From the Assistant Rector

EAR beloved community,

After spending part of my morning in the St. James's greenhouse and helping prepare our outdoor garden beds for winter, I'm reminded of how I have always found late autumn to be a sacred time of year. And not just because of how the technicolor leaves and water-colored skies remind us of God's love in creation. It creates liminal days where we are invited to pause, reflect, and open ourselves up to being changed.

As the prayerful ballad "October" by the band U2 observes, it is a season when "the trees are stripped bare/Of all they wear" and "kingdoms rise/And kingdoms fall/But you go on." Although this time of year may stir melancholy – a "sigh" for another year about to pass – I hope you find time as we move into November and Advent to reflect on how we are called to go through a similar cycle of change on our spiritual journeys.

As the work in the greenhouse shows, change isn't just about things falling away. It is about something new emerging from the soil of our lives, often in counter-cultural ways. The weather outside may say the days of cultivation and blossoming have passed; but as Resurrection people, we are called to cultivate hope and find a way.


Members of our garden ministry have worked since March to plant and harvest vegetables for people struggling to feed their families in the metropolitan area. They have sent hundreds of pounds of carrots, collards, green beans, beets, tomatoes, and other crops to the Hartford Catholic Worker. Faithfully – with joy, imagination, and hope – they continue their work.

The greenhouse was raised and set up by a crew of St. James's volunteers in September. It will allow us to continue to grow a variety of vegetables for needy families well into the winter months. Chuck Russo has led the effort to engineer the drip irrigation system from two rain barrels. The first seeds planted in the beds inside the greenhouse have already begun to sprout up. Just think: As we sing Christmas hymns in the church on Christmas Eve, there's a good chance tomatoes will be on the vine just outside the church walls – just as if were the middle of summer.

In Philippians, Paul calls us, as followers of Jesus, to live with a defiant joy in the darkest and coldest seasons. "I am confident of this, that the one who began a good work in you will continue to complete it until the day of Jesus Christ," he writes in Philippians 1:6. Projects like the greenhouse remind us that we are not finished. God is still making me. God is still making you. God's not done with us. We are still being invited into and embraced by a relationship with each other, our neighbors, and the divine.

That's the thing about this journey together: When we accept the invitation – when we come to the Lord's table, or when we do all the things we do as a community of love grounded in the Gospel -- we should come expecting to be changed. We should come, knowing that our lives may never be the same again.

Volunteering for the Good News Garden may not be your jam. But I pray that you find the time, in this season of change, to look around and see where God is calling you to try on something new in the vineyard of St. James's. There are so many opportunities to not only create change but be changed in spirit for the good of the world.

FEW years ago, I wrote a newsletter article that started out telling about a beautiful walk that Bob and I took at Hammonasett State Park. As we walked, listening to the sounds of birds and insects, I was brought back to a time long ago when I was in high school visiting my grandparents.

On that particular morning at about 5:30, my grandfather, who I called Gedaw, woke me up saying, "Little Pris (my grandmother was Big Pris,) You gotta get up! Hurry up you're missing the bullfrogs!" Even though I was a sleep-deprived teenager, I quickly got out of bed, threw on some jeans, and joined my grandfather in the still very dark backyard.

As we sat there together and drank our coffee in silence, we didn't hear a sound. There was not one bullfrog to be heard. I still can't tell you exactly what a bullfrog sounds like, because we never heard one. Not one.

Gedaw, of course, apologized profusely. He had heard the bullfrogs and got so excited that he wanted to share them with me. He said they must have gotten stage fright when I joined him in the yard. He said he was so sorry that he woke me up for a whole lot of nothing. But that is where he was wrong.

To this day, that morning with Gedaw is one of my most precious memories of childhood. For one, we sat out in that Louisiana country yard, in the old lawn chairs together in silence. Just being together sipping coffee. Second, Gedaw was sharing his love of all of nature with me. It felt like such a precious time together. Time that was basically stolen from the night. Just for us. It felt sacred.

My Gedaw died on November 24, 1994. He was almost 87. He met two of his four greatgrandchildren, Robby and Henry. He was a wonderful loving father, husband, brother and from stories I have been told, son. He was a man of faith, and I loved him dearly.

Since I wrote this story in 2019, much has happened—obviously. Maybe not so obvious to everyone reading this newsletter is that two years ago in grandparents to our precious, Camilla Banks Hooper, aka, Mille. Her middle name was my mom's maiden name or Gedaw's last name. I am 100% sure that mom and Gedaw are keeping an eye on her. I am also sure that she inherited some of her feisty behavior from Bob's mom. As we welcome our second granddaughter in the next few weeks, it will be such a blessing to see what traits from her ancestors she will inherit. One thing I know for sure is that her first name, Channing, is her Dad's, Grandfather's, and Great-grandfather's middle name. That is quite a legacy.

