From the Rector's Desk

Dear Friends,

For the better part of my adult life, the theological concept that has been at the center of my personal spirituality is the Incarnation. For me, the meaning of the Incarnation is that we come to know the nature of God through the life and ministry of Jesus. He taught us the importance of living lives of respect, welcome, love, and generosity, just to name a few. The Incarnation also teaches us that we are to be the heart and hands of God in the spheres in which we inhabit. As St. Francis reminds us, "Preach the Gospel in everything you do and if necessary, use words." Actions and works matter.

As I get older, (just days away from my 58th birthday as I write this) and life brings and does what life does, a new theological construct has joined the Incarnation at the center of my spirituality. This construct is the idea of Hope. Hope is the thing that gives action and good works meaning. Living in Hope means that the things we do when we are at our best have meaning, have purpose. We also live, when we have hope, in the knowledge that things evolve, and we hope that this evolution brings us closer and closer to the kingdom of God and to God's will. Our ultimate Hope as Christians is that in the end, we will be rejoined through the resurrection of Jesus to the heart of the God that creates us all.

In the meantime, life is full of both small and significant opportunities for hope. I hope someday that we will all be able to gather together again in fellowship and worship at St. James's without the immediate concern for the health of the people we encounter. I hope that those many folks (most of us) who have struggled emotionally, spiritually, physically, or financially through this time will find both Grace and Hope as things improve. I could go on and on about all the things I hope and know will happen, but you get my point.

The theme of this year's Stewardship Campaign is St. James's: A Place of Hope. As we move forward in the hope of things improving, we will need for the good people of St. James's to continue to be the prayerful, thoughtful, and generous, as you have always been. To be honest, 2022 is going to require a substantial financial commitment on behalf of the parish as we try to rebuild so much that has been lost during this time. Giving of ourselves and our resources is unto itself not just an act of generosity but a statement of Hope. As the Rev. John Mitman reminded us in his sermon of October 17, to sacrifice is not to give something away, but to hand it over to the work of God and to make it holy.

As we draw near to the Christmas season, we will be reminded time and again that the Incarnation is and was the greatest act of Hope we will ever know. The question is now, how will we live into it?

A Message from the Crew of Apollo 8

E Episcopalians sometimes have a complicated relationship with Scripture. It is at the heart of everything we believe, and yet I have a hard time imagining many Episcopalians have their favorite Bible verses tattooed on their wrists or airbrushed on the back of their pickup trucks. There's so much baggage attached to being identified as a cultural Christian in the United States today. It's a reasonable concern, and I would argue there is an important difference between being a cultural Christian and being a living member of the Body of Christ. How we define that membership and its meaning is indeed a bit nebulous. Accepting the Good News of Jesus Christ means entering into a mystery that eludes being pinned down with human words or logic. It certainty cannot be reduced to a pithy slogan or captured in a Bible verse or two. Engaging with the Bible is not an exercise in cryptology; it is much cooler than that!

I'm a big space buff. It's the closest thing I can think of that even begins to hint at the awesome mystery of this journey we are on together. Among the other joys of the Holiday season for me is sharing one of my very favorite examples of how Scripture captured and sanctified human experience with perfect magnificence.

Few, if any, years in American history were marked by as much upheaval as 1968. Society was coming apart at the seams. Two Americas — the Silent Majority and the counterculture — were pulling so far apart that some catastrophic fissure was inevitable. In February, Walter Cronkite went to Vietnam and saw that the war could not be won. He shocked the country by saying so. Martin Luther King was assassinated in April, Robert Kennedy in June. The list of catastrophes was long and grim.


In December of 1968, the crew of Apollo 8 were the first human beings to witness and photograph an Earthrise. That photo of Earth coming up from over the Moon's horizon has been called, "The most influential environmental photograph ever taken." We tend to forget Apollo 8 today, but at the time it captured the attention of the world just the same as Apollo 11 would the following year. It was the dress rehearsal for the moon landing. The first manned spacecraft to leave low-earth orbit, and the first to reach another astronomical object. To the great relief of millions of white-kuckled viewers back on Earth, they made it home safely. On Christmas Eve 1968, Apollo 8's crew — three tough military astronauts — broadcast the first live images of the moon back to Earth. After a lot of brainstorming and fretting with NASA management about the perfect words to accompany such a momentous event, they went to that most reliable of texts, the first ten verses of the Book of Genesis. It was then the most-watched television broadcast in history. Even today, It has the power to give you goosebumps.

I'd invite you to bring some transcendent mystery to your Christmas Eve: Pull up the Apollo 8 Christmas Eve broadcast on YouTube and see those grainy images and hear those eternal words from so long ago. Experience the awe... and then come to church!

Treasurer's Report / January—September 2021

Current Position: For the first nine months of 2021 the Church's finances were negative vis a vis the budget. Total income for that period was \$13,063 less than the budgeted amount and expenses were \$3,843 under budget. As a result, the Church's net financial position at the end of September 2021 was a negative variance to budget of 9,220.

Income: For the first nine months of 2021, Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) in total were \$19,901 less than budget. Current Year Pledges were \$21,724 less than the budget amount whereas Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings exceeded the budget by \$1,824. Income from outside groups using the Parish Facilities was \$1,704 over budget. Special Contributions were \$5,560 over budget.

Expense: Major contributors to the January – September expense results were the following:

Property: Total Property expenses for the period were \$1,559 over budget. Personnel: Personnel expenses were \$6,423 under budget for the period primarily due to Clergy and Lay Staff salary and benefit expenses being less than budgeted amounts. Of the remaining expense categories, six were over budget and four were under, the net amount being \$1,021 over budget.

Vestry Nominations 2022

HE Vestry Nominating Committee welcomes suggestions, from members of the parish, of persons who they believe would be fine members of our vestry and officers (Senior and Junior Warden, Treasurer and Clerk).

Vestry members must be:

- 1. committed to Jesus Christ;
- 2. regular in attendance at public worship;
- 3. participants in the life and ministry of the congregation;
- solid financial supporters of our ministries;
- 5. be willing to commit to regular attendance at monthly meetings (the 3rd Tuesday), annual vestry retreats, and to serve as liaison with committees or programs within the parish.

The members of this year's Nominating Committee are: Doug Compton, Greg Jacobs, and Chris Keesling. The Nominating Committee will publish its nominations in the January/February issue of *The Open Door*.

In accordance with the by-laws of the church, any member may submit a petition to include any other member for inclusion on the ballot as a candidate for the vestry or as an officer. The petition must be signed by the nominating member, not less than three additional members of the parish and agreed to by the signature by the nominated member. All petitions are to be submitted to the Clerk no later than two weeks prior to the annual meeting to be held on January 23, 2022. Nominations not submitted as set forth will not be allowed from the floor at the annual meeting.



I will be reaching out to older children who I would like to have the main parts. If your child knows that they want to be a shepherd, an angel, or a specific animal, please let me know.


