



From the Associate Rector

My Dearest Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Summer is traditionally a time when we slow down and take a breath from so much of the busyness and noise of work, school, and life. But one thing that we shouldn't be taking a vacation from is our Gospel call to feed the hungry. Sadly, donations to our food pantry have slowed to a trickle in recent weeks. It was with a heavy heart that, after receiving a recent request from the Hartford Catholic Worker in late May, I found our food pantry had little to offer the struggling families they serve in the north end of Hartford. Heidi and I made a shopping trip to the grocery store, allowing us to help our friends at the Hartford Worker. A couple weeks later, the shelves in the pantry are still pretty bare.

I'm not sure why it has happened, but the food donations have dwindled. I know you. I know your big hearts. I know that we can help turn things around this summer.

Food insecurity, where families worry constantly about where their next meal will come from, is faced by many in our region. Empty bellies and hungry families are a stark reality, and as followers of Christ, we are called to answer this need. In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus says, "I was hungry and you gave me food." In the next breath, he reminds us, "Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." Feeding the hungry is not just a charitable act, it's a core tenet of our faith. At the end of John, the resurrected Jesus meets the disciples on the beach, where he prepares a meal for them and says not once ... not twice ... but three times, "Feed my sheep."

The word companion comes from Greek -- Com "with, together" and Panis "bread." It literally means "bread fellow." Let us be attentive companions on the Way of Love.

By donating to the food pantry, we are not just providing sustenance, we are honoring our living God.

Here are some specific items that are currently in high demand:

- Peanut butter and jelly
- Pasta and tomato sauce
- Canned tuna or chicken
- Mayonnaise
- Diapers

These donations can make a world of difference to a family in need. Imagine the relief on a parent's face knowing they can put a nourishing meal on the table for their children. Please consider donating non-perishable food items to the church collection wagon in the Cloister. You can also make a cash donation to purchase food if that is easier.

Together, let us answer the call of Christ and embody the spirit of compassion and generosity. May God bless your continued generosity.

An Exploration of Musical Classicism

Classes: August 5, 12 & 19 in the Parish Hall, 7:00 PM

Concert: Monday, August 26 in the Sanctuary, 7:00 PM

THE “bread and butter” of the concert-hall repertoire is the music of the Classical Era: sonatas, concertos, symphonies, quartets, masses and operas by Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven. In a sense this is a curious phenomenon: Why are we so drawn to music with titles such as “Symphony No. 70 in D Major?” And how is this era, unlike any other, so deeply tied to the music of just three of its composers? There are unlimited numbers of Baroque, Romantic and Modernist composers whose music saturates classical-radio playlists; for the 18th Century, it’s essentially the Big Three: Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven. We’ll explore these questions and many more in this summer’s Music Monday series, lingering as much as possible over the music of these three and a couple of their lesser-known colleagues, including the dazzling Italian composer-pianist Muzio Clementi, whose music I’ve offered on recent Sunday mornings.

Our three Monday evening classes (7-8:15 PM in the Parish Hall) are designed to build toward a final Music Monday: a concert of music for violin and piano in the sanctuary on August 26, also beginning at 7:00 PM. Our guest artist this summer is award-winning violinist Gary Capozziello, the Hartford Symphony Orchestra’s brilliant and charismatic Assistant Concertmaster. We’ll play sonatas by Mozart and Brahms along with a few other 18th-Century treats. Classes are free of charge; general admission tickets to the concert are \$25 and can be reserved at the Parish Office or purchased at the door. Please mark your calendars and please be sure to bring a friend to share this experience with us!

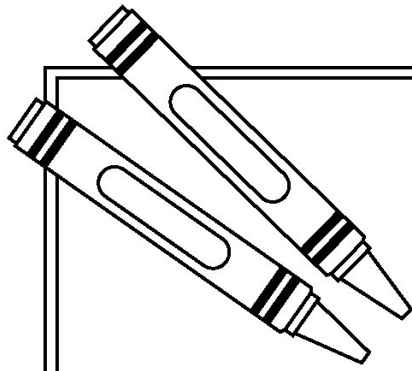

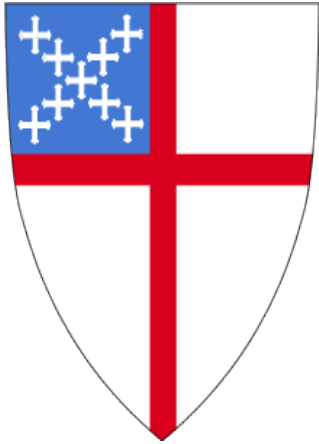

Treasurer’s Report / January—May 2024

Summary of Current Position:

Through May, the church is short of its budget by \$39,408. Income and expenses both contributed to the shortfall as income is \$29,440 below budget, primarily due to lower than

projected pledge payments. Expenses are higher than budgeted due to property and personnel expenses that are higher than budgeted.

Income: Year-to-Date (YTD) actual income is \$29,440 below budget (or 6.8% below budget). Last month, income was \$5,197, or 1.4%, below budget. The following components impacted the income position through the end of May: Regular Contributions (Current-Year Pledges, Prior-Year Pledges, Seasonal Offerings and Unspecified Offerings) ended the month \$43,912 below the \$301,105 budget, or 14.6% below budget. Last month, Regular Contributions were \$25,692 below budget. Most of the shortfall in Regular Contributions is due to Current Year Pledges which are \$39,984 below budget (or 13.9% below budget), a deterioration from last month’s \$23,600 shortfall. Contribution Statements were sent in late May but their impact won’t be reflected until the end of June.

Facilities Income: Actual income of \$35,265 is \$746 greater than the budgeted amount of \$34,519. Last month, facilities income was \$3,000 greater than budgeted. The reduction during the month is due to the timing of payments received for use of the building.

Special Contributions, General Purposes: The primary component in this category is the Rector’s Appeal contributions. At the end of May, actual receipts were \$14,500 higher than projected, a small reduction from April’s overage of \$16,900. A review of the pledges has begun to assess the bucketing of pledge payments which may also impact the current shortfall in the current year pledges.

Expenses: YTD expenses are \$8,643, or 2.6%, above budget. As of end of April, expenses were \$8,600 higher than budgeted. A few key expense categories in terms of their contribution to the overall variance through the end of May are:

Property: \$1,600 over budget, caused by Gas expenses which are \$3,900 above budget. These figures are similar to last month when Property was \$1,300 above budget.

Personnel: \$5,300 over budget. Last month, Personnel was \$4,900 above budget. Components of the personnel expenses are being reviewed.

Stick around after the service on **Sunday, August 18** and help sort and pack the supplies. All are encouraged to lend a hand!

If you are dropping off after hours, please place donations in the rubber bin in front of the cloister door! Monetary donations are also accepted to help purchase these items. The time commitment is from about 10:45am to 1:00pm, on 2nd Mondays (i.e., July 8, Aug. 12, Sept. 9, etc.), and is a very satisfying activity.