Today, I look at my own grown children and I see glimpses of my grandparents and parents. Robby is such a combination of Bob and Bob's mom-with a dash of my grandfather thrown in. Henry is a lot like Gedaw and talks back like me. Maddy is a lot like Bob's dad. To me, this is what it means to be a part of the communion of saints. We all sort of rub off on each other and there is that genetic thing, too.

Back to that walk at Hammonasett. As Bob and I continued on our walk that day, and I shared that story with him for about the hundredth time, it also felt like precious time. As we walked along looking at the beautiful sea grass, listening to the sound of the waves, remembering my precious Gedaw, it felt like part of him was there walking with me. Even though he never physically made it to beautiful Connecticut, part of him did make it here. In Robby, and Henry and Madison and of course, in me.

So, as we approach the holidays and all that means, I hope and pray that you can take some time to thank God for the beauty that is just being alive. Bob and I are looking forward to doing just that in the next few weeks—spending more precious time with Millie and welcoming Channing to this family. I am sure that I will see a part of my grandparents, Bob's parents and my own, live on in Millie and Channing. What an incredible blessing to be a part of this great story.

St. James's Christmas Concert: Sunday, December 17 at 4:00

Bach's Brandenburg Concerto #4, Traditional Carols, and much more!



LEASE mark your calendars for **Sunday afternoon, December 17, at 4:00**, when our parish choirs and instrumentalists will come together for a festive, joyous program of Christmas music that begins with a sparkling, virtuosic work for two pianos and ends with voices raised as one in Mendelssohn's glorious "Hark! the herald angels sing." Along the way, the choir will sing favorite seasonal motets and carols; violinist John Kramer will offer the luminous Pastorale from Corelli's Christmas Concerto; and our young choristers will join us for a set of Christmas spirituals.

As they did last year so memorably, Ann Uphoff and Jonathan Lewis will read beloved Christmas poems, stories and meditations as choirs and instrumentalists process from space to space within the sanctuary. The program begins at 4:00 and ends at 5:15; tickets will be available on Sundays and in the parish office starting in November and will cost \$10. Admission for children ages 12 and under is free of charge.

Brandenburg Concerto #4 by J. S. Bach

Bach's six dazzling concerti written for the Margrave of Brandenburg are holiday favorites; their swirling melodies, toe-tapping rhythms and, most of all, light-filled textures capture the spirit of the season like few other works. Bach wrote them as a gesture of hope after the death of his first wife and in a time of new horizons in his musical life. Interestingly, they were never performed in Brandenburg, most likely for a simple reason: they are fiendishly difficult! Concerto #4, which we will perform in an arrangement for two pianos, features two recorders in lilting, colorful melodies set against cascades of notes from a solo violinist, all accompanied by a continuo group of strings and harpsichord. Bach learned concerto style from Vivaldi and others through a technique that might seem odd to us: He essentially "rewrote" Vivaldi's orchestral music as keyboard works. The arrangement we'll play to open the Christmas Concert embodies the same spirit, taking passages from the violins and flutes and reimagining them for two pianists side by side.

Christmas Concerto by Arcangelo Corelli

Corelli was a breakthrough composer in the Baroque Era who wrote brilliantly for the violin. He composed sonatas and concertos that inspired Bach and others in later generations. The concerto we will offer was composed, in the composer's words, "for the feast of the birth of Jesus." We will play its final movement, a pastorale that vividly and beautifully paints the Nativity as a gentle yet ecstatic dance. Two violins in dialogue with the orchestra (or, for us, organ) evoke the mystery, the awe, wonder, peace and joy of Christ's birth.

Carols by Mendelssohn, Victoria, Vaughan Williams, and more

The heartbeat of our concert is carols: framed by two settings of Ave Maria, we tell the story of the angels, shepherds, friendly beasts, and all those who surrounded Mary and the infant Jesus in carols from the Middle Ages through the present, echoing the words of the poet: Now let us all sing praises, all gathered in this place, and with true love and charity each other now embrace. O tidings of joy, comfort and joy, O tidings of comfort and joy!


