

# From the Rector and Associate Rector

Dear Friends,

We have nearly met our ambitious goal of raising \$965,000, which will enable us to improve upon the spaces in which we worship, cultivate friendships, seek healing, and learn to follow Jesus in our daily lives. Thanks be to God, and thanks be to you for this abundance of support! Tremendous effort, prayer, time, and money are and will make possible a brighter future for this corner of the Jesus Movement. Being a "movement," our joyful work is far from complete.

We live in a state where the top 1 percent of incomes is growing while everyone else's is dropping. We live in a country where the rich are getting richer, the poor are getting poorer, and the middle class is shrinking. In Connecticut, about 130,000 children are food insecure: million. 42 million Americans live in households that were food insecure in 2015. These are troubling statistics, indeed, and the reality they

represent is fostered by the pernicious influences of racism, greed, and spiritual famine.

As followers of Jesus, we are called to participate fully in the life of our community. That means that we vote not only with the goal of enhancing our own lives but with our eyes on those who need the assistance of the government to be fed, to be healthy, and to provide reasonable living conditions for their families. Participating in the life of our community means escaping our bubbles and meeting our neighbors. It means sticking up for those who need advocates, and it means seeing that when we pray "give us this day our daily bread," we help to make that daily bread happen for everyone.

It has been suggested that charitable organizations like churches should take responsibility for feeding and caring for the poor from the federal government, never mind that even a church as robust as St. James's would have to double its budget to do its part. Only one in 20 bags of food assistance comes from a charitable organization in this country; the rest comes from the federal

government. We have a role to play in feeding and caring for the poor, and while that role includes the joyful ministries of sandwich making and food collection, our role also includes advocating for the poor and hungry in the public sphere.

Presiding Bishop Michael Curry has led the charge for the Episcopal Church to partner with the Alliance to End Hunger, Islamic Relief USA, the National African American Clergy Network, Jim Wallis of Sojourners, and many other groups in a call to prayer, fasting, and advocacy that they are calling "For Such a Time as This." Bob and I are calling on all of you to do the same. Here is what is involved:


- Pray that our country can stay on track and do its part to end hunger by 2030. We will do this on Sundays, but we encourage you to consider the hungry every time you eat and to pray for them and this movement to end hunger.
- Develop a spiritual practice of self-deprivation, or fasting, to prepare for and strengthen advocacy efforts with Congress. On the 21<sup>st</sup> of every month, SNAP benefits run out for most families. Use that day every month during the 115<sup>th</sup> Congress through the end of 2018 to fast in a way that is appropriate for you. Drink only water between sunrise and sunset, eat simply, or give up coffee or alcohol—something that will be meaningful for you on your journey.
- Advocate by writing letters and emails, making phone calls, and visiting with our members of Congress. We will have a station set up at coffee hour where you may write letters to our representatives along with cards that tell you who our representatives are, how you can reach them, and what you can say.
- Log on to bread.org to inform yourselves and officially join the movement.

Our youth will help to lead us in this endeavor. In June 2018, our high schoolers will go to Washington, D.C. where they will learn how the Episcopal Church shapes national policy, they will sit down with our congressional representatives in private advocacy meetings, they will worship with The Church of the Epiphany and serve their mostly homeless congregation. Don't worry, they will take plenty of time to see the sites and have fun, but this will be a youth trip unlike any before.

When our Christian Formation schedule is released in the coming weeks, you will notice that we are paying particular attention to the issues of poverty and hunger. Beth Bye will speak to local efforts to care for and empower the poor and hungry among us, Francis and Cheryl Sharp will teach us about how arts education in Hartford's North End contributes to the cause, Molly Louden will lead a course on Celtic Spirituality in unison with a monthly service at St. John's, and many other speakers will contribute to making St. James's a community that empowers you for ministry in your daily lives.

As our music programs flourish and our buildings are enhanced, we hope that so will our souls be renewed and spirits ignited to be the church in the world: a Jesus *Movement*, visible and viable, doing justice, loving kindness, and walking humbly with God.

#### ST. JAMES'S 2020 ENVISION OUR FUTURE UPDATE

As I write this in late summer, we are 85% to our overall goal to raise \$965,000 for our Capital Campaign, with pledges totaling over \$826,000. A HUGE Thank You to all who have pledged. As you read this we are even closer to our goal and projects are moving forward. Look for full updates in the Sunday Bulletin and weekly email updates. Over the summer we signed contracts and prepared the spaces for their transformations. While we watch work begin all over our facility, let's take a moment and revisit the vision that brought us to this point. We undertook this campaign with five goals in mind:

#### CONNECT TO THE WIDER COMMUNITY

We want St. James's to be known as a place where interesting and meaningful things happen. We want to host a variety of events such as organ & choral recitals, social justice conversations and Christian education offerings. Look for improvements in the Dining Room and Parish Hall as well as the Parish Room, and its Kitchenette that will help us fulfill this goal. Start thinking about events you would like to organize in our renovated space...

