, at work, or even at St. James's, you know that there are many ways to get things done but that tasks are accomplished best when we can bring together all our gifts and interests. The same, I think, goes for those times in life that seem too mundane to bother anyone else about—the challenges of seeing a child move from one stage of life to the next, the difficulty in losing a job or having to learn a new one to keep up, being with a loved one through some sort of illness. We all go through these things, but rarely do we talk about them openly, despite evidence that when we do, we are better for it.

As I envision the future of St. James's, I see a community wherein people find a sense of belonging and a strength in community to become who God created them to be. This looks like a willingness to believe in our common goodness and seek justice while supporting each other amid life's joys and challenges. We do this now and we can seize opportunities to do it more. Just as the capital campaign depends on all of us, so does our culture of love. Find or make a way to engage 'now' and it surely will affect our future.



ELL, it is that time again, time for me to write my newsletter article. Recently, I was speaking to my friend, Matt Cornish. He has my job at a church in Glastonbury and he was preaching the next day—Trinity Sunday. He decided that instead of preaching on the trinity, which is a notoriously difficult topic to handle, he said that he was going to preach on the Trinity of Christian Formation of children. I liked that idea so much, that I decided to incorporate it in my newsletter. According to Matt, there are three parts to the Trinity of Christian Formation of children. First, attending church, second reinforcing your faith at home and third, taking responsibility for that faith either through attending camp or going on a mission trip. I like his ideas but it didn't really sound like me.

I started to write about attending church regularly and my article got a little preachy for my taste. I sounded like I was an expert of raising faithful children. I feel that I should admit to you all, I am not.

While I am confessing, I must say, in a lot of ways that I wasn't always the best parent. I didn't always check my kids' homework. I made boring lunches with the same meals day in and day out. I was never consistent with making them hang up their coats and put their boots away. Many times I put away their backpacks myself or carried their laundry upstairs because it was just easier than making them do it themselves. One thing Bob and I were consistent on was coming to church. Because Bob and I both work here, church was never an option on Sunday morning. Our kids had to be here and they were, Sunday in and Sunday out. We also tried hard to reinforce our faith at home with prayers before meals and bedtime.


When my children were younger, I did my best to help them to help them grow up to be faithful people. I think Matt is basically correct about the Trinity of Christian Formation, but I have to say, there were influences on them far greater than my own. When I talk to my grown-up children about what had the most influence on their faith development, the thread that seems to weave throughout all of their experiences was being an integral part of this place. Both Maddy and Henry sang in the choir. Robby and Henry were both acolytes. So as they say, by the grace of God, my children grew up to be people of faith, not perfect people, but people who know God loves them.

When Henry and Maddy were in the choir they learned to sing many different versions of the Nunc dimittis, otherwise known as, The Song of Simeon. In this beautiful song, it says, "For these eyes of mine have seen the Savior, whom you have prepared for all the world to see:" How do we help our children to, as the song says, see the Savior? One way is by encouraging them to make the most of all that this community has to offer: from Sunday school to youth group to making sandwiches to singing to worshipping. In all of these different places and in many different ways we see Jesus among us. Once we see Jesus among us in our faith community, we can take Jesus with us out into the greater world, and I believe that is ultimately our most important mission as Christians. We are called to be the church in the greater world which is much easier to do if you have been raised in a beautiful faith community like this one. My children are each on their own faith journey, and I am thankful to say that they have faith.

So my advice for helping your children grow up to be faithful adults is this. Come to church. Come to Sunday school and youth group and compline. Go on the youth trip. Go to Camp Washington. Spend a lot of time around church. It seems to rub off on you if you do.

From the Organist & Choirmaster


ear Parishioners, I write to update you on the progress of our organ project. Last month we signed a contract with the Austin Organ Company of Hartford to refurbish our 1962 pipe organ. Austin Organs outbid another top local company, and we are pleased and excited by their winning proposal.

During June, I collaborated with Austin to design the blueprints for modifications to the existing organ console. In addition to replacing the internal analog electronics with digital controls and memory systems, we are able to make no-cost improvements to the console by virtue of how we re-assemble it and write its computer code. These features include such novelties as "pedal divide" whereby the organist can play two independent voices on the pedalboard; the left foot may play bass notes and the right foot may play a melody line on different stops. Another fun feature is sostenuto whereby the organist to play the other two keyboards and the pedalboard at the same time, for a total of four separate and simultaneous musical layers!

Once these blueprints are completed, the new systems will be ordered and delivered to the Austin factory in approximately three months. As soon as these parts are ready, the organ will be removed from St. James's and delivered to Austin for complete mechanical refurbishment. This process will take several months, but we expect to have parts of the organ back by early next year, with the finished product completed in time for our performance of the Duruflé Requiem in March 2018.

Many thanks to you, the people of St. James's, for your support of the capital campaign. I'm so thrilled to see our facilities transformed in the coming months as we prepare ourselves for future ministry.



Vestry Corner

Treasurer's Report—May 2017

Current Position: At May 31, 2017 the Church's finances continued to be in the black vis a vis the budget, although less so than at April 30, 2017. Total Income was \$15,455 ahead of budget but expenses were \$36 more than the budgeted amounts. As a result, the Church's Net financial position at the end of May 2017 was \$15,419 better than the budgeted amount. A month ago this Net position was \$31,348 better than budget.

Income & Expense Summary:

Income: Through May 31, 2017, Year To Date Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) totaled \$20,011 more than the respective budgeted amounts. Of these four accounts, only Prior Year Pledges was behind budget by the same amount as at April 30, i.e. \$2,665. Income from the Parish House and Other Facilities was \$2,932 less than budget, Special Contributions for General Purposes were \$2,246 less than the budgeted amount.

Expense: Major contributors to the May 31, 2017 Expense results were the following:

Property: Year to date Property expenses were \$7,822 under budget due primarily to less than budgeted payments for gas, electricity and general maintenance. Personnel: Personnel expenses through May were \$188 under budget reflecting the fact that the Clergy Pension Plan payments are now back on schedule. Outreach Funding: The Diocesan Pledge account, year to date, is \$6,314 over budget because in March the Diocese billed the church for twice its regular monthly Pledge amount. As a result, through May 31 the church has paid six months of its annual Diocesan Pledge rather than just the five that were budgeted. Of the remaining expense categories, six were over budget and two were under, the net amount being \$1,818 over budget.

Mission

19th Annual School Supply Drive July and August Mission Project

URING the months of July and August, St. James's is collecting new school supplies to give to the children who are at the Hartford shelters and food pantries which St. James's supports throughout the year: South Park Inn, Loaves and Fishes, My Sisters' Place, and others.



Many children in the Hartford area suffer from an achievement gap in education, partly due to a lack of the essential tools needed to get an education. Help these students start school on the right foot with a few new school supplies. Children with new school supplies get excited about going back to school. Having a new backpack filled with pencils, notebooks and things they need to help them learn can make a huge difference for a child.

Join us in the 19th annual school supply drive. Spread the word and ask others you know to help send a child off to school with a smile and some self-esteem. Beginning in July, place your donations at any of the entrances to the church.

Walk Against Hunger Update

HE St. James's May 2017 mission project—Foodshare/ Walk Against Hunger—was another success! St. James's raised a total of \$1,415 to benefit the Loaves and Fishes food pantry. Parishioners donated \$965 and the Mission fund contributed \$450. Each dollar Foodshare receives can provide approximately \$10 worth of food to feed the hungry people it serves. Thank you to all who contributed to Foodshare and Loaves and Fishes by supporting the Walk Against Hunger.
