To Learn, Live and Teach the Values of the Gospel of Jesus Christ

From the Associate of Education & Music

G REETINGS! My name is Alan Murchie and I'm excited to join the St. James's family in March as Associate for Education and Music. My enormous gratitude to Bob for creating this new position! On Monday (Valentine's Day), I moved into a small house in the Elmwood neighborhood; today I walked into Elmwood Center and had my first haircut at Bristle and Blade, a first glimpse of the Trout Brook Trail, and what will undoubtedly be the first of many visits to Doro Marketplace. It already feels like home, as does St. James's, where I've enjoyed immensely playing both the organ and piano over the past several years for a number of services and concerts.

I'm in my twelfth year at Fairfield University as Lecturer in Religious Studies and Music History. This semester, I'm offering courses in early music (we're currently studying the music that filled newly-built cathedrals in the 12th and 13th centuries) and the writings of Paul (we're about to start Galatians). I'm excited to collaborate with Jonathan Smith in an offering here at St. James's built around Paul's unique, transformative, personal, and deeply inspiring theology of the cross. I'll begin at St. James's on Tuesday, March 1, on the threshold of Lent, our church's season of renewal and reflection and an ideal time for a deep dive into Paul.

Lent also brings us the chance to savor some of our tradition's most beautiful music! I look forward over the next few weeks to a close look at the St. James's choral library and some time at the beautiful Austin organ to immerse myself once again in the music of Bach, Byrd, Victoria, Palestrina, Mozart, Howells and more. I'll head over to the piano as well for some of the great spirituals of our shared tradition and the revival hymns that capture so beautifully the sense of discipleship and devotion that lie at Lent's heart.

When I first came to meet with Bob and discuss this possibility, we had a great conversation in his office. It was a Sunday afternoon and the building was very quiet as we began. Yet after awhile I began to pick up on some musical activity in the building. Though a floor and a few rooms away, it wasn't long before I began to recognize the music as the Mendelssohn Violin Concerto, a personal favorite. The playing was so good that I had to ask Bob if he knew where the sound was coming from and who was playing. It turns out the violinist is a member of our community and that her brother is also a musician. I've been back a few times since and run into a pianist and two excellent organists. How thrilling that this community is so alive with music and so filled with music-makers!

I look forward greatly to beginning our time of shared ministry together.

Walking the Way in Song and Word: A Lenten Playlist

What is Lent? Two answers are commonly offered: (1) It comes from an old word for "spring" and (2) it's short for "lengthen." Both work. It's a time of rebirth as the days once again lengthen. What is it that might come back to life over these forty days as we walk this luminous, life-giving way together? Sometimes music helps us find an answer. Feeling somewhat adrift? Lent can be a time of coming back, of starting anew, fresh and open — a time of recharging. Great music can strike something deep within us. As time permits, I invite you to browse through the following Lenten Playlist. The music comes from a wide range of styles, from American shape-note to the Spanish Renaissance to contemporary praise. May God's sustaining grace and peace be with you through the season. ~Alan

Anthems and Motets

† Grant Us Your Peace (Mendelssohn) <u>https://youtu.be/kEQSCeporv0</u>

Mendelssohn was a young man exploring his own faith when he wrote this small masterpiece. The men begin, accompanied by a beguiling duet for two cellos; the women follow. The peak comes when all sing together. In this way, Mendelssohn subtly offers us Luther's words as a prayer for each of us and for the world: *Grant us your peace, in mercy, Lord. In our time, send us peace. For there is none other than you who brings peace.*

† Ave verum corpus (Mozart) <u>https://youtu.be/AEVG HIr-zI</u>

Written months before he died, there's a hush in Mozart's setting of these words (from the High Middle Ages) of adoration and wonder, of the great mystery that the divine one would come to be with us, emptied of power, to offer himself to and for us.

† O vos omnes (Tomás Luis de Victoria) https://youtu.be/O0XbjhvK4yE

This brief, devotional motet is arresting in its simple, raw power. With silence, with a descending scale (the notes moving down in each voice) and with poignant harmonies, the composer brings Jeremiah's words of pain fully to life: *Pay attention, all people, and look at my sorrow, if there be any sorrow like my sorrow.*

Congregational Hymns

When I Survey the Wondrous Cross <u>https://youtu.be/Z9eCUqz_x5A</u>

This is a cornerstone Lenten hymn. Though the music was composed 70 years after the words, they are perfectly matched. The music is strong and prayerful. And the poem ends with the call that lies at the heart of the journey: *Love so amazing, so divine demands my soul, my life, my all.*

† What Wondrous Love Is This <u>https://youtu.be/DsVnvN3EVxY</u>

This stark, rustic and gorgeous hymn asks a poignant question: *What wondrous love is this that caused the Lord of bliss to lay aside his crown for my soul?* The melody speaks across time with its modality that echoes ancient chant, while the words and harmonies take us to the camp meetings and revivals of the 19th Century.

This praise song shares evangelical roots with When I Survey the Wondrous Cross and, like the earlier hymn, has achieved wide popularity, crossing over into other traditions including ours. It is a heartfelt prayer for the focus we seek for this season of self-examination and renewal: *Holy, King almighty Lord, Saints and angels all adore; I join with them and bow before Jesus, only Jesus.*

From the Lay-Curate

Throw That Hair Shirt Away!