#### **ENCOURAGE CONTINUED YOUTH ENGAGEMENT IN THE LIFE OF OUR PARISH**

Refreshed youth space on the lower level of the Parish House will give our youth a "home base" and space to organize their own events and activities. What kind of programming would your children like to see at St. James's? Let's start planning.

#### CONTINUE THE LONG ST. JAMES'S TRADITION OF GLORIFYING GOD THROUGH EXTRAORDINARY MUSIC & LITURGY

Long-postponed work to repair the organ is now underway. The organ was disassembled and delivered to Austin Organ Inc. in August. While we might be missing its presence on Sunday mornings, aren't we lucky to have the accompaniment of our beautiful Steinway grand piano, not to mention all of our talented musicians. Surely the restoration will be worth the wait!

Additional improvements to the Sanctuary include, new paint and new energy efficient lighting, as well as flexible LED lighting to replace the existing cove and soffit lighting. A control system will allow for a variety of lighting options that will make it feasible to host a wide range of events in addition to improving visibility during our varied liturgies.

#### ENSURE OUR PARISH HOUSE IS WELCOMING AND ACCESSIBLE TO ALL

St. James's must be welcoming to all, and accessible to people with disabilities, wheelchair users and the elderly. A new fully accessible unisex restroom on the Parish Room level as well as new doors with ADA compliant levers will increase accessibility throughout our facility. Reworking of the parish office space required by the additional restroom, and refreshes to all the existing restrooms will also make the Parish House more welcoming.

## **EXPAND OUTREACH AND MISSION**

We want to partner with local non-profits to create new outreach opportunities and expand our feeding programs. Over the summer, the kitchen was cleared out in preparation for major renovations. The work will include a new five foot gas range, code compliant hood system, freezer, three bay sink, hand sink, microwave, countertops, base and wall cabinets, dishwasher booster and instant hot water tank, as well as new lighting, paint and energy-efficient glass block windows in the West wall. All of these changes will bring the kitchen up to health code standards and enable an expansion of our feeding program and other outreach projects.

Stay tuned throughout the fall as projects move forward and we move closer to our vision for St. James's, and we plan how to best use our updated spaces.



# From the Organist & Choirmaster

ear Parishioners,
If you've been in town and to church in recent weeks, it's likely that you've noticed missing organ pipes and the ensuing dramatic visual transformation of the choir loft.

On August 10th and 11th, a team of 12 workers from Austin Organs, Inc. removed all but 10 pipes from the organ. These pipes ranged in size from the length of a pencil to pipes taller than an average house.

De-installing an organ takes far less time than installing one, but it's still a long and exhausting process. Much like 18th century townspeople passing buckets of water from a well to a burning building, organ builders form a "pipe-line" whereby pipes are removed from their racks, placed in buckets, handed to a man mid-way down the ladder, then passed to workers on the gallery level who pass them to others who arrange them in pipe trays by size and type.

Large pipes are taken out one-by-one, and I had the quasi-honor of assisting in the removal of the very largest. While I was able to handle a few with the help of another person, the longest of these required the combined brawn of three and a half husky men.

Once the pipes were sorted into trays, they were stacked onto a portable lift and lowered from the gallery to street level. Each tray was carried carefully by two people and placed into a large box truck.


The console – that is, the cabinet containing the keyboards and controls – was deconstructed in its spot since it was too heavy to be moved even one inch. Vintage memory boards (yes, real boards made of wood) and binary switches utilizing hydraulic power were discarded, leaving only cabinetry and keyboards. Eventually, one small digital memory system will replace one hundred pounds of wiring, wooden memory boards and clunky, unreliable switching systems. As another point of comparison between technology from 1962 and 2018, consider that the new control system will be playable from a wireless iPad or keyboard, while the old system required a mass of wires and cables so thick that they wouldn't fit in the palm of your hand.

Watching the folks from Austin work so hard reminded me that this phase of the project is only the beginning of what will be months of work. It also highlighted the significant cost of labor, replacement parts, and the lengthy re-installation process. But, I also realized how lucky we are that we don't need a complete replacement to the tune of one or two million dollars.

The wooden chests have remained in place and will be rebuilt on-site. Typically these major components are removed, driven hundreds of miles, and rebuilt or even scrapped. Since Austin is a local company, there is significant cost savings to the on-site re-actioning and re-leathering.

The work that we as a congregation are undertaking is significant. We are refurbishing and improving our buildings and musical instruments so we may better worship God, serve each other and reach farther into the community. But these projects are not simply done to improve what we already have – they are also critical to blunting the decay of infrastructure. If we had chosen not pursue our capital campaign, over time our kitchens would have fallen apart; our electrical systems and lighting would continue to break down; the paint on the walls of our church would continue to discolor; and our organ would become silent.

