From the Assistant Rector

Caring for our Family in Faith

Turning a group of strangers who happen to show up at the same place on a Sunday morning into a Family in Faith doesn't automatically happen. Rather, it happens over time as we worship together, as we engage in service to the community together, as we have fun and enjoy fellowship together, and as we show up for one another in times of need.

I wanted to devote my newsletter article this month to the group whose primary purpose is to care for the members of their church family who are in need—the Pastoral and Healing Ministries of St. James's. This group of men and women care deeply about the people of this parish, from the ones they've known for decades to the ones they've never met. Many of you have benefitted from their ministry as they've prayed for you, delivered food, or visited with communion. But there are some of you who might not have ever had much contact with the Pastoral and Healing Ministries of the church, and wonder what their work has to do with you. Well, since you asked, I'll take some time to tell you! What St. James's Pastoral and Healing Ministries can offer you:

- Someone to talk to when you need a listening ear
- A meal when you or a loved one are sick, have had surgery, or when your family has expanded
- Communion when you have not been able to attend church
- Healing prayer during Sunday services or at other times
- Ongoing prayer for you during a difficult time in your life
- Prayer Shawls to offer comfort and remind you that people are praying for you

There are many ways that you can help others in the St. James's community, whether you're able to do something on a regular basis or on occasion:

- Sign up for the casserole ministry and/or CHEFs (casseroles helping expanding families) email lists to know when a need for casseroles arises.
- Make a casserole or double your recipe for a meal that would freeze well and drop it off at the church. Having meals in our freezer allows the casserole ministry to respond much more quickly as urgent needs arise.
- Commit to praying for those listed on our parish prayer list on a regular basis.
- Join a healing prayer team to pray for one another during times of need.
- Knit a prayer shawl or help deliver one.
- Train as a Lay Eucharistic Visitor to make Communion visits to people unable to attend church.
- Train as a Pastoral Companion to meet with members of the church who would benefit from having someone to talk to on a recurring basis.
- Add your name and areas of skill/expertise to the "Just Call" list, a group that the clergy and staff can call when specific needs arise in the parish.

For all of these ministries the primary qualification is a willingness to care for your Family in Faith. If there is a specific skill or training necessary for a particular ministry, I am happy to connect you with the necessary instruction.

One opportunity for training will happen in early 2019 when I will provide a series of pastoral care workshops to provide information and teach the skills necessary for various types of pastoral and healing ministry. The first workshop will be on the Fundamentals of Pastoral Care, and will include an optional training for Lay Eucharistic Visitors. The second workshop will be on the Theory and Practice of Intercessory Prayer. The final workshop will cover Special Issues in Pastoral Care including Memory Loss and End of Life. These workshops will be a great opportunity to learn and to get involved.

I hope you'll consider participating in these vital ministries of our parish, as we work to build up the Family of Faith we are so blessed to have here at St. James's. The ministry of the Pastoral and Healing Team doesn't seek to replace that of the clergy, rather it amplifies and greatly extends its reach. Please stop by the table for the Pastoral and Healing Ministries at the St. James's Showcase on October 28th to learn more and to sign up for one of the many opportunities to serve!



Treasurer's Report—September 2018

Current Position: : Through September 30, 2018, total Income was \$20,654 over budget and total expenses were \$5,182 greater than budgeted amounts, resulting in a positive variance to budget of \$15,472.

Income: Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) through September 30 were \$13,671 more than the total of the several budgeted amounts. Current Year Pledges were over budget by \$10,943 while the other three categories were over budget by an aggregate amount of \$2,728. For the first nine months of 2018, income from outside groups using the Parish facilities totaled \$23,518 or \$7,470 more than budget. Special Contributions for General Purposes of \$20,862 were \$660 more than budget.

Expense: Major contributors to the Expense results through September 30 were the following: Property: For the period, property expenses were \$2,425 under budget. The Church paid less than budgeted amounts for gas (\$2,709 less), and for general maintenance and repair (\$2,667 less) whereas costs for electricity exceeded the budget amount by \$1,750 and for water by \$549. Snow removal was a breakeven situation with payments exceeding budget by just \$50. Maintenance Supplies, Insurance and Lawn Care exceeded budgeted amounts by the aggregate amount of \$1,045.

Vestry Nominations 2019

HE Vestry Nominating Committee welcomes suggestions, from members of the parish, of persons who they believe would be fine members of our vestry and officers (Senior and Junior Warden, Treasurer and Clerk).

Vestry members must be:

- 1. committed to Jesus Christ;
- 2. regular in attendance at public worship;
- 3. participants in the life and ministry of the congregation;
- solid financial supporters of our ministries;
- 5. be willing to commit to regular attendance at monthly meetings (the 3rd Tuesday), annual vestry retreats, and to serve as liaison with committees or programs within the parish.

