

From the Rector's Desk

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In my sermon on Sunday, February 14, I suggested that "when people ask you what your church did during the COVID-19 pandemic, instead of telling them all the many ways we tried to do liturgy or even socialize safely, you can tell them that we fed people." Yes, you fed the poor, the forgotten, the struggling and the elderly. All of this in direct response to the ever-growing need and Jesus' command that if we love him, we will feed his people.


He (Jesus) said to him the third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep. John 21:17

One of my favorite lines when people ask me about St. James's is to tell them that if we are not feeding ourselves, we are feeding others. At times the feeding takes the form of feeding spirits, hearts and minds, and at other times it takes the form of fellowship or helping others meet their nutritional needs.

Because I am who I am, I now feel a need to give you some numbers. These numbers are all pre-COVID, and the reality today is quite a bit worse. In Connecticut, one in six children struggle with hunger and frequently go to bed hungry. In West Hartford, the food insecurity rate is 10 percent, and the poverty rate is 7.7 percent (I bet that is higher than you thought.) In Hartford, the food insecurity rate is 26 percent, and the poverty rate is 31.9 percent.

Now that you see the facts on the ground, let me tell you what you have been doing to address this urgent need.

- For years now, we have provided over 200 sandwiches to Loaves and Fishes nearly every week of the year, totaling well over 10,000 per year.
- You have prepared casseroles for the soup kitchen at Loaves and Fishes in the amount of nearly 100 a year.
- You have donated literally tons of food this past year to the West Hartford Food Bank.
- We are now providing 30 bags of staples every other week to families in the North End of Hartford.
- Monthly, nearly 80 boxes full of non-perishables are delivered to West Hartford Senior Citizens in need.
- Since August 30, we have prepared and delivered through our partnership with the Hartford Catholic Worker, 756 family dinners totaling 3,024 individual meals.

The need continues to grow, but I have total faith in the good people of St. James's that we will continue to work to address hunger in our neighborhood and beyond. Jesus said, "Feed my sheep," and we at St. James's are certainly trying.

On another note, many of you have asked me what the plans for in person worship are at St. James's as we move forward. As a starter, I have got to tell you that I am starting to avoid the word plan. Over the past year we have had many "plans" that have been thwarted by the realities of this pandemic. So, let me share with you some thoughts or maybe we can call it a vision for the future. For now, we will continue to live stream Spiritual Eucharist on Sunday mornings and will try to come up with some ways to virtually engage during Holy Week. When the weather allows, we will add an additional service outdoors on Sunday mornings, after the 9:30 live stream service, probably around II:00. When the time comes, it would be great to have a group of folks that could set up the outdoor service, while Tim, Vaughn and I are in the church live streaming and Priscilla is teaching Sunday school. Depending on vaccination rates and the recommendations of our bishops, by the beginning of summer, I hope to be able to welcome smallish groups to live indoor worship. My prayer for all of us is that by September/ October we will be able to gather in the sanctuary with precautions for worship.

As I am sure you understand, none of this is written in stone. We need to continue to be flexible, patient and safe. So far, I have to say, you all have been just that, and I thank you.

I ask that you pray for me as I will continue to pray for you, as we navigate this difficult time together.

"St. James's Cares" feeding program has now expanded to provide 28 full dinners (protein, starch, vegetables, salad, and dessert) for 4 each week to families struggling in the North End of Hartford through our partnership with our friends at The Hartford Catholic Worker. That means with your financial support we are providing dinners to 112 people (primarily children) every Monday. We will keep this going as long as we can - with no end in sight.

If It's Lent It Must Be Toiletry Time!

ACH Lent we prepare Easter "baskets" for our neighbors living in Hartford area shelters. The bulk go to women and families, although there are also men in the group. You can donate in several ways: deliver full size toiletries to the church, have them shipped from Target or Amazon (watch your email for wish lists), or simply donate money and we will do the shopping. If Covid means you should stay home - PLEASE DO! We are happy to do the shopping for you.

The list below are the most needed items. These do not need to be huge sizes, 14-20 ounce containers are great. The dollar stores are also good sources. Please consider buying fragrance-free or non-allergenic items. Children living in shelters often have asthma which is triggered by highly fragranced items.



- Shaving cream, Combs, and Mini Kleenex packs



Thursday's in Lent with the Rev. Tim O'Leary

What Does Paul's Letter to the Romans Mean For Us?

AUL'S Letter to the Romans is one of the most influential texts in Christianity. Christian theologians in every period of the church's history have wrestled with it—from Augustine in he early church, to Martin Luther in the medieval church, to Karl Barth in the twentieth century. The letter has played a significant role in key turning-points throughout the history of the church and the world. But what does it mean for us today? What does it mean for you? How can this influential text speak to your life, here and now? And what does it have to do with Lent?

Come join Tim and explore Paul's Letter to the Romans and what it means for us today and in the Lenten season. We will look at a particular theme in each of the six sessions, as we read through the letter together. We will talk about 2-3 chapters per session and you are encouraged to read those chapters throughout the week (but no requirements of course!). This is a great way to read and meditate on od's holy Word during the Lenten season—as the liturgy for Ash Wednesday invites us to do (page 265 in the BCP!). Take a little time each day to read Paul's Letter to the Romans, meditate on od's holy Word, and then join us on Zoom at 7pm on Thursdays!


