
#### From the Foreword of the book:

# Chuck and Meredith Willson An interview with the Rev. Curtis Farr

S we sit down to dinner in their home just a few blocks from the church, Chuck poses a question to his family.

"One of my clients is charged and convicted for dealing drugs, and he's either going to get a ten-year sentence or a twelve-year sentence. What reasons might there be for him to get the shorter sentence?"

Nora (13) asks, "What drugs did he sell?"

"Crack cocaine," Chuck replies.

"Did he hurt anybody?" Charlotte (11) asks.

"No, he's not violent."

"Oh, well there's a good reason for only ten years," Chuck's wife, Meredith, says, the girls nodding vigorously in agreement.

This is not unusual dinner conversation for the Willsons. Chuck serves as an assistant federal public defender in the Public Defenders Office for the District of Connecticut. When Chuck is late to dinner it is because "Daddy is in prison today," meeting with clients who in Chuck's words are, "viewed by society-at-large as something less than second-class citizens."

From an early age, criminal law fascinated Chuck. When he was a teenager, his sister babysat for a state prosecutor. She would speak openly about the cases she worked, including such gruesome cases as one who abused his spouse with a golf club. While the details were shocking, Chuck found it incredible that such a nice woman dealt with such awful situations and had devoted her life to helping.

He took law classes in high school and college, and in his first mock trial he was given the role of a defense lawyer for a client accused of driving while under the influence of alcohol. Though the prosecutor had an impressive amount of mock trial experience, Chuck won the case, finding it thrilling to be "difficult and disruptive in a good, approved, and structured way."

By the end of his time as an undergraduate at Saint Joseph's University, Chuck knew he wanted to enter law school, but hoping to see what would happen with Meredith (whom he had recently met) and feeling that his life was on track, he decided to spend a year earning poverty wages and managing volunteers at the Greater Boston Food Bank. In this position, his volunteers were often people facing criminal charges, and Chuck developed a more nuanced understanding of the difficult circumstances that brought them to their current situations.

Chuck enrolled in and graduated from Boston College with a law degree and then clerked for a judge in New Hampshire. He soon landed an associate position at a wildly successful firm in Boston, which gave him opportunities to work on significant cases, but these cases left something to be desired. The first big case was between two corporations, in which his firm's client settled after acquiring the other company at a massive discount.

"I remember finishing the case and wondering, 'What is the point?" Chuck says.

He knew that he wanted to be involved in helping people to change their lives, and a lot of his firm's big clients were not helping him fulfill that desire. Luckily, the firm's successes offered Chuck the chance to work many pro bono cases, one of which involved an inmate convicted on two drug-related charges.

"Meredith actually watched me in court on this one," Chuck says as Meredith returns to the dining room with brownies for dessert.

"At first, he seemed nervous," she says of the first court case, "but when they asked the first question, he leaned over into the podium, crossed one leg behind the other, and started a conversation."

"That's probably my 'trick,' if you will," Chuck adds. "I learned early on that as a lawyer you want to emphasize your personality. No big shows, just a conversation."

"Every time I've ever seen Chuck in court," Meredith says, "he immediately gets into a zone. He sounds calm, but you can tell that he is fighting for his client in a skilled, articulate way."

Chuck's method seems to work; he won the case, despite that those kinds of cases lose 95% of the time. His client had been convicted on two counts, and Chuck got one thrown out and the other reversed, enabling his client to be released from prison several years early.

While the legal system fascinates him, Chuck is driven by a deeper desire to help those without much hope. He finds that the judges he works with are looking for the same thing—hope in seemingly hopeless situations. And hope, he says, "hope is one of the best things the church can offer the world."

Belief in this hope and in a faith community's ability to lift up individuals to turn faith into action, led Chuck and Meredith to find a church community in which they could raise Nora and Charlotte. They chose St. James's because when Meredith first walked into the chapel for the 8 a.m. service, she encountered the former assistant rector, Joan Phelps. Having been raised Roman Catholic, seeing a woman at the altar surprised and delighted her—it didn't hurt that she was warmly welcomed by many members in the congregation.

The Willsons quickly became regulars, and the girls were baptized.



Chuck, on the other hand, had yet to be baptized. In the church of his childhood, you would not be ready for baptism until you could make a public statement of faith and "welcome Jesus into your heart."

