



From the Assistant Rector

EAR St. James's Family,

After my first two months with you, I can say this: I love how we gather at the table. From the annual picnic in the community garden to the Women of St. James's lunch to sandwich-making on Sundays, it's clear that this is a community committed to following Jesus Christ's way of love – and his way of food.

During my recent coffee hour series "I Was Hungry: Theological Reflections on Food, Justice, and Mission," I talked about why it is hard to conceive of Jesus' ministry without food. It is at the table that our savior not only invites our community to be part of God's transformative story but calls on us to welcome the stranger, feed the hungry, and love our neighbors. Our faith is grounded in the community made by Christ who feeds us, and who calls us to feed others.

Christians often hold up water and light as the quintessential elements of Jesus' presence. But in the Gospel of Luke, which has provided the lectionary heart of this year's worship, references to eating and food are far more pervasive ingredients. The Jesus of Luke seems to be always going to a meal, at a meal, or coming from a meal. In fact, Luke contains 10 significant meals where Jesus presents a big helping of teachings about God's radical, countercultural love.

As we prepare our hearts and tables for the upcoming holiday meals, I wanted to offer these three meditations on food and faith. Hopefully, they will nourish your prayer life during Advent.

"Jesus said to them, 'I am the bread of life.'" – John 6:35. As Episcopalians, we believe that when we approach the Lord's Table together, we should be <u>reflective</u>, <u>repentant</u>, <u>and</u> "in love and charity with other people."</u> With that in mind, take a moment to reflect on what the Holy Eucharist means to you? How do you approach the table? How does the Lord's Supper nourish you to put your hands on the plow to do God's good work? From Oregon to South India to Ghana to Connecticut, my work with feeding ministries has made me realize that God's mission doesn't invite the poor, the forgotten and the hungry to join us at the table. Rather, in God's mission, we have the privilege of joining them as they sit with Jesus. The Eucharist at its most profound leads us into feeding the hungry.

I am in awe at how at Jesus' most harrowing hour, he offered us a meal. When you are fed with the spiritual food of Christ's sacrifice, made present in the bread and wine, how are you being called to feed the most vulnerable among us?

- **"Feed my sheep."** Find a few minutes to read John 21, where the resurrected Christ waits, making breakfast for the disciples on the sea shore. "Come and have breakfast," Jesus says to them as they come ashore after a frustrating night of fishing. I love that breakfast invitation. It's spiritual comfort food -- a peanut butter and jelly sandwich for the soul. Jesus then turns to Simon Peter and asks the disciple three times if he loves him. "Of course I do," Simon Peter says. "Feed my lambs," Jesus responds. "Feed my sheep." The call for the church to feed the hungry as part of God's dream for us cannot be any clearer. When you read it, what word or phrase speaks to you? How does the text comfort you? How does it challenge you? Let the words live through you as an expression of the love that you have for Jesus.
- "And remember, I am with you always." Matthew 28:20. Take time at a meal, either during the grace before you eat or silently during the meal, to invite the Holy Spirit to dine with you. When we give thanks at a meal, we're remembering that God is in the midst of us. We're also expressing gratitude for our abundance. We are also asking to be guided. How will you show the infinite reach of God's loving embrace to those in need as an expression of your meal-time prayers? You can also connect the creation story of Genesis to the coffee beans in your morning coffee or the apple you eat for a snack. As Zen master Thich Nhat Hanh wrote of a grain of rice, "one second of mindfulness and concentration allows us to see that this grain contains the whole world—the rain, the cloud, the Earth, time, space, farmers. Everything." Every bite of food reminds us that God's act of creation is still ongoing and giving us life. How are we going to be part of that life-giving story by putting food on the table of hungry families and fighting the root causes of food insecurity in our community?

Let me know if you would like to talk further about any of these reflections. I thank God that we are walking together and reflecting on these questions of mission together. You are in my prayers.



HERE is so much going on here at St. James's, I am not sure where to start! October was full of fun things for kids including Mondays, Music & More (3Ms) where we painted with spaghetti, plastic forks and shaving cream. At Kids for Christ (KFC) on Sunday morning, we continued our study of the Parables of Jesus. There was an intergenerational book group on the graphic novel, When Stars are Scattered by Victoria Jamieson and Omar Mohamed, AND youth group that evening! A special thank you to Abby Waterman who helped organize the games for youth group.

Coming in November, there is more 3Ms on November 7, 14 and 28. No class on November 21 for our Thanksgiving break. In KFC on Sunday morning, we will learn some classic Old Testament lessons, Abraham and Sarah, the Prophets, Esther, and David and Goliath. Coming in Advent to KFC is the study of the themes of Hope, Peace, Love, and Joy. On Sunday, November 20, we will have another Youth Group Games Night from 5:30 to 7. I hope you come to some or all of these fun activities.

