From the Rector's Desk

As we prepare to enter the season of Lent, I have been thinking about the fact that most Episcopal churches have a corporate/communal confession as part of their Eucharistic liturgy on most Sundays, with the exceptions of baptisms and the Easter season. The Episcopal Church does provide for private confession with an individual, and a priest to hear the confession and pronounce absolution. This, although not very common in The Episcopal Church, can be done by using the Office of Reconciliation as provided for in The Book of Common Prayer. It has been my practice over the years to offer private confessions at all times and especially during Lent, although few people have availed themselves of it. If you are interested, or feel so called, please contact me or Charlotte LaForest.

The General Confession used during the typical Sunday Eucharistic liturgy, I believe, plays a very important role in helping remind us of our need to acknowledge that not everything we do is a manifestation of the Grace of God that is so freely and abundantly given. In The Episcopal Church there are a number of General Confessions offered, but the one that I think speaks most clearly is the one that we use at St. James's on a regular basis.

God of all mercy, we confess that we have sinned against you, opposing your will in our lives. We have denied your goodness in each other, in ourselves, and in the world you have created. We repent of the evil that enslaves us, the Evil We Have Done, and the Evil Done On Our Behalf. Forgive, restore, and strengthen us through our Savior Jesus Christ, that we may abide in your love and serve only your will. **Amen.**

This particular confession acknowledges in the very first line that we often fall short of all that God has blessed us with, and then makes it clear that our treatment of others is frequently the way by which we do this. The other piece of this confession that I find very important is the statement, the Evil We Have Done, and the Evil Done On Our Behalf. These words remind us that we need to remember that our inactions can be just as dangerous and damaging as our actions. In other words, the sins of omission and commission.

While the spiritual realities of sin in our lives is not something I tend to focus on very frequently, I do believe that it is liberating to remind ourselves that we are called through our Baptismal Covenant "to persevere in resisting evil, and whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord." It is also a powerful spiritual discipline to acknowledge our failings and to know that God will guide us in living fuller and more grace-filled lives.

So, in the words read during the Ash Wednesday liturgy, "I invite you, therefore, in the name of the Church, to the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's holy Word. And, to make a right beginning..."

Here are some ways you can support St. James's Youth Mission Trip To Ecuador:

- 1. Pray for everyone going on the mission trip, as we make our preparations, and for safety while we travel. Pray for our time in Ecuador, that we would encounter God in new ways as we serve the people of Chimborazo Province and assist the FIBUSPAM clinic. Pray for the people of Ecuador.
- 2. Participate in car washes and any other fundraising events organized by our youth throughout the spring and early summer. Get to know our youth, get a clean car, and have some fun too!
- 3. Donate to our fundraising efforts (you knew this was coming!). We will need to raise a significant amount of money to make this trip possible and can't do it without your help. There are several ways you can donate:

 - Send a check with Mission Trip in the memo line made out to St. James's Episcopal Church.
- 4. Share our posts and fundraising pages on social media. Email or write to friends and family asking them to support our trip. Make it personal. Include photos. Invite others to be a part of this work God has called us to do together this year.
- 5. Ask your company if they would be willing to make a tax-deductible donation or participate in a matching challenge as a sponsor for our trip. This may be of particular interest for companies in the healthcare, pharmaceutical, or insurance industries, but others may be interested as well.

From the Organist & Choirmaster

ear Parishioners,

Please join us on Saturday, March 9 at 7pm for the choir's annual concert with orchestra. This year we will feature choral works of Felix Mendelssohn, one of Western music's greatest composers and musicians. The concert is free and open to the public, so please invite your family, friends and neighbors!


For a long time, especially into the 20th century, critics relegated Mendelssohn's music to an invisible second tier. Wildly popular works like Elijah - his large oratorio for choir, orchestra and soloists - were said to be melodramatic, even saccharine. And it is true that Elijah conveys the incredible drama in the stories which the music sets. The score is stylistically grand, flashy, and magnificent, representing music of the period, yet Elijah and other 'hits' like his incidental music to A Midsummer Night's Dream have been audience favorites since their writing. Our concert will close with three choruses from Elijah: "Thanks Be To God!"; "He Watching Over Israel"; and "And Then Shall Your Light Break Forth!".

I am also excited to feature another dimension of Mendelssohn's music: his homage to J. S. Bach and the baroque. Widely credited with reintroducing Bach's music to concert audiences and musicians alike, Mendelssohn became smitten with Bach's choral music early in his life whilst preparing to conduct the St. Matthew Passion. Taking inspiration from the form and style of Bach's passion settings, he composed a set of eight sacred cantatas for choir, soloists and orchestra. In our concert we will perform his setting of the Passion Chorale and the Agnus Dei.

As a bonus, the orchestra will perform the first of Mendelssohn's 12 string symphonies, written at age 12. The C Major is youthful and effervescent, showing off Mendelssohn's prodigious childhood talent. Other works will include his famous setting of Hear My Prayer for soprano soloist, choir and organ, and Verleih' uns Frieden for choir and strings.



was recently reading an article in Oprah Magazine about how people, or in this case, women, were more stressed now than ever before. When I was reading this article in Oprah, I wanted to scream at the magazine, "You could all solve this unhappiness and lack of fulfillment if you found a strong supportive community of faith!" I realize that finding a loving, supportive community of faith can be a challenge and that all are not that way, but I feel that we have that here at St. James's and for that I am forever grateful. The following are just some examples of our supportive faith community that I witnessed:

- An eighth grade boy who helped me with KFC (Kids for Christ) without being asked. He has grown up in the parish and was a great role model when I had 16 boys and 3 girls and a lesson planned about love.
- A parishioner who saw Charlotte LaForest walking into church with the twins and August, and helped carry one of the twins to the nursery.
- A kindergartener who shared his Legos with a preschooler in the pews, even sharing his most favorite Darth Vader Lego.


- A man who was not related who gave encouragement to a new acolyte who was nervous.

- Beautiful flowers lovingly created by Maryann Haar, to commemorate the lives of those in our community who have died.




