From the Rector's Desk

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

I am writing this on Tuesday, April 25, 2023, after a very fun, busy and hope-filled weekend here at St. James's. As I reflect on the past few weeks, I am reminded about all the things I love about our parish and you all.

On Easter, we gathered in large numbers to celebrate the resurrection, to hear beautiful music, sing some of our favorite hymns, and gather after the service to spend time in fellowship. The week prior, we put together and delivered over 200 Easter "baskets" full of toiletries for individuals and families living in shelters in the Hartford area. Since Easter, we have welcomed Journey Home Inc. into our building as they set up their new offices here at St. James's. As a parish, we have a long relationship with Journey Home in supporting their mission to serve unhoused people in the area and this is an opportunity to take that to new levels. Stay tuned for new and exciting ways to be a part of their mission and God's. We also continued our decadeslong sandwich and casserole making to help feed many through the good work of Loaves and Fishes and South Park Inn (shelter).

A couple of weeks ago a group of us met to build new garden beds, screen, and transfer tons of dirt and compost, and begin preparing the foundation for the new greenhouse. The Good News Garden group has already begun planting and I look forward to living into the expansion of this part of our feeding ministry.

With all that happening, this past weekend (April 22 & 23) was in many ways an encapsulation of so much that is good, faithful, and fun about life at St. James's. On Saturday, we held our first choir dinner in 5 years (let's not wait that long next time) with nearly 120 people in attendance, a good meal and wonderful music performed by our parish choir. It was a fantastic night and THANK YOU to everyone who helped make it a success. Then, on Sunday, we welcomed The Most Rev. Naudal Alves Gomes, retired Anglican archbishop of Brazil, and his lovely wife Carmen. Naudal reflected in his sermon on Jesus being revealed in the breaking of bread. We also welcomed Lyla Maguire and her parents through her baptism. To top off a wonderful celebration, Priscilla and Alan led our youngest choir and the parish in the song, "God's Banner Over Me is Love." It was a fantastic (and exhausting) weekend, and the Spirit of God was truly present and celebrated.



As I reflect on these past few weekends, the years preceding and those to come, I am reminded of what an incredible privilege it is to be a part of such an extraordinary ministry and family. And if I haven't said it recently — I love this Church and its people.

From the Assistant Rector

EAR St. James's Family,

As we welcome the blossoming of spring in West Hartford, I hope you are making time to experience the Holy through God's glorious and healing creation. As I write this, I'm thinking of St. Francis of Assisi's "Canticle of the Sun." The birds, the wind, the stars, "all weather's moods": They are a reminder that the Resurrection is happening around us, inviting us to never stop being Easter people.

Now that I hopefully have you pondering the gifts of nature, and the stewardship of those precious gifts, I want to make sure you know that we will gather to celebrate a Creation Care Eucharist on Rogation Sunday, May 14 at 9:30am. At the end of the service, we will process to the Walden Street side of the church, near the two newly constructed raised vegetable beds. Together, we will bless the expanding Good News Garden as a faith family in Christ. I'm really excited that we will have this opportunity to process to different stations, including the planting beds, greenhouse construction site, tools and the memorial garden, asking God's love to shine on these sacred spaces in our life together.

A bit of good news about the Good News Garden: The Episcopal Church in Connecticut recently awarded St. James's a community garden grant and a Jack Spaeth Creation Care grant totaling nearly \$900 to spend on our new greenhouse. The greenhouse is expected to be constructed in late June. Meanwhile, I wanted to thank the parishioners who spent a recent Saturday moving soil and building the new planting boxes along Walden Street. Members of the Good News Garden ministry team began planting seeds a few days later. As we know from the gospel readings leading up to Easter, Jesus got his hands dirty to heal. (Remember the mud used to make "the man born blind" see?) There are a lot of ways for us to follow his example right here at St. James's. The most obvious – or at least the most literal – is our Good News Garden ministry. You can get your hands in the mud and feel the heartbeat of our Creator. From the soil, from something ordinary and dirty, God's saving love emerges in the form of vegetables to feed the hungry. Isn't that like God's grace? Isn't that beautiful?

Consider Psalm 23, perhaps the Bible's most beloved Psalm. Here's a little biblical exposition: The "green pastures" imply food for all and a place where no one goes wanting. The "cup overflowing" implies a need to share, especially at a time when one in ten Hartford area households still live with food insecurity.

As we prepare for Rogation Sunday, know that you will be participating in a liturgy that traces its roots to the early Church. Rogation comes from the Latin "rogare" – to "ask for" God's blessings and mercy. The tradition began in Vienne, France, in 470, as the Roman Empire faded from history. A wave of natural disasters had decimated the town's crops. Rogationtide was the Church's liturgical response. In the sixth century, the observance of special rogation days of prayers for crops was ordered, along with decrees about ecclesiastical concerns such as sanctuary and Episcopal authority, by the thirty-two bishops at the First Council of Orleans. Traditionally, the fifth Sunday after Easter Sunday is Rogation Sunday. The following Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday are "Rogation Days," which are dedicated to fasting and prayer leading up to Ascension Day.

In England, according to An Episcopal Dictionary of the Church, rogation days were associated with the blessing of the fields at planting. "The vicar 'beat the bounds' of the parish, processing around the fields reciting psalms and the litany." The liturgical tradition traveled to the U.S. colonies. In the United States, rogation days have long been associated with rural life, agriculture and fishing. The liturgical texts in the Book of Common Prayer were eventually expanded to include commerce, industry and the stewardship of creation. The ancient Christian observance consisted of an outdoor procession which culminated in a special celebration of the Eucharist. Following the rubrics of the Episcopal Church, our procession will take place after the Eucharist on Rogation Sunday outside St. James's. I hope to see you on May 14 for Rogation Sunday.

If you can't make it for some reason, I would like to offer this Rogation Day collect to pray next to your own plants and gardens at home:

Almighty God, Lord of heaven and earth: We humbly pray that your gracious providence may give and preserve to our use the harvests of the land and of the seas, and may prosper all who labor to gather them, that we, who are constantly receiving good things from your hand, may always give you thanks; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen

Pentecost commemorates the great day on which the Spirit commissioned us all as disciples, equipping us each to speak in unique tongues so that all might come to hear and know Jesus in spirit, truth and love. On this day, we speak in the potent musical language of jazz, a uniquely communicative musical idiom, captured by composer Will Todd in his Missa Brevis. Charitable Contribution Information

F you are older than 70 and ½, did you know that you can make donations directly from your IRA to St. James's – and not pay taxes on those donations? Further, you can use these qualified charitable distributions (or QCD for short) to help meet your required minimum distributions (RMDs) once you reach age 73. Because RMDs represent income, they can sometimes push people into a higher tax bracket than they would otherwise be in, potentially triggering more income tax, a Medicare surtax, an increase in Medicare Part B and D premiums and taxation of Social Security benefits. So re-directing some or all of your RMDs to St. James's and/or other charitable organizations may be a smart tax strategy while helping you support the church. If you're interested in exploring QCDs and how they can help you and the organizations you support, please check with your financial advisor or institution that holds your IRA account(s), and/or your tax advisor. **NOTE:** If you're of any age, you also can donate to St. James's or another charity any appreciated stock with embedded capital gains, take a tax-deduction (if you itemized your deductions) and not have to pay capital gains taxes! If you'd like to do this, there are directions in the 'Donate Stock' page (under the Resources tab) on our website.
