

From the Rector's Desk

Dear Siblings in Christ,

In Matthew 25, Jesus tells a powerful story of what it means to live a life of faith: "Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink?... And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these... you did it to me'" (Matthew 25:37–40). This passage reminds us that our faith is not only about what we believe—it is about how we live. We encounter Jesus not just in prayer and worship, but in the faces of those in need, in acts of compassion, and in moments of service.

This summer, Priscilla, Rob, and I will be taking a group of teenagers to Ecuador on a mission trip that brings this Gospel truth to life. We will travel far from home, not to sightsee or relax, but to serve—walking alongside the vulnerable, assisting a medical team with PACH (Physicians for Andean Community Health), and listening deeply to the lives and stories of others. In doing so, they will learn what it means to see Jesus in those who are often overlooked, and to reflect Christ's love through their own actions.

Having led many mission trips over the years, I can tell you they are about much more than just helping others—they are about transformation. Teenagers return from these experiences changed. They gain perspective, courage, empathy, and a deeper connection to their faith. They begin to understand that faith is not passive; it is active, alive, and world-shaping. They come back ready to serve not just for one week in the summer, but in their daily lives—with their friends, in their schools, and throughout their communities.

As a community of faith, we invest in these experiences because we believe in the power of young people to lead lives of faithful service. We believe that when they serve, they grow. When they step out of their comfort zones, God steps in. And when they love boldly, they become living witnesses to the Gospel.

From the Assistant Rector

EAR St. James's Community,

I write to you in the wake of Holy Week. As the dust settles from a busy week of services, I find myself reflecting on my first Holy Week as a priest. I am especially grateful to have shared this experience with a community like St. James's. Throughout this journey, you have been unwaveringly supportive, forgiving, and merciful as I have stepped into this new ministry. While this has been my personal experience, I realize that such kindness is deeply rooted in the character of this community and is reflected in the very virtues and graces we encountered as we walked together with Jesus to the cross and were reminded once again of the mystery of his resurrection.

Holy Week is framed by Maundy Thursday and Easter Sunday. I had the privilege of preaching on Maundy Thursday and was struck by how both sacraments—Baptism and the Eucharist—come together in that service. While Jesus does not directly baptize his disciples on Maundy Thursday, he washes their feet and reminds them that they are "already clean," recalling their baptism even as he heads to the cross and institutes the Lord's Supper, saying, "This is my body." At our baptism and at the Lord's Table, we are incorporated into the body of Christ. Baptism is a one-time, decisive inclusion into the Church and into the embrace of God. At the Lord's Table, we are continually and repeatedly infused with grace as we encounter the real presence of our Lord. What a stunning pattern of life this is! Through it, we are regularly and deeply rooted in the way of grace and love.

On Good Friday, the tone shifts dramatically. We are confronted with the agony, rejection, and loss that our Lord experienced. Good Friday dispels any temptation to sentimentalize our celebrations; it compels us to face the reality that grace and love are never cheap. They come through the divine choice to enter fully into human suffering and loss. Good Friday leaves us with the altar stripped, the

lights dimmed, and a reverent silence. I find it spiritually vital not to rush through the darkness and silence of Good Friday. As we ponder the suffering and darkness that our Lord willingly embraced, we are profoundly humbled and left in silence.

Finally, I was overjoyed to have the honor of celebrating the Eucharist on Easter morning. It is because of the resurrection that we can experience the living presence of Jesus Christ at the Lord's Table today. I was moved on Easter morning when I said (as the celebrant does every Sunday) in the Eucharistic prayer, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you." In that moment, a profound claim is made: our tradition holds that we meet our risen Lord at this table. Christ is alive and is encountered in the breaking of bread. As we partake together, we receive the very body of our Lord and are transformed to become more like him. We are, therefore, a eucharistic community, patterned in the ways of Christ and empowered to express his presence to the world. I am convinced that the love and grace I have experienced as a new priest in the St. James's community are directly connected to the fact that we are a eucharistic community. We live Easter morning every Sunday, and increasingly, every day of the week. We are a community that lives into faith, hope, and love. Let's continue in this way!