The members of this year's Nominating Committee are: Sam Paul, Lesley Toutain, and Abby Fisher Williamson. The Nominating Committee will publish its nominations in the January issue of *The Open Door*.

In accordance with the by-laws of the church, any member may submit a petition to include any other member for inclusion on the ballot as a candidate for the vestry or as an officer. The petition must be signed by the nominating member, not less than three additional members of the parish and agreed to by the signature by the nominated member. All petitions are to be submitted to the Clerk no later than two weeks prior to the annual meeting to be held on January 27, 2019. Nominations not submitted as set forth will not be allowed from the floor at the annual meeting.

OW, It's November! That came around really fast this year. It seems like we just got started back at school, with sports and other fall activities, and here it is-November. That being said, I always love this time of year; even though the days get shorter, there are so many fall activities to take part in. The pageant is exciting but we are also doing some exciting work during KFC—Kids for Christ—during the 9:30 service. In October, we did an in depth study of the story of Esther, which the children really enjoyed. I also continue to use the Illustrated Children's Ministry which offers beautiful illustrations with scriptures on the subject of compassion and faith. You may have noticed that I switched to the Illustrated Children's Ministry Sunday Bulletin which explores the readings each Sunday on a child's level.

On Sunday, November 25 at 4 pm, we will gather for our Advent Rhythms of Grace service. As a part of that service, we will create Advent wreaths for each family to take home and use during the Advent season. I also have purchased the Illustrated Children's Ministry Advent Curriculum for Families. This is a great resource for families and can fit into any family's schedule with many different activities for each week of Advent.

Finally, I am thankful—in this month of Thanksgiving—to say that I feel blessed to be a part of the St. James's family. I believe that we do a pretty good job of nurturing our children and giving them the guidance they need to develop into fine young people on a spiritual journey. For that I am eternally grateful.

From the Organist & Choirmaster

concerts at St James's is excited to announce that the Vienna Boys Choir will perform at St. James's on **Tuesday, April 2** at 7pm! Tickets are now available for purchase by going to our website (**www.stjameswh.org**) or by going to **www.eventbrite.com** and searching for the concert by location and date. We suggest that you purchase tickets in advance as this will be the choir's only Connecticut appearance during their Spring 2019 tour.

From the choir's official website:

Boys have been singing at Vienna's Imperial Chapel since 1296. In 1498, Maximilian I (HRR) moved his court to Vienna, lock, stock, and choir, thus founding the "Hofmusikkapelle" (Chapel Imperial), and the Vienna Boys Choir. Over the centuries, the Viennese Court attracted great musicians like Isaac, de Monte, Fux, Caldara, Gluck, Salieri, Mozart, and Bruckner; Joseph Haydn, Michael Haydn, and Franz Schubert were themselves choir boys. Until 1918, the boys sang exclusively for the court. In the 1920s, the choir was reestablished as a private organization. Since 1926, 2482 Vienna Boys Choir has sung 1000 tours in 97 different countries. Gerald Wirth is its Artistic Director, and its president.

Today, there are 100 choristers between the ages of nine and fourteen, divided into four touring choirs. Each choir spends nine to eleven weeks of the academic year on tour. Together, the choirs give around 300 concerts each year, attended by almost half a million spectators around the world. The choir regularly tours Europe, Asia and Australia, and the Americas. The choir's first journey to Chile to place in 1936.

On Sundays, the boys perform with members of the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra and of the Vienna State Opera Chorus in Vienna's Imperial Chapel, as they have done since 1498. In 2012, the choir opened its own concert hall, MuTh; the state-of-the art facility seats 400 and has proven highly popular with both artists and audience.


The first ever sound recording of the choir was made on a wax cylinder in 1907; since then, the boys have recorded 43 shellacks, 55 singles, 128 LPs and 150 CDs on every major label. In 2015, the choir signed a longterm deal with Deutsche Grammophon. The first CD was released in 2015. 26 films and 17 TV documentaries attest to the choir's international appeal. In 2008, the choir began a collaboration with New York-based filmmaker Curt Faudon; since then, three major music films have been released; a fourth, "Good Shepherds", is in production.

The Vienna Boys Choir performs with major orchestras, such as the Vienna Philharmonic

(honorary member of the Chapel Imperial), Andrés Orozco Estrada, Christian Thielemann, Simone Young. A particular highlight are the appearances at the Vienna Philharmonic Orchestra's New Year's Concert. In 2012 and 2016, the boys performed under the baton of Mariss Jansons.