In a society with no shortage of ways to spend money, it's difficult to prioritize giving. However, if everyone contributes even a modest sum, we will be in a position to fully fund these critical projects. If you've not done so already, please consider pledging to the capital campaign and help put your stamp on this generation's legacy.





# Treasurer's Report—July 2017

Current Position: At July 31, 2017 the Church's finances continued to be in the black vis a vis the budget. Total income was \$14,243 ahead of budget and total expenses were \$10,352 less than the budgeted amounts. As a

result, the Church's Net financial position at the end of July, 2017 was \$24,595 better than the budgeted amounts.

<u>Income</u>: Through July 31, 2017, Year To Date Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) totaled \$20,983 more than the respective budgeted amounts. Of these four accounts, only Prior Year Pledges was behind budget, by \$2,665. This same shortfall amount has continued since April, 2017. Income from the Parish House was over budget and that from Other Facilities was under budget for a net shortfall of \$1,675. Special Contributions for General Purposes were \$3,941 less than the budgeted amount.

Expense: Major contributors to the July 31, 2017 Expense results were the following: Property: Year to date **Property** expenses were \$9,716 under budget due primarily to less than budgeted payments for gas, electricity and general maintenance. **Personnel** expenses through July were \$6,021under budget reflecting less than budgeted amounts paid for Lay and Clergy Pension Plans. **Outreach Funding:** The Diocesan Pledge account, year to date, continues to be over budget by \$6,302 because in March the Diocese billed the church for twice its regular monthly Pledge amount. Of the remaining expense categories, six were over budget and three were under, the net amount being \$917 less than budget.



# (C)E)[(C) SPIRITUALITY 4:30pm SEP 17 & 24 OCT 8, 15, 22, & 29

Monthly on the first Sunday, October-June at St. John's Episcopal Church, West Hartford

FTER more than 40 years of searching for a way of talking about God and knowing God that fit with my experience, I have found it in Celtic theology.

Last October the rector of St. John's, Susan Pinkerton, invited anyone at St. James's who was interested to go on a pilgrimage with St. John's to the island of Iona. Iona is off the west coast of Scotland and is historically central to Celtic theology and worship.

To prepare for this pilgrimage we were requested to read the books of John Philip Newell, the leading Celtic theologian at this time. I opened his book, <u>Listening to the Heartbeat of God</u>, and was flabbergasted that someone named Pelagius, an Irish monk, had professed a theology that matched my experience and my understanding of God. Pelagius was excommunicated from Rome around 400 as the result of the political maneuvering of Augustine. The Church leaders chose as their foundational understanding of human nature Augustine's theory of "original sin." Thus, for the next 1,700 years, the Church taught "sinfulness" as the foundation of the relationship between God and humans. The Church that we know would have been a far different organization had it adopted the Celtic teachings of Pelagius.

You won't be surprised that my favorite theologian, Pelagius, is a "heretic" according to the established Church. Consequently, I did not read Pelagius until last October.

So, why Celtic? And why are Celtic books flying off the shelves of libraries and bookstores? Because Celtic theology is so appealing, teaching:

- All matter is created by God. If we say we love God, then we also must love God's creation. Of great importance in this teaching is reverencing and consequently saving the Earth, the environment, and all creatures. God is the creator of all that is: the Earth, the sky, the sea, fire, animals and humans.
- To save Mother Earth we need to reverence and name the Divine Feminine. For there to be true balance, we will not have the Divine Masculine until we have the Divine Feminine. The model of masculine that we have now is hierarchical and about powering over others. That is not the model of Jesus. And it does not allow men and boys to be fully themselves.
- **Divine Justice.** The Earth, God's creation, and its resources are for everyone, not just the rich.

It is my experience that Celtic theology is consistent with Jewish teaching. Jesus and Jesus' mother and father were Jewish. L'chaim. Life is good. People are good. God is good. All the time. Consequently, Celtic theology is more in keeping with the Gospel, with the story of Jesus' life and his teaching. It is about how we become like Jesus. How we follow Jesus' model of relationship with God and grow into the fullness of life that Jesus promised.

So, please join us for a study and discussion of John Philip Newell's book, <u>Listening to the Heartbeat of God</u>. We will meet at St. James's on the above dates. Then, we will worship the first Sunday of the month at 4:30 at St. John's. This worship is being organized and offered by a team of talented lay people from both churches. It will be predominantly silence in the beginning. We will learn to chant together and chant long enough that the sound resonates in our bodies. There will be a lesson or reading with a brief reflection by a lay person. There will be live music from all over the world. There will be opportunity for communal prayers of intercession and healing. Please come and see what else is possible. Communal silence and chanting are powerful experiences.

I encourage you to see if the Celtic way of knowing God and worshiping together brings you closer to God by inviting you deeper into your self and into your experience of God. It is the most integrating, truth-telling way to know God that I ever have found.