St. James's Chapel Organ: Dedication Recital Sunday, November 19 at 4:00

We are grateful indeed! On Sunday, November 19 at 4 PM, Alan Murchie will play a recital dedicating the instrument; a reception in the Parish Hall will follow. The concert is both an expression of joy and of thanksgiving: the organ is a gift from parishioner Ron Coons, an organist himself who for many years played summer services for us here at St. James's. Coffee Hour Forum: Mary in Art and Music Sundays December 3 and 10 at 11:00

DVENT is in a sense Mary's season: through Isaiah's prophecies, it points in each of its weeks toward her own prophetic utterance in her Magnificat and toward her fearless acceptance of her own prophetic commission. We will spend two Sundays in Advent this year reflecting on Mary in visual and musical image, in settings of the Ave Maria, in the enormous wealth of paintings that have sought to offer a glimpse of just who she was. Scripture provides a portrait of her that artists have supplemented and that composers from monks in the Middle Ages to Mendelssohn, Puccini and more have evoked in motet, carol, cantata, and solo song. Treasurer's Report: January—September 2023

Summary of Current Position: Through September, we are trailing where we had planned to be by \$17,878. The September result is an improvement from the \$23,800 shortfall as of the end of August. The deficit position through September is driven by a combination of income being \$5,945 greater than projected and expenses exceeding their budgeted amount by roughly \$23,826.

Income: Year-to-date (YTD) actual income is \$5,948 above budget (or 0.9% above budget), an improvement from last month's results which were 1.3% below budget. The following components impacted the income position through the end of September: Regular Contributions (Current-Year Pledges, Prior-Year Pledges, Seasonal Offerings and Unspecified Offerings) ended the month \$3,590 above the \$454,077 budget, or 0.8% above budget. Current-Year Pledges, the largest item in this category, are \$10,549 below budget but that is offset by higher than projected Prior Year Pledges and Unspecified Offerings collections. Contribution statements were sent out on October 8 and will hopefully help close the gap in the Current-Year Pledges. Facilities Income: Actual YTD income of \$61,585 is \$5,717 greater than the budgeted amount of \$55,868 due to increased use of the building by outside organizations.

Expense: YTD expenses are \$23,826, or 3.4%, above budget. Last month, expenses were 2.5% above budget. A few key expense categories in terms of their contribution to the overall variance through the end of September are: Administration: Currently \$8,900 above budget. The largest single item impacting this variance is the \$6,100 in costs associated with the ERC that weren't in the budget. Property: Currently \$6,500 above its \$94,500 budget, a deterioration from the \$3,500 overage as of August. Gas (\$3,700 over budget), Electric (\$1,650 over budget), and Maintenance Supplies (\$1,900 over budget) are the primary reasons for the variance. Music: \$3,900 higher than its YTD budget due to choir pay and instrument maintenance. The choir pay difference of \$2,990 is expected to decrease as the budget had greater choir pay expenses during the last four months of the year. As of the end of August, the choir pay variance was \$4,200.

Vestry Nominations 2024

HE Vestry Nominating Committee welcomes suggestions, from members of the parish, of persons who they believe would be fine members of our vestry and officers (Senior and Junior Warden, Treasurer and Clerk).

Vestry members must be:

- 1. committed to Jesus Christ;
- 2. regular in attendance at public worship;
- 3. participants in the life and ministry of the congregation;
- 4. solid financial supporters of our ministries;
- 5. be willing to commit to regular attendance at monthly meetings (the 3rd Tuesday), annual vestry retreats, and to serve as liaison with committees or programs within the parish.

The members of this year's Nominating Committee are: Adam Fisher, Jessica Henning, Jonathan Lewis, and Debra Morton. The Nominating Committee will publish its nominations in the January 2024 issue of *The Open Door.*

In accordance with the by-laws of the church, any member may submit a petition to include any other member for inclusion on the ballot as a candidate for the vestry or as an officer. The petition must be signed by the nominating member, not less than three additional members of the parish and agreed to by the signature by the nominated member. All petitions are to be submitted to the Clerk no later than two weeks prior to the annual meeting to be held on **January 28, 2024**. Nominations not submitted as set forth will not be allowed from the floor at the annual meeting.

It'll Be a Breeze!

REEZE has come to St. James's! Breeze is an intuitive online parish directory that will allow each of us to update our contact information and pictures, see and sign up for church events, and so much more – all from your smartphone or computer.

Last month, you should've received an email from Breeze with the personalized credentials you need to access your and/or your family's account. Your account has already been pre-populated with information from church records.

For the St. James's community to effectively use Breeze, it's really important that you ensure the information in your My Profile section (your phone number, email address, etc.) is accurate and up to date. Separately, but just as important, under the Tags section, tag yourselves to those groups that you participate in (e.g., Choir, Ushers).

Earlier this week, you likely received an email from St. James's with some FAQs to help you get started with Breeze. These FAQs answer common questions about how to use its features, how to get help if you need it, what to do if you can't find last month's email from Breeze and who to contact in the parish if you have additional questions. There will also be an in-person help session this **Sunday**, **November 5**, following on the 9:30 service!

We hope you start using Breeze right away as a parish communication tool and directory. Its benefits will become apparent once our church community is fully onboarded and using it regularly. This will include an event feature to facilitate signing up for various happenings around the parish, which we plan to make available in early 2024.