I will be reaching out to some of our middle and high school age kids to see who is able to be some of the major parts in the Nativity Walk. I am excited to do this again this year as it was so well attended last year. Mark your calendars and plan to attend!

I am super excited to announce that the singers from 3Ms will be singing on Christmas Eve at the 5:00 service. This will be such a treat to hear our youngest singers joyfully proclaiming the birth of Christ! We will have 3Ms on Monday, December 5 as usual, from 4 to 5:30. On Monday, December 12 and 19, we will meet from 4 to 5 with just the music portion, preparing us for singing on Christmas Eve. There will be no 3Ms on December 26 or January 2.

Also in December, there will be Caroling with the Youth Group on Sunday, December 4 from 5 to 6:30. We will go caroling for about an hour around the church neighborhood then come back for hot chocolate and cookies. This is open to anyone in the congregation who would like to carol. Please join us.

So, that gets us to January! In January we have a hymn sing on MLK Sunday, January 15, which will feature the 3M Singers, and there will be more KFC and youth group as well!

Lo, He Comes With Cloud Descending: Advent in Word and Music

DVENT is really two seasons in one: It is a season of expectant anticipation as we prepare for the arrival of our long-awaited Savior among us, yet it is equally a season of watching and listening for Christ's ultimate return as the one who will restore all in all. Uniting these two Advents is an atmosphere of reflection, of longing, of boundless hope, and of incipient peace. We reflect this atmosphere in the season's anthems, hymns and carols. This article offers a playlist for advent that ranges from Renaissance polyphony to contemporary carols.

First Advent

Sandström: Lo, how a rose e'er blooming <u>https://youtu.be/86-ulHbApOM</u>

Contemporary Swedish composer Jan Sandström creates a shimmering, ecstatic, quasiorchestral effect in this setting of the well-known 16th-Century carol. Working with the original harmonies, he adds continuous layers of sound as the soprano soars up to the carol's end, evoking both the holy infant and the one who bore for us this "flower, whose fragrance with sweetness fills the air."

Bach: Nun komm, der Heiden Heiland <u>https://youtu.be/K2ANMpDoRow</u>

Bach invites us into the dark, into the hush and into a posture of reverence, reflection and awe. In this organ setting, Bach poignantly decorates the minor-hued melody that moves ever upward in its longing, in its pleading and in its hope.

•Gibbons: This Is The Record of John https://youtu.be/a9pE5vrgBHQ

English composer Orlando Gibbons wrote at the peak of the musical Renaissance, a time known for delight in the word. English translations of scripture were a new and welcome phenomenon. Is Gibbons delighting in a bit of Renaissance wordplay as he sets the word "plainly" anything but plainly? He sure is! His point is to underscore the Baptist's role in preparing the way for the One who has come, the one who will exalt every valley and make every rough place smooth.

Mendelssohn: Ave Maria <u>https://youtu.be/LPJ5OvxhEcg</u>

This lush setting of the Elizabeth's prophetic words to Mary combines grace and beauty with, in its middle section, a palpable sense of Advent hope and urgency.

Second Advent

Thomas Tallis: Audivi, media nocte <u>https://youtu.be/TMuUZ1wNv3w</u>

This hauntingly beautiful motet alternates flowing sections for full four-part choir with an ancient chant. This gives the work a timelessness and a certain austerity that echoes the words of Jesus that traditionally open the Advent season: "Keep awake! Be ready. Watch and wait."

Bach: Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme <u>https://youtu.be/EzicPeW7GFQ</u>

Somehow, Bach manages the impossible in this music, offering a sense of peace and longing yet at the same time an air of majesty, of expectancy, of preparation, of welcome — of all that is still to come as we await Christ's promised return and the kingdom joy and peace he brings.

Lo, He Comes With Clouds Descending <u>https://youtu.be/z2j3rGfoLCA</u>

The great hymn of advent beautifully weaves images of the first Advent together with the second as we both remember Jesus' sacrificial love and await his return "on clouds descending" and his glorious, "endless reign."

St. James's Christmas Concert: Sunday, December 18 at 4:00

HE choirs of St. James's are excited to offer a rich array of music for the season in a concert on Sunday afternoon, December 18, at 4:00. The program will include music for two pianos, music for violin, *a cappella* Christmas classics, traditional carols with organ, and the reading of beloved seasonal poems.

This article is a "sneak peek" with a a glimpse at the musical delights we have planned along with notes on the program. Read on, and be sure to reserve tickets for you, your family and friends. They will be available on Sundays and in the office starting in November and will cost just \$10.