"So you decided not to let Jesus into your heart," I ask. Chuck giggles as he describes his baptism.

"At some point, I called Bob [the rector] and said, 'I want to get baptized. Can I come by on a Tuesday, or something, and get it done?'

"No, no, no...we've gotta have a thing," Bob insisted, so they met at McLadden's to discuss baptizing Chuck at the 8 a.m. service.

"I will remember my baptism until I die. During the service, Bob asked Nora and Charlotte to dip their hands into the font to help him bless the water. I will never forget looking down, into their eyes, at that moment just before Bob baptized me."

In that moment, Chuck recognized in his daughters' eyes the same thing he searches out in those whom he defends: hope.

"Many of my clients have never been recognized as having hope. They come from some dark backgrounds. I search for hope in these peoples' lives, as do most of the people I work with. One good part about our system is that it looks for hope in every situation, and it is my job to bring that hope forward, one person at a time."

HEN I first moved to West Hartford, I read an autobiography of Katharine Hepburn. She said the best advice her father, a Hartford urologist, ever gave her was to empty her bladder whenever possible. Good advice, but sometimes there just isn't a bathroom when you need one.

That being said, I have a confession to make. Like many women my age, I am keenly aware of where the bathrooms are in my community. I hate the idea of needing a toilet and not having one at my disposal. I know that is a weird thing to write in my church newsletter, but please, bear with me.

I have another confession to make. My concern over lack of bathrooms almost kept me from going to the Women's March on Washington in January and that would have been a mistake. The march was one of the greatest experiences of my life. The idea of not being able to find a bathroom when I needed one was scary, but when I weighed the issues, I decided to face my fear and attend the march anyway. Marching with women and men from around the country was a life-changing event for me, and I am very glad that I went, but my fears were not unfounded. Lack of toilets was a major issue for most all of the over 500,000 that attended. There were others at the march who were claustrophobic, or afraid of large crowds or afraid of getting separated from their group but we all marched anyway. I am happy to say that we all marched with very little problems. Many of us made the decision to march even though it was a little scary and a major test of our patience at times. We were many times uncomfortable, but we knew the march was important work and we continued.

Which got me thinking about a cold, cold morning just about 28 years ago. Bob and I were living in Ridgefield and I was 24 years old, pregnant with our first child, Robby. One February night, I started having strong labor contractions. Being thrilled with the arrival of our first born, Bob and I headed out for a walk at 3 in the morning to try and get my labor going. It was 15 degrees outside and our golden retriever, Winnie, looked at us like we were crazy as we put his leash on him and headed out the door. I went to the restroom right before we left, but nevertheless, half way through our walk, my bladder gave up the ghost. Bob and I walked back to our apartment, me with frozen pants. The next day I became a mother and as most moms will tell you, my whole world changed.

So, I guess its back to my long-time idol Katharine Hepburn's advice from her father. Whenever possible, empty your bladder in a toilet or port-a-potty. But let me add my own two cents to this advice, don't let fear of wetting your pants keep you from living life to the fullest. There is so much work that needs to be done. Don't be afraid. Get out there and march, mother, and don't be afraid of frozen pants.





# From the Organist & Choirmaster

N Friday, March 3 at 7.30PM, St. James's will host a joint organ recital by Alexander Pattavina and Daniel Ficarri, two extraordinarily talented undergraduate students of Paul Jacobs, the Grammy Award-winning organist and Chair of the Organ Department at Juilliard.



Mr. Ficarri is also organ scholar at the Church of St. Paul the Apostle in New York City, where he founded a music series to help promote the pipe organ in the Lincoln Center neighborhood and raise money for the restoration of the church's pipe organ. As a composer, he recently received a commission from Manfred Honeck, Conductor of the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra.

Mr. Pattavina is currently the Robert G. Owen Organ Scholar at my former parish, Christ Church Bronxville. Previously he was organ scholar at St. Paul's, Harvard Square, where he also sang as a boy chorister. During his time at Juilliard, Pattavina took part in an 18-hour marathon performance of Johann Sebastian Bach's complete organ works, featuring the Juilliard Organ Department at St. Peter's Lutheran Church, New York City. The historic performance was broadcast live on WQXR FM.

