From the Assistant Rector

EAR Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I am writing this letter to you, having just finished distributing this month's Foodshare boxes to families around West Hartford. This was my first experience with the Foodshare crew, which is hard at work every third Thursday morning of the month. We spent the morning driving around town, delivering boxes of groceries and fresh vegetables to those who are struggling to get by. It was striking to see firsthand that many of our neighbors, who live just a few blocks away, live with significant needs.

This experience coincided with the last weeks, during which both our lectionary readings and our Monday bible study have consistently provided us with readings from the Gospel according to Mark. I found one verse ringing in my ears as I delivered boxes around town. Jesus says, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick; I have come to call not the righteous but sinners." The self-sufficient are liable to miss the value of Jesus' work. Jesus's mission of care and restoration is directed to those in need. That includes us. Yet, many of us have the opportunity to be on the giving side of any helping equation. We may need gentle reminders, from time to time, that while we are called to go out and love and serve our neighbors, we are those who have been helped beyond measure. We must engage in the work of Jesus from a position of solidarity. We are those who have been loved and served by Jesus. Therefore, we love and serve with gratitude and joy.

I am struck by the multidimensional nature of St. James's ministry. We are a church committed to serving our neighbors, and we are shaped weekly by holy scripture, sacred music, and the Eucharist (the Great Thanksgiving). As we come to Jesus, we rediscover the everlasting love with which we have been loved. We are reminded that our neighbors are our brothers and sisters. From that standpoint, we strive for the well-being of our neighbors and a more just and peaceful society.

As a new member of the St. James's community, I can say that there are countless gifts within this church. These gifts are the men and women who are shaped by love and committed to the renewal of our world. I am immensely grateful to be grafted into this wonderful community. I know I will be continually reminded of the work Jesus has done for me and the work I am called to in this world.

That being said, I always love this time of year; even though the days get shorter, there are so many fall activities to take part in. It is also fun to look toward the holiday season with great promise and excitement. Which brings me to the pageant. As many of you know, the Christmas pageant on Christmas Eve at 5pm is a big part of how we celebrate Christmas at St. James's. It is a wonderful way to experience the joy of Jesus's birth and to see some pretty adorable St. James's children as well.

Each year starting in September, I begin to plan for the pageant. Planning for the pageant involves talking to parents to see what children are going to be around this year for Christmas Eve, assessing the ages of those who enjoy public speaking, and figuring out the best way to make the most of our talented singers. This year, with the guidance of Bob, Michelle and I began thinking about ways we can use the pageant that we created last year, and add some more singing with our growing Mondays, Music & More group (3Ms), and our growing group of choristers. Michelle and I are just beginning to think about all the possibilities, but I am excited to have her input on this wonderful event.

The pageant is exciting but we are also doing some exciting work during KFC—Kids for Christ—during the 9:30 service. In September and October, we did an in depth study of the parables of Jesus. The parables are such easily accessible stories for children. Kids get it. The last Sunday in September we were learning about the Parable of the Unforgiving Servant, when a third grader said, "If God forgives us, we should forgive others!" Out of the mouths of babes....

In October and continuing into November the children that are a part of our 3Ms group have been learning songs and creating art to be a part of our Storytime Event which takes place on Sunday, November 10 at 5pm. This is certain to be a wonderful intergenerational music event, pairing the wisdom of children's books with choral repertoire and spiritual reflections. When Michelle and I began working on this event this summer, we were careful to choose books that were each published in different decades, with the hopes of making the event relevant for all generations. I hope that everyone puts this event on their calendars and brings other "children at heart" to enjoy it.

Finally, I am thankful—in this month of Thanksgiving—to say that I feel blessed to be a part of the St. James's family. I believe that we do a pretty good job of nurturing our children and giving them the guidance they need to develop into fine young people on a spiritual journey. For that I am eternally grateful.

From the Organist & Director of Music

EAR Siblings in Christ,

We are a couple months into a very full season of music together! In September we resumed our weekly rehearsals of the children's choir (during "3M's"), the choristers, and our adult choir. We also have a plan for our younger singers to be featured every other Sunday in worship, which has been wonderful! At the end of the month, our adult choir also collaborated with other choral and instrumental ensembles in a performance of the Fauré Requiem at the Hartt School of Music, conducted by Gabriel Löfvall, with Alan Murchie at the piano.

In October we hosted the Greater Hartford Chapter of the American Guild of Organists' epic Halloween spectacle PipeScreams, featuring 11 different organists of all ages, performing spooky selections in a fully-decorated sanctuary, complete with theatrical bits, special effects, costumes, etc. and preceded by ghost stories around a bonfire, led by Chion Wolf (of CT-Public's radio show, *Audacious with Chion Wolf*).

5:00pm, November 10 - Storytime

This is a first-of-its-kind, intergenerational music event that will connect the timeless wisdom of beloved children's books (Frog and Toad, Miss Rumphius, The Rainbow Fish, Runaway Bunny, Goodnight Moon, etc.) with choral works by Jake Runestad, Jonathan Dove, David Hurd, etc. and theological reflections for children and adults of all ages as we honor the child that lives within us all. And yes, you are encouraged to bring your teddy bear.


5:00pm, December 15 - Ave Maria

For our Christmas concert this year, we will be focusing on Mary, the mother of Jesus, with choral and organ repertoire written exclusively by female composers. Works by Abbie Betinis, Anna Lapwood, Hildegard von Bingen, Rosephanye Powell, etc. will be presented by our adult choir, choristers, and children for this musical celebration of the season.