From the Organist & Director of Music


Dear St. James's Community,

S summer awaits and we wrap up our first program year together, I'd like to express my deepest gratitude for the musical community here and to offer a glimpse of what happens behind the scenes on any given week:

Every Monday around 4:00pm, children begin arriving with their parents - the kids often dashing in ahead of the adults and racing down the stairs, where Mrs. Priscilla and Miss Lou are already hosting a variety of crafts and games. Building blocks, doll houses, watercolor palettes, and packets of colored markers are quickly opened up, with kids gravitating toward different activities. Evie, Emily, and Haddie will likely want to show me their rainbow drawings. Mae and Charlotte often have wonderfully off-topic comments or stories to share. Rory is always excited to serve me plastic toy meals, with elaborate explanations of each. Liam and Max often enjoy more solitary constructions with building blocks, where they can focus on their corner creations. After everyone signs in on the board and wraps up their initial projects, we make our way into the hall. Everyone forms a circle so we can all stretch and warm up our voices. Sometimes we'll do memory and musical improvisation games, where each child contributes a unique pattern - either pitched or rhythmic - and we all celebrate the wildly creative individual bits. Then we'll learn songs - often with invented choreography or body-rhythm components. This year we've memorized 12 songs from all over the world. Then the kids have a brief snack time of pretzels - which always involves the kids trying to balance the pretzels on their noses to form "pretzel glasses" - followed by a discussion activity with Priscilla back in the classroom.

Then, about an hour later, the cloisters are again ringing with the sounds of little ones exiting and entering as the children leave and the choristers arrive. They race down the stairs into their respective rehearsal room: a circle of chairs next to an upright piano. Their sign-ins are hardly ever a plain signature, but rather elaborately scribbled smiley faces, self-identified nicknames, little jokes and nonsenses. As they gather, Father Rob leads a game of sorts, with Lyla assisting intuitively. When everyone is gathered, the choristers pull out their choir folders and we begin our rehearsal. In addition to learning repertoire, we spend a good deal of time developing musicianship. Sometimes this means short notational exercises where the kids are coached in composing 4-8 measure phrases. Often it will mean taking turns reading and practicing new rhythmic values or solfege dictation (with hand symbols). Sometimes we do sight-reading, where the kids (individually, in pairs, or all together) sight-read rhythms or melodies. Mack and Walter usually team up to figure stuff out. Wesley and Camden often have little scrapes from their basketball or soccer practice previously that day. Wes always has urgent, enthusiastic questions. Gideon is quite focused and often shares unique, funny observations, much like Camden. Laurel has a huge, beautiful voice and often needs to be reminded to calm down. Louisa often looks like she's distracted, with her feet on the chair, but learns quickly and is a strong singer. Porsche is relatively quiet and focused. Lyla is always observant and quickly jumps to the aid of anyone who might be falling behind. At the end of rehearsal, Father Rob will often lead a short discussion before snack distribution, which concludes our time together.

On Wednesdays, the adult choir rehearses in the large rehearsal space underneath the sanctuary. The anthems are displayed on wooden stands and the music schedule is written on the white board. Often singers will arrive early to warm up their voices. The adult choir is a bit of a misnomer as we also have 5 pre-teen and teenage members, which is a wonderful opportunity for our youngest to dig into advanced repertoire they may otherwise never be exposed to in school. We go through music relatively quickly and sing through a variety of anthems from Anglican favorites of Vaughn Williams, Byrd, Tallis, Stainer, Stanford, etc. to modern works, folk songs, spirituals, etc. Rehearsal closes with announcements and a prayer

On occasion, we'll meet up afterward for drinks or snacks somewhere nearby. In the adult choir, you'll find the most welcoming and generous people, including many who have extensive experience singing in ensembles, studying music in college, etc. You'll find current and retired music teachers as well as board members for

some of the most revered music organizations in our state. It is a fantastic, skilled group of singers and I consider myself the luckiest music director to work with them twice a week.

In addition to our 3 resident choirs (children, choristers, & adult choir), our spaces are frequently ringing with the sounds of numerous other choirs which rehearse or concertize here, from the Hartford Chorale putting together large-scale symphonic works to Music Together, with dozens of mothers and babies clapping out rhythms and simple songs in the Parish Hall on weekday mornings. There's also a fair amount of piano students and organ students as well as organists from our community who come through every week to practice and learn.

And of course there's Sunday, which is just a small representation of what happens here at St. James's.

It has been an absolute joy and honor to join the vibrant St.

James's family - to meet all these fabulous singers and music enthusiasts of so many ages and backgrounds, and to witness the growth that happens each week. For as much as we use our newsletters, social media posts, e-blasts, and worship announcements to highlight the special music events that happen here - and there are so, so many -



it is also important to celebrate the weekly routines where we see children stretching their wings and singing their first solos, choristers mentoring each other in solfege, friendships built and new repertoire learned among the adult choir, etc. What a blessing indeed. Thank you.