NYTHING standing in the sun casts a shadow; the brighter the light, the longer the shadow. This is one of those truisms we prefer to avoid because it runs counter to our expectations about spiritual health. On some level, I think everyone desires the kind of transcendence associated with spiritual enlightenment. I certainly notice that in my own life. My attraction to Eastern Christianity, with all of its otherworldly mysticism, definitely has something to do with a longing for encountering God where I imagine God is: Somewhere else. And that is why I am an Episcopalian and not a formal practitioner of Eastern mysticism. Our devotional practices — including the rhythm of the liturgical calendar — provide the ideal structure and paradigm for reminding me to look for God where God is, rather than where I imagine he should be. This is especially true in the late-winter penitential season of Holy Lent.

In my experience, we too often associate Lent with a certain self-denying asceticism. Penitentiaries are for penitence. Lent is for hair shirts and self-flagellation. Where does this idea come from? This idea that God hates the body and the world that God created? I think such notions say more about the limitations of the human mind than they do about the nature of God, particularly a God who chose to reveal himself by becoming incarnate in flesh just like ours.


Mysteries are tricky things. Every season in the church year reveals its own mysteries and ways of knowing God better, which always involves some amount of paradox and confounding of expectations. When I was younger, I never would have imagined that the traditions and theology of Eastern Orthodox Chrisitanity would nourish my Anglican practice to the degree they do today. Rather than groveling and donning hair shirts, Eastern Christianity has helped me to see the penitential season of Advent as preparation for celebrating "God with us" and that of Lent as preparation for celebrating "God for us." To enter into Easter's season of restoration to wholeness, we need to clean out the clutter that distracts us and keeps us from God. Tossing the hair shirts out of our closets is an excellent place to start!

Following Christ's example means recognizing our shadow sides and bringing them into the light. God loves us and accepts our whole selves — shadows and all. If God can do that, so can we.

HE last few weeks have been what I hope is the beginning of a transition back to safer and more normal activities here in Greater Hartford. In a letter to the West Hartford School staff, students, and parents in mid-February, our superintendent Tom Moore pointed out that our vaccination rates in West Hartford are among the five highest in the state. There are 94% of children 12 -17 fully vaccinated, and 64% of children 5-11 fully vaccinated. My guess is that at St. James's our vaccination rates are even higher.

As the days get longer and the weather gets warmer, there is so much happening here at St. James's, and we are trying our best to get things rolling for our smallest parishioners. Back in mid-February, we began offering nursery care again. This is a great service which makes attending church a possibility for people with toddlers. Thank you so much to our many nursery care workers who make this possible. Our plan is to offer nursery care every Sunday until the summer months when attendance of young families tends to be leaner. This is one more step back toward normality! Alleluia! As has been the case every Sunday, we will continue with KFC (Kids for Christ) during the 9:30 service. This is appropriate for children three through elementary school.

At KFC this Lent, we will explore Gospel passages that remind us that God is still with us through a curriculum from Illustrated Ministries. This is a curriculum I have purchased in the past, and I love the lessons and the coloring pages! In this curriculum we will explore the Good News of the gospel—that Jesus experienced in the fullness of humanity—comfort and pain, celebration and heartache, and joy and suffering, and when he had the choice to escape ridicule or rejection, Jesus stuck with the outsiders, the oppressed, and the hurting. We will talk about how the life of Jesus demonstrates that God knows what it is to be human and to be with us in all our experiences, especially in our suffering. Starting with the First Sunday in Lent and going through Easter, each weekly session will have a scripture, reflection, and coloring pages which we will use during KFC. The kids will bring home discussion questions and prayers to share with their families during the week. I think it will be great.

Coming in March, we will have a middle school movie and pizza night on Sunday, March 13. The evening will begin at 5:00 with a pizza dinner. We will let you know what time it will end when I know the movie we will be watching. Please encourage your middle schoolers to come and bring friends. RSVP to me

at education@stjameswh.org so that I know how much pizza to order. Our middle schoolers are a great group, and many friendships have been fostered by attending youth events together. When kids are friends with other kids at church, it makes it much easier to get them out of bed on Sunday mornings! It is easier to foster these friendships in middle school than it is when they enter high school, so please encourage your middle schoolers to come!

Something to look forward to again this year is the Easter Egg Hunt after the service on Easter morning, April 17. This is a highlight of the church year and a wonderful time to celebrate as a congregation!

So, that is it. There is a lot coming up in the next two months. Make the most of it all, you and your family will be glad you did.

N Sunday, April 3, Bishop Ian Douglas, Diocesan Bishop of the Episcopal Church in Connecticut, will be visiting St. James's. This will be our last visit from Bishop Ian prior to his retirement in October of this year. We will have one service that Sunday at 10:00 in the hopes that we can all gather together in worship. During the service, Bishop Ian will be confirming and receiving many teens and adult members of our parish. After the service we will have a reception/coffee hour in the parish hall. We hope that you will join us!

Adult Confirmation and Reception into the Episcopal Church *Classes Begin in March*

S. T. JAMES'S OLY confirmed to be confirmed or for those who have been confirmed in other denominations to be received into the Episcopal Church when Bishop Ian Douglas visits us on April 3. Bishop Douglas will lead a sacramental service for those ready to, "express a mature commitment to Christ, and receive strength from the Holy Spirit through prayer and the laying on of hands by a bishop" (BCP, p. 860). In preparation, adult candidates for Confirmation and Reception will participate in a class lasting about an hour-and-a-half, most likely in March (date TBD). If you are not able to attend at the scheduled time, other arrangements will be made. This is a fantastic way to learn about the traditions and practices Episcopal Church, particularly our Book of Common Prayer.