Members of our choristers and adult choir will also be joining the Farmington Valley Chorale in a concert called Pedal Points, hosted here at St. James's on Nov 24th, which features a Haydn Mass as well as movements from Bernstein's Mass and McClure's Caribbean Mass. Then, in early 2025 we will be hosting a concert of the Yale Whiffenpoofs on February 6th and then a unique concert on February 23rd called Let There Be Light which will be a Lessons & Carols-esque telling of the Creation, with choral and organ music for each of the 7 days, in collaboration with a digital projection artist who will create video displays for each (light, sky, plants, sun/moon, water/sky, land animals, etc.) which will be projected onto each of the 7 ceiling panels in the sanctuary during the concert.

These special events are representative of our values at St. James's, with our commitment to musical excellence, focus on intergenerational offerings, honoring of beloved traditions, as well as our open-minded listening of God's call to sing a new song and embolden our collaborative, creative potential within this community. Events like Storytime and PipeScreams aim at reaching the larger community and engaging many generations, both in the production and attendance. Our involvement in the Fauré Requiem and Pedal Points comes from our desire to collaborate with other ensembles and reach beyond these walls to do large-scale music programming. We are excited to host touring, award-winning ensembles like The Whiffenpoofs and we are also thrilled to honor our tradition of a Christmas concert (Ave Maria), this year prioritizing under-represented female composers as we honor Mary, the mother of Jesus. We also aren't afraid to try more experimental, multimedia projects like a collaboration between our choir and a digital artist for Let There Be Light, creating something that has never been done before! We hope you'll join us. Bring a friend!



Treasurer's Report / January—September 2024

Summary of Current Position:

Through September, the church is short of its budget by \$39,166, an improvement from the \$56,800 shortfall through the end of August. Income and expenses both contributed to the shortfall as income is \$15,822 below budget, primarily due to lower than projected pledge payments. Expenses are \$23,344 higher than budgeted due to property and personnel expenses that are higher than budgeted.

Vestry Nominations 2025

HE Vestry Nominating Committee welcomes suggestions, from members of the parish, of persons who they believe would be fine members of our vestry and officers (Senior and Junior Warden, Treasurer and Clerk).

Vestry members must be:

- 1. committed to Jesus Christ;
- 2. regular in attendance at public worship;
- 3. participants in the life and ministry of the congregation;
- 4. solid financial supporters of our ministries;
- 5. be willing to commit to regular attendance at monthly meetings (the 3rd Tuesday), annual vestry retreats, and to serve as liaison with committees or programs within the parish.

The members of this year's Nominating Committee are: Bob Bausmith, Ellen Dollar, Kim Hart-Kindelberger, and Judith Stahl. The Nominating Committee will publish its nominations in the January 2025 issue of *The Open Door*.

In accordance with the by-laws of the church, any member may submit a petition to include any other member for inclusion on the ballot as a candidate for the vestry or as an officer. The petition must be signed by the nominating member, not less than three additional members of the parish and agreed to by the signature by the nominated member. All petitions are to be submitted to the Clerk no later than two weeks prior to the annual meeting to be held on **January 26, 2025**. Nominations not submitted as set forth will not be allowed from the floor at the annual meeting.

Income: Year-to-Date (YTD) actual income is \$15,822 below budget (or 2.4% below budget). As of the end of August, income was \$36,300 or 6.0%, below budget. The following components impacted the income position through the end of August: Regular Contributions (Current-Year Pledges, Prior-Year Pledges, Seasonal Offerings and Unspecified Offerings) ended the month \$26,888 below their \$456,417 budget, or 5.9% below budget. At the end of August, Regular Contributions were \$47,300 (or 11.5%) below budget. Most of the shortfall in Regular Contributions is due to Current Year Pledges which are \$19,620 below budget (or 4.5% below budget), a significant improvement from last month's \$41,450 shortfall (10.6% below budget). Contribution statements were sent out after last month's vestry meeting. Another round of contribution statements will be sent during the second half of November. Facilities Income: Finished the month \$2,570 above budget, an improvement from the

\$138 below budget as of the end of August. The variances each month are due in part to the timing of payments received.

Special Contributions, General Purposes: The primary component in this category is the Rector's Appeal contributions. At the end of September, actual receipts were \$8,800 higher than projected, a reduction from August's overage of \$11,400. This variance is expected to decrease as we progress through the remainder of the year.

Expenses: YTD expenses are \$23,344, or 3.2%, above budget. As of end of August, expenses were \$20,500, or 3.2%, higher than budgeted. A few key expense categories in terms of their contribution to the overall variance through the end of August are: **Property:** \$5,037 over budget, similar to last month's overage of \$4,950. with Gas and Electric more than \$10,270 above budget. At the end of August, Gas and Electric were \$9,800 over budget. **Personnel:** \$16,712 over budget. At the end of August, Personnel was \$15,180 above budget. Components of the personnel expenses are being reviewed.

At the end of October, we will receive the names of families who use the Food Pantry at Grace. Each family will list the names and ages of their children plus a 'Wish List' of gifts from each child. Members of St. James's purchase a couple of gifts for each child and return them unwrapped to the church. They will be delivered to Grace Church for distribution. Last year, parishioners from St. James's contributed over 700 Christmas gifts to the children of Parkville! This is a wonderful outreach ministry that is easy to do and means so much to so many.