I highly encourage you to come and hear these young

artists perform on our 1962 Austin organ. The performance is free and will be followed by a fabulous sherry reception in the parish room.

On Saturday, April 1 at 7.30PM, our choir will perform Johannes Brahms's A German Requiem with members of the Hartford Symphony Orchestra and guest singers. Brahms's choral masterpiece is also his biggest musical composition and presents enormous challenges for any choir. While the Mozart Requiem featured four soloists, the Brahms's is written for soprano and baritone soloists. Our own Mary McCue will sing the stunningly beautiful soprano solo in the fifth movement, and Dean Murphy will return to perform the brooding baritone solos. We are particularly excited to welcome back Mr. Murphy amid news that starting this fall, he will join the ensemble of the Deutsche Oper Berlin.


Originally conceived for a large orchestra and chorus of 100 or more voices, A German Requiem may also be sung by smaller choirs and accompanied by Brahms's own orchestral reduction for two pianos. To make our performance balance with the large orchestra, we will be joined by a dozen singers from Yale's renowned Schola Cantorum, under the direction of David Hill. The Schola recently recorded the Brahms for release on CD and they will perform it on tour of India. Collaborating with these singers will be a richly rewarding experience for our choristers.

Finally, I would like to draw your attention to a way in which you may support the performance of this Requiem on April 1. As we did last year for our performance of the Mozart Requiem, we invite you to make memorial contributions honoring friends and loved ones. All memorials will be included in the program and concert dedication.

# Introducing Our New Intern for Ordination Darryl Burke

Y name is Darryl C. Burke, I was born in Brooklyn, New York, and my family attended St. Augustine's Episcopal Church. My family relocated to Hartford when my father answered the call to become vicar of St. Monica's Episcopal Church in Hartford, shortly before I entered high school (I attended Weaver High School and Watkinson School.) I graduated from Swarthmore College with majors in Psychology and English, with concentrations in Black Studies and Education. I received my M. Ed from Harvard University with concentrations in Administration, Planning and Social Policy, and Teaching Curriculum and Learning Environments. I have also completed additional coursework at the University of Pennsylvania, Temple University, The University of Connecticut, Washington University, and Hartford Seminary.

Professionally, I have served as a teacher and administrator in the Hartford Public School System. During my tenure with the school system I served as an English teacher, Assistant Principal, and Principal at Weaver High School, and Bulkeley High School. Recognizing the dearth of role models for many of the students, I was able to serve as a positive Black male role model and assist in helping them recognize that life offered a plethora of opportunities outside of their communities, which could serve as a means of enabling them to "give back" to their communities. More importantly, I sought to instill in them an understanding of their moral responsibility and obligation to use their educations as a means of ameliorating the conditions of all people. Until my retirement in 2015, this had been both my avocation and my vocation. Additionally, this was ministry, of sorts; it was a vehicle for assisting young people in recognizing the importance and power of education as a tool for garnering a foundation that would enable them to viably compete in mainstream society.

I am a member of the Beta Sigma Lambda chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. and the Beta Iota Boule of Sigma Pi Phi Fraternity. I have served in a variety of leadership positions, including President, of each of these organizations. I have also been a member of the DuBois Society and am a former President of the organization, as well. I have served on the boards of the Blue Hills Civic Association, the Glastonbury ABC House, and the Upper Albany Neighborhood Collaborative, among others. I have received a number of awards from a variety of community organizations, including the "Innovative Leadership" Award from the Blue Hills Civic Association, and the State of Connecticut's "CHRO Edythe P. Gaines Excellence in Education Award". I have received proclamations from both the City of Hartford and the State of Connecticut in recognition of these efforts.

I have been a member of St. Monica's Episcopal Church for over forty years, and have served in a variety of capacities. I have served as the advisor for the Young People's Fellowship, Coordinator of the Acolytes, and Director of the Brotherhood of Saint Andrew, Vestry, and Search Committee. I am currently the Vice President of the State Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and serve as a Lay Eucharistic Minister and Adult Bible Study Facilitator. I am currently a postulant for the priesthood within the Episcopal Church of Connecticut, and prayerfully will complete this journey in the near future. I am divorced and the father of two adult sons who have blessed me with six grandchildren.

# A Letter from the Seminarian Greg Stark


