

From the Rector's Desk

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

As we finalize St. James's budget for 2023, we definitely find ourselves in a good news-bad news situation. First, the good news: pledges are at an all-time high. (Thank you!) We have received 28 new pledges this year, which is both a sign of health and growth. The average pledge has increased to nearly \$4,000. More significantly, we have a great team in place with the addition of the Revs. Murchie and Rose. Sunday attendance is increasing (if a little slowly) and the Holy Spirit is alive and well at St. James's.

Now, the bad news (or should we say the opportunity): staffing costs are up; the costs of utilities and insurance have skyrocketed; and we are working to return to the pre-pandemic draw on our endowment. At the same time, our assessment to the Diocese and, by extension, the National Church has increased (this is formulaic). All of this leaves us with a \$115,000 shortfall.

We have looked into every line of the budget and have made adjustments wherever possible. The bottom line is that if we are going to continue doing all the things that we do together to be faithful to God's call and our St. James's family – faithful and high-quality mission and outreach, worship and music, opportunities for our youth and children, strong and meaningful pastoral care and fellowship, and myriad other things – we need to close this gap.

That's some of the good news and the bad news. But the best news is that I know together, with God's help, we can do it.

So, this is where we are: \$115,000 short of fully funding this year's budget. I am quite certain that with the prayerful and generous help of the good people of St. James's, we can close this gap. Every contribution helps: big gifts or small. If you have not yet pledged for 2023, please do so. If you have already pledged, thank you, and please consider an additional one-time gift or an increase in your pledge. From the Assistant Rector

It's hard to believe that I have been with you as assistant rector for six months – 50 percent of a calendar year, two seasons of creation, half of a full orbit around the sun. Serving you and getting to know you has been one of the great joys of my life. I love that our relationship in community has matured enough that we are having real conversations together about everything from theology, prayer practice, and ministry to my love of mountain biking and why I still listen to music on vinyl.

Often, these conversations start with questions that you bring to me at gatherings such as coffee hour and Trivia Night. With that in mind, I thought I would offer up the first in an occasional series of Q&A's. The following are actual questions (or amalgamations of the same question asked several times) that I have heard in recent weeks.

Q: What did it feel like to be ordained a priest?

EAR St. James's Family,

A: It's hard to put it into words. So I'll offer three (priests, after all, like things in three): Wondrous. Humbling. Joyful. This is a new thing. During my first five months at St. James's, I was a deacon, meaning I was ordained to proclaim the Gospel, to teach, and to be a pastor but could not sanctify or perform sacramental duties such as baptisms and celebrating the Eucharist. But on the night of January 31, Bishop Jeffrey Mello, with your support, ordained me at St. James's to be a priest in the church.

One of the most powerful moments came during the singing of the hymn "Veni Creator Spiritus," the prayer of consecration, and the laying on of hands. In those few minutes, a rush of memories from times when I have encountered the Holy Spirit in my life washed over me – the comforting glow of my grandfather's "Jesus light," running through the forest in the rain as a boy, my conversion at 18, my baptism, and a misty mountaintop experience in Ireland, among others. Any restlessness, worry or fear from the journey suddenly gave way to clarity, relief, and excitement.

Yes, committing myself to Holy Orders was the culmination of years of discernment, study, and prayer. But it was also a wondrous, humbling and joyful thing because it happened here with you and among you, in your loving and holy embrace. I feel so privileged that I would be able to walk through my first Lent and Easter (and every other church season) as a priest with you at St. James's. The Spirit was also moving in how you all welcomed so many of my friends, family, and visiting clergy, many of whom had traveled cross-country to be at the service. Thank you to everyone who demonstrated how, for generations, St. James's has been a spiritual home of thoughtful, prayerful, and generous people. Looking around, soaking it in, many of my friends remarked that God had called me to a remarkable place. Yes, I replied, I thank God every day that I am here. Of course, ordination is just the beginning. "Becoming" a priest happens as we walk together to do God's transformative and liberating work together on the road ahead.

Q: What is this I'm hearing about a Good News Garden and greenhouse at St. James's?

A: The Good News Garden is just the new name for the community garden that has been planted and harvested as part of our feeding ministry for 12 years. It is, after all, a prophetic and holy thing to make things new. This is an exciting new chapter for our agrarian ministry on the east side of the church building. We are now officially part of the Episcopal Church's national Good News Gardens network, giving us access to an abundance of resources to cultivate this ministry. This spring, we plan to build a 10-by-18-foot greenhouse, which will allow us to provide more fresh vegetables through our feeding partnership with the Hartford Catholic Worker. It will also provide a gathering place for prayer services and education at the intersection of Creation Care and food justice. It will be powered by a solar panel and will feature a rainbarrel drip-tube system. We also plan a pollinator garden, planted by the children of St. James's, which will benefit the ecosystem of plants and trees in the surrounding neighborhood. If you would like to volunteer your time in the garden this year, let me know.

Q: Can you recommend a good book to read as part of my spiritual journey during Lent?

