"Gospel Math"

But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift...The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ...But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knitted together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love. Ephesians 4:7, 11-12, 15-16

I like the idea that The Bible and Baptismal Covenant can be seen as user manuals to a life lived in community and God's vision, or what Verna Dozier (contemporary theologian and writer) used to call "God's Dream". The fourth chapter of Paul's letter to the Ephesians encapsulates this idea beautifully. This letter is primarily a celebration of the life of the Church as a unique community established by God through the work of Jesus. It teaches us that the Kingdom of God—and by extension, the Church—is greater than the sum of its parts. In other words, we can do far more together in the name of Christ than we could ever do individually. This is what I like to call "Gospel Math." While we learn in school that 1+1=2, and popular culture and politics seem to prefer to use the math of scarcity, "Gospel Math" is about abundance.

The letter to the Ephesians tells us in no uncertain terms that we have been given all that we need to do the work of the faithful, to build up the Church in love and, through this, each other and the world we live in. We are all equipped with different skills and gifts, and joined together by the reality that we are the beloved children of God empowered to hear and heed the Gospel call, to share the love of Christ and to live into that love. The grace of God and the love of Christ are perfect examples of this "Gospel Math." In sharing, in the very act of giving them to others, they grow and multiply in us.

We build up the Church by building up others. To do this, however, we must be spiritually grounded through a life and practice of prayer and study. What are you doing to take care of yourself, of your heart and your soul? What are you teaching your children? How can we as a community of folks struggling to be faithful lift you up and journey with you along the way? As the conversation here at St. James's continues about how we are called to go deeper in faith together and as individuals, I hope that you will be a part of this. Share your thoughts, your dreams and your prayers. This year, be a part of the liturgy, the wonderful formation opportunities for young and adults alike, and the wider life of the parish; and let us, like Paul, celebrate this grace filled and divine gift that we call the Church, the Body of Christ.

From the Organist & Choirmaster

ear Parishioners,
I hope you will join us on Saturday, March 14th at 7pm for "The English Anthem," featuring our choir and organist Benjamin Straley in a concert of popular Anglican choral works.

Our Anglican musical heritage is traced back to the monastic tradition of the 11th century. Monasteries were home to communities of monks who participated in a daily routine of eight services, called "the Liturgy of the Hours." These services were:

- Matins (during the night, at midnight with some); also called Vigils or Nocturns or, in monastic usage, the Night Office.
- Lauds or Dawn Prayer (at Dawn, or 3 a.m.)
- Prime or Early Morning Prayer (First Hour = approximately 6 a.m.)
- Terce or Mid-Morning Prayer (Third Hour = approximately 9 a.m.)
- Sext or Midday Prayer (Sixth Hour = approximately 12 noon)
- None or Mid-Afternoon Prayer (Ninth Hour = approximately 3 p.m.)
- Vespers or Evening Prayer (at the lighting of the lamps, generally at 6 p.m.)
- Compline or Night Prayer (before retiring, generally at 9 p.m.)

Not surprisingly, this rigorous daily regimen of chanting eventually encouraged some variation. Since older monks sang with novice boys, as recorded in the 11th-century Winchester Troper (a trope was an additional section or line of music), it allowed for the harmonic combination of upper voices and lower voices. Within this remarkable document is some of the earliest notated harmony – one part chanting plainsong (likely adult monks), while a second part, perhaps originally improvised, sings in harmony (probably the boys' voices).


Following the English tradition, two-part choral harmony was also composed at Notre Dame Cathedral, Paris, from 1160-1250. This tradition is called Organum.

As the Renaissance bloomed across Europe, sacred choral music continued to develop as unique traditions and compositional techniques grew out of each country and region. Renaissance composers from the Roman church in English include John Taverner, Thomas Tallis, William Byrd, and Orlando Gibbons. At the beginning of the 16th century, over 50 choirs existed at monasteries and English cathedrals. These were disbanded by Henry VIII in the 1530s when he divorced Catherine of Aragon and separated the English church from Rome. Following the separation, the Book of Common Prayer was written by Thomas Cranmer in 1549, and new liturgies for the nascent Anglican church were codified. Of these, Choral Evensong became a defining liturgy.

Charles II restoration to the throne in 1660 marked a revival of Anglican choral music. John Blow, choirmaster of St. Paul's Cathedral, London, and his student Henry Purcell, now fully ensconced in the newly formed Church of England, composed a uniquely Anglican style of music.