Suite from "Nutcracker" by Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky

The concert begins with a suite of pieces from Tchaikovsky's ballet score *Nutcracker*, perhaps the ultimate Christmas classic. Pianists Alan Murchie and Thomas Tarutin will play the work in its two-piano version at two beautiful Steinways: a black model A and a brown model L. The suite includes the *Dance of the Flowers, Trepak, March, Dance of the Mirlitons, Dance of the Sugar-Plum Fairy*, and more.

The story is well known: A young girl is given a fanciful toy nutcracker in the shape of a small man by her godfather at a family tree-decorating party. After going to bed, the girl thinks of the nutcracker and slips downstairs to see and hold it again. It springs to life as a handsome young prince, who whisks the girl off to his homeland, which is a child's delight filled with confections and whimsy.

Interestingly, Tchaikovsky didn't think much of the story and was ready to decline a request to set it as a ballet. What changed his mind? Most poignantly, it was the death of his beloved sister that changed his mind as this rather slender tale became for him a rich celebration of childhood and the magical world that children so naturally see and inhabit. Children, and in particular one very imaginative, open-hearted young girl (who may well stand for his sister) stand at the very center of this story. They are its heartbeat, and that was rare in its time.



Fantasia on "Greensleeves" by Ralph Vaughan Williams

John Kramer will play this celebrated, beautiful work by the great English composer who wrote so much for the church. We associate the tune with the Christmas poem "What child is this who, laid to rest on Mary's lap, is sleeping?" It's a quintessential English melody that, in its misty and grey-hued modality, evokes the simplicity of a countryside vignette while seeming to suggest and evoke something more: the baby who lies in such "mean estate" is none other than the incarnate God, a newborn king inviting "loving hearts" to enthrone him.

Carols by Mendelssohn, Rutter, Harold Darke, and many more

Finally, of course, the centerpiece of the concert is the choir's offering of beautiful, beloved carols both old and new, some with organ, some *a cappella*; all offering us a glimpse into the heart of the ultimate mystery of God's birth among us as one of us, born, as the carol *Hark! the herald angels sing* tells us so poignantly, "to raise the sons of earth; born to give us second birth." Don't miss it!



Treasurer's Report: January—September 2022

Summary of Current Position: The church ended September with a deficit relative to budget of more than \$50,000. As of the end of August, the budget was in a deficit position of 47,000. The items driving the deficit continue to be pledges that have come in slower than expected and higher than projected property and personnel expenses.

Income: Year-to-date (YTD) actual income is \$18,058 below budget (or 2.9% below budget). At the end of August, income was 2.6% below budget. The following components impacted the income position through the end of September: Regular Contributions (Current-Year Pledges, Prior-Year Pledges, Seasonal Offerings and Unspecified Offerings) are \$27,103 below their \$425,736 budget (or 6.4% below budget). Current-Year Pledges, the largest item in this category are \$24,000 below budget. At the end of August, Current Year Pledges were \$22,600 below budget. During the first couple of weeks of October, pledges were received which will help to close this gap. Contribution statements will also be sent.

Expense: YTD expenses are currently \$32,516, or 5.3%, above budget. As of the end of August, expenses were 5.9% above budget. The two expense items impacting the results continue to be the Property and Personnel categories: **Property:** Currently \$18,337 above its \$93,776 budget. The Gas bill is \$8,800 higher than budgeted on a year-to-date basis and has exceeded its full year budget. As mentioned in prior reports, this id due to higher costs after the expiration of our gas contract with Direct Energy. General Maintenance and Repair is \$2,500 above budget (down slightly from the figure as of the end of August), electric is \$2,000 higher than projected, and Property & Liability Insurance is almost \$5,500 above budget. **Personnel:** Is \$10,715 above budget.

Vestry Nominations 2023

HE Vestry Nominating Committee welcomes suggestions, from members of the parish, of persons who they believe would be fine members of our vestry and officers (Senior and Junior Warden, Treasurer and Clerk).

Vestry members must be:

- 1. committed to Jesus Christ;
- 2. regular in attendance at public worship;
- 3. participants in the life and ministry of the congregation;
- 4. solid financial supporters of our ministries;
- be willing to commit to regular attendance at monthly meetings (the 3rd Tuesday), annual vestry retreats, and to serve as liaison with committees or programs within the parish.

The members of this year's Nominating Committee are: Jerrod Bowman, Doug Compton, Ruth Mitman, and Loretta Waldman. The Nominating Committee will publish its nominations in the January issue of *The Open Door*.

In accordance with the by-laws of the church, any member may submit a petition to include any other member for inclusion on the ballot as a candidate for the vestry or as an officer. The petition must be signed by the nominating member, not less than three additional members of the parish and agreed to by the signature by the nominated member. All petitions are to be submitted to the Clerk no later than two weeks prior to the annual meeting to be held on **January 22, 2023**. Nominations not submitted as set forth will not be allowed from the floor at the annual meeting.