A: Yes. Here are some suggestions for the pilgrimage through this season of prayer, repentance and renewal:

- "Daily Prayer with the Corrymeela Community" by Pádraig Ó Tuama
- "The Night is Long But Light Comes in the Morning" by Catherine Meeks
- "Beating Guns: Hope for People Who Are Weary of Violence" by Shane Claiborne and Michael Martin
- "Seven Last Words: Cross and Creation" by Andrew McGowan
- "Never Said a Mumbalin Word" by Mark Bozzuti-Jones
- "Unapologetic: Why, Despite Everything, Christianity Can Still Make Surprising Emotional Sense" by Francis Spufford
- "Dust Bunnies in the Basket" by Tim Schenk, with illustrations from Jay Sidebotham

I also like to put together music playlists on Spotify or Apple Music to provide soundtracks for the different church seasons. (Often, they inspire sermon writing.) To help you get started with your own Lenten playlist, here are five suggestions:

- "Adagietto" from Gustav Mahler's "Symphony No. 5"
- "40" by U2
- "Mary" by Patty Griffin
- John Tavener's "The Veil of the Temple"
- "Seven Psalms" by Nick Cave.

Keep those questions coming. I'm looking forward to continuing the conversation as we journey into hope in the months ahead.

From the Associate for Education & Music

Doug Williams, baritone and Alan Murchie, piano The Four Loves—Sunday, March 12 at 4 PM

N tandem with a four-week adult forum on C. S. Lewis's "The Four Loves," bass-baritone Doug Williams will join me for a concert on Sunday, March 12 exploring and celebrating the the theme of love — both divine and human — through the prism of music.

What are the four loves? C. S. Lewis believed that we can find four distinct loves in scripture: *eros* or romantic love, *philia* or love between friends, *storge* or instinctual affection (such as the bond between parent and child), and *agape* or gracious, "gift" love, also known as *caritas* or charity. In this concert we will explore all four.

Felix Mendelssohn: Trois Fantasies, Opus 16

Mendelssohn's three exquisite fantasies, for piano solo, are each palpable and vivid examples of *philia*, or the love between friends. The pieces reflect his friendship with each of three women he came to know while on an extended visit to Great Britain. C. S. Lewis describes *philia* as the most unlikely of our human loves: our friendships derive not from need but from shared fascinations or from the ease, naturalness and delight we feel in another's presence. Mendelssohn wrote about his friendships in his travel diary and explained how each piece captured a particular friendship, one made in walks alongside a river, one made in conversation, and one grounded in a shared optimism and lightness of spirit.

Ralph Vaughan Williams: "Love Bade Me Welcome," from Five Mystical Songs

This song sets a poem simply called "Love" by the great 17th-Century mystic George Herbert. In the poem, God (known in the poem as "Love") engages in extended dialogue with the poet, who feels unworthy of such unmerited, gracious attention from God. At one point, the poet tells God that his eyes have strayed and are thus unworthy of looking back upon the divine. God replies, memorably and poignantly, "Who made those eyes but I?" The song is an extended and gorgeous meditation on *agape* love: the unmerited, gracious love of God for us; the love we are, through the power of the Spirit, invited to extend to the world.

Robert and Clara Schumann: Romances for Piano

These beautiful brief pieces for piano say what can't ever fully be said: that mix of passion, ardor, commitment, longing, completion and more that characterize the coming together of two souls. We use the term *eros* but it doesn't seem to capture all of what this love really is, as two become one, both mystically and quite palpably. Clara and Robert loved each other as husband and wife and as fellow creative artists, overcoming obstacles from the very beginning as Clara's musician father wanted something more for Clara than he believed Robert could provide. Clara loved her father, but she wound up marrying Robert over his objection and writing a deeply poignant letter that included these words: "To never know this love would be, I believe, to be only half alive."

Johannes Brahms: Lullaby

Finally, our recital explores the fourth of the four loves C. S. Lewis identifies: known as *storge*, it's the natural, instinctual love that was the first love we felt as humans. One might call it attachment or affection. It's the fierce love a parent feels for a child, for example; the love that begins in need ultimately can become among the deepest and truest loves. Lewis will see it poignantly in our love for God: at heart, in many ways, this is among the most elemental "need loves" we will feel as humans. Brahms celebrates it in his justly famous lullaby as a parent sings to a child: "Watched over by angels, good evening, good night! Sleep sweetly and behold paradise in your dreams."

In addition to these works, the concert will include Brahms' Four Serious Songs, which he wrote in response to the loss of his dear friend Clara Schumann. We'll conclude with classic love songs by Irving Berlin, Jerome Kern and Cole

S we head into the months of March and April, Lent is here! When you are reading this, we will have had the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper and the Ash Wednesday service. - 9. say something kind to a family member


- 10. say something kind to a friend

- 18. do someone else's laundry
- 19. clean a bathroom (I particularly like this one!)
- 21. make someone else's bed
- 22. set aside some of your own money for giving to church

- 26 fast from candy
- 27. fast from a bad habit




