

From the Rector and Associate Rector

S I sit to write this letter, we are a few days removed from Ash Wednesday and the school shootings at Marjorie Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida. I find myself in a place of sadness, outrage, and, most of all, confusion. Sadness, that 17 families are burying loved ones and the lives of so many children have been devastated. Outrage, that in a country with so much, all we have to offer the grieving is "thoughts and prayers" – while thoughts and prayers without actions are no more than words and excuses to do nothing. My confusion is a product of my profound lack of understanding. How is this allowed to happen so frequently without any accurate reporting? This makes the 18th school shooting since January 1. On 9/11 in 2001, 2,974 souls were lost and we as a nation went to war. Yet, in 2014 (most recent numbers available, but they seem to be getting worse) over 33,000 lives were lost to gunfire: 11,726 homicides with the remaining number comprised of suicides or accidental shootings.

It is my belief that this is just one of the many symptoms of a spiritual and moral cancer that is spreading through our society – like the 14,000+ lives lost to opioids last year. We as parents, friends, and leaders want our children and one another to have strong social and spiritual cores, yet somewhere along the way skiing, soccer (and you fill in the blank) have taken priority over church and caring for others, and brunch has replaced the Eucharist as the main Sunday morning meal in most households in America. We can do better than this. We are better than this.

If our faith communities are no longer offering experiences of substance and growth, to turn our back on them is shortsighted and lacks a sense of the divine possible. It is my hope that instead of walking away and turning our backs on these beloved communities, we would take this moment in time to address what is lacking and what is not meeting our needs.

Whether it be the horrific events of Ash Wednesday 2018, or simply sleeping in on Sunday morning, we are a people losing connection with our communities, our families, ourselves, and our God.

My commitment to you is that if you will join me in making our little corner of this world a better and more faithful place, I will devote my sadness, outrage, and confusion as well as my joy, compassion, and faith to doing what we can to heal what ails us.

From the Organist & Choirmaster

ear Parishioners,

Our choir will perform the Requiem, Op. 9, by Maurice Duruflé on Saturday, March 3 at 7:00pm. Mary McCue will sing the Pie Jesu, and for the first time we will welcome baritone Bryan Murray, a graduate student in the Yale Opera department, to perform the baritone solos.

The Requiem will be paired with Francis Poulenc's Litanies à la Vierge Noir, an extraordinary composition featuring three-part women's chorus. Both works will be accompanied by members of the Hartford Symphony Orchestra and organist Christopher Houlihan.

In 1936, Francis Poulenc rediscovered his Catholic faith following the sudden death of a close friend from a car accident. Shortly afterward, Poulenc visited Notre-Dame de Rocamadour, an ancient pilgrimage site in France. He wrote an account of his visit:


"A few days earlier I'd just heard of the tragic death of my colleague ... As I meditated on the fragility of our human frame, I was drawn once more to the life of the spirit. Rocamadour had the effect of restoring me to the faith of my childhood. This sanctuary, undoubtedly the oldest in France ... had everything to captivate me ... The same evening of this visit to Rocamadour, I began my Litanies à la Vierge noire for female voices and organ. In that work I tried to get across the atmosphere of "peasant devotion" that had struck me so forcibly in that lofty chapel."

The Duruflé Requiem is a ubiquitous choral work: many choirs have performed it in concerts and liturgies, and it is a favorite of audiences and musicians alike.


In contrast to the Brahms Requiem, which the composer created from his own amalgam of scriptural texts and structures, Duruflé chose to set sections of the Latin Requiem Propers, Mass Ordinary, and Catholic burial service: i. Requiem Aeternam, ii. Kyrie eleison, iii. Offertory, iv. Sanctus and Benedictus, v. Pie Jesu, vi. Agnus Dei, vii. Communion, viii. Libera me, and ix. In Paradisum. Duruflé also uses the corresponding Gregorian plainchants as melodic and thematic material. The juxtaposition of 9th and 10th century themes and 20th century harmonic language is haunting and transcendent.

If you would like to help support the choir's performance, please consider making a memorial contribution to the concert. Memorials will be printed in the program and accepted through March 1st. like to read Christian blogs. I recently found a blogger named Anna Fitch Courie. Anna is a nurse, military spouse, military child, and layperson. I recently discovered her as a Celebrity Blogger with Lent Madness. In her blog, Christ Walk, she wrote that she didn't think she was a very good military spouse-comparing herself to all the other spouses she sees that seem to have everything under complete control. We all know those families that seem to have it all together. The ones who have the perfect present for the child's homeroom teacher, and a little something special for the music teacher as well. Oh! And the children always have the perfectly balanced lunches in those cute bento box things that are so popular right now. She suggested that she thought she might even have a "Mom Crush" on some of those wives, and that when she sees their posts on Facebook she just feels like she doesn't measure up.

Reading this wonderful blog (I encourage you to look her up) got me thinking. Facebook has created a space for all of us to present ourselves as we would like everyone to see us. 
perfect marriage or perfect job doesn't exist. No one has it all together. No one.

God has blessed us here in more ways than we can count. But, we are still all human. We make mistakes. A few weeks ago, I got frustrated with a parishioner and I was not my most rational self. Guess what? I asked for forgiveness. She gave it. We moved on. We live in this community of faith and we support each other, warts and all. We do dumb stuff, but it is ok. It is better than ok. It is fantastic. Together we definitely have it all at St. James's.