After a lull in the 18th century, Samuel Sebastian Wesley revived Anglican choral music by the early 19th century, and composers of the Edwardian and Victorian eras wrote grand works that celebrated the power and glory of the British Empire.

Today, English cathedral choirs are in many ways stronger than ever, but many parish choirs have been disbanded in favor of modern musical styles or a lack of volunteer singers. This has been mirrored in America, where divergent styles of music in the Episcopal Church continue to reduce the number of traditional Anglican music programs. Here at St. James's, our choir still draws much of our repertoire and style of singing from the Anglican canon. We are a contemporary link to a tradition over one thousand years old!



ALWAYS begin writing my newsletter by reading the last couple of years of newsletters. In the March/April 2018 newsletter, I wrote about a blogger, Anna Fitch Courie. Anna is a nurse, military spouse, military child and layperson. In her blog, Christ Walk, she wrote that she didn't think she was a very good military spouse, comparing herself to all the other spouses she sees that seem to have everything under complete control. We all know those families that seem to have it all together. The ones who have the perfect present for the child's homeroom teacher, and a little something special for the music teacher as well. Oh! And the children always have the perfectly balanced lunches in those cute bento box things that are so popular right now. She suggested that she thought she might even have a "Mom Crush" on some of those wives, and that when she sees their posts on Facebook she just feels like she doesn't measure up.

Rereading this newsletter, got me thinking. Facebook has created a space for each of us to present ourselves as we would like everyone to see us; not necessarily as we truly are. We create this alternate reality where our children are always at the top of the class, our make-up is always perfectly applied, and we never have spinach stuck in our teeth. I think so often, as I am reading friends' Facebook posts—when they are bragging about their children's latest achievements or posting when they go for a run—are you going to tell us when your daughter is seeking counseling for anxiety? Are you going to share when your son flunks out of his Freshman year in college, or how about when you sit on the couch and eat Reese's Peanut Butter cups instead of exercising? Most likely, I think the answer is no. Instead, we create these alternate realities where everything is peachy keen, but we have to remember that it is not reality. This perfect family or perfect marriage or perfect job doesn't exist. No one has it all together. No one.


When my son Robby and Katy got married a few years ago, I got them this little sign for their kitchen. It says, "We may not have it all together, but together we have it all." I love this sentiment for starting out a marriage, but also for living in a church community. We at St. James's are a wonderful bunch of people. We have amazing gifts and talents amongst us. God has blessed us here in more ways than we can count. But, we are still all human. We make mistakes. A few weeks ago, I got frustrated with a parishioner and I was not my most rational self. It is fantastic. Together we definitely have it all at St. James's.

You and your flaws. It's ok. We all have them and God loves us anyway. When we are at our best as a church community, we are Jesus's hands and heart in the world. Loving each other as Jesus taught us, unconditionally.

"I got involved at a vestry meeting," said Willson. "It was silent when Bob asked if anyone wanted to chair the event. I can't

handle silence." Raissian said, "I volunteered at a vestry meeting, but I said I don't really know how to do it."



Stahl said, "They were so organized so early. I just went to the first meeting." At the first meeting after Easter, the committee got volunteers to head all the committees, and people started brainstorming about auction items. "Joey committed at that meeting as well," said Raissian, referring to the fact that Joey Meyer agreed to be the gondolier auctioneer.

From the first auction meeting, the work was spread among a lot of volunteers. "The generosity of our big items and the willingness of those donors to double their offers contributed to our success," said Raissian.

"I think the fact that you could buy a whole table contributed as well," said Willson. This year, at the auction, friends could buy a whole table so that they could sit together. "Judith's, donation sheets were really beautiful as well," said Raissian, pointing out that the attention to details attributed to the auction's success.

About a week before the auction, there was one challenge that no one could have anticipated. Raissian's youngest son, Rory, came down with a bad case of chicken pox. "Rory getting chicken pox the week before was a big challenge," said Raissian. She called Meredith Willson to tell her about Rory. "I was like, you should just stay home," said Willson. "It was really just fine," said Stahl. Raissian added that the community pitched in and everyone helped in the end.

In addition to raising over \$19,000, the committee had a lot of fun together. "I enjoyed the people involved so much. It made it fun," said Willson. "Meredith's texts were fun," said Raissian.



AYLIGHT Saving Time begins on March 8! Remember to turn your clocks ahead one hour Saturday evening, March 7.




Fourth Friday Family Night March 27 and April 24 at 5:30pm
