news from St. James's

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

It should go without saying (a statement of the truly obvious) that this spring and summer have been like no other any of us have ever experienced. Personally, most of us have been stuck at home—vacations and trips canceled, days off spent working, balancing work and homeschooling, and very little socializing with friends and family. As a faith community, we have canceled inperson services and replaced them with video and Zoom liturgies, canceled social and educational opportunities, moved kids' education and camp online, greatly limited pastoral visitations, and welcomed our new assistant rector, Tim O'Leary, virtually. Yes, in an effort to keep people safe and healthy we have changed the way we lead our lives and do Church.

Although so much has changed, so much has not. We have shared the Good News in Jesus Christ with each other and the wider world – yes, although in new and different ways. We have continued to collect and distribute food; many of you have helped prepare sandwiches and casseroles for those living in shelters and others in need; our monthly senior food deliveries have continued to happen; the vegetable garden has continued to be cared for and harvested with produce being delivered to The Hartford Catholic Worker for distribution in The North End; and school supplies have been collected and distributed. While liturgy is, for now, not being held in


the main sanctuary, we began Zoom morning prayer on Sundays in the spring along with KFC (Kids for Christ). We then added video eucharistic services with music and a sermon, and are now worshipping outside in-person on Sunday evenings at 5:00 (join us). We also continue to offer a weekly video service. Hopefully soon we will be live streaming from the sanctuary.

All these changes and adaptations can be disappointing and disorienting at times, but we as a community of faith have and will continue to do what is best for the



good people of St. James's, and the wider community, while remaining faithful to the Gospel.

I have said it before and I will say it again; I am continually deeply humbled by the privilege to serve St. James's. We have risen to the challenge of our times and have thrived. The people of this parish and their generosity have allowed us to continue to be financially secure and to maintain

I want to thank all those who have participated so faithfully in Sunday morning Zoom worship, KFC (Kids for Christ), and now Sunday's @ 5:00 Outside. With the creative leadership of Betsy Curtler and Bob Sedivy, a group of folks have been quietly (behind the scenes) making washable cloth masks for folks who need them. They have made nearly 250 adult and 100 kid's masks. They are available at the outdoor service on Sundays, and if your school aged child needs or wants one to add to the collection before school begins, come pick one up. This is just one more example of how so much is still happening. Another great example of this is all the beautiful maintenance and reimagining that has happened on the church property with the gardens, and as stated above, so much of our outreach efforts have continued with your help—just to name a few.

For me the most heartwarming part of all of this is the continued efforts of so many to stay connected with each other. Through phone calls, emails, texts, children's art projects, and now in person—from a safe distance—we are

staying connected. If you are feeling isolated or just out of the loop, please reach out to me or someone else.

No one knows what the end of summer and fall will bring. Confirmation classes will happen and some adult ed opportunities are being explored. Services will continue while constantly adapting to the current situation. As the kids, teachers, professors and school staffs go back to in-person education, hold them in your prayers. We live in an uncertain and often scary time, but I can tell you without any doubt in my mind or heart that together, along with God's guidance and help, we can do this.

The Clergy, Vestry and the Moving Forward Taskforce will continue to assess what is next and keep the entire parish informed. Hang in there, stay safe, and know that God and I love you.

Confirmation Class - September 2020-March 2021

Location: Class will be held outside as long as the weather permits. When the weather doesn't allow us to be outside, we will move into the Parish Hall, where everyone will sit at individual chairs/desks, socially-distanced from each other.

Details: Class will include a 5-10 minute break in the middle. The class will be discussion-based and include some central texts from the Christian tradition. The goal is to create a learning environment that fosters questions, doubts, excitement, debate, discovery and fun. Some of the questions we will consider are: Who is Jesus? What is the point of prayer? What does the Gospel look like in practice? How do I read the Bible? What is the Church? What is Anglicanism? There will be an outreach component to the class which students will develop in conversation with me.

Goals: A main goal of the class is to provide the students with a time for fellowship and reflection during an unusually isolating time. The class is not intended to replicate their routine academic work; its purpose is to allow the students time to pause and reflect. We hope that many students will stay for the 5pm evening service.

From the Organist & Choirmaster

ear Parishioners,

I am so excited to announce that starting in September, our choir will meet again to rehearse and offer music for our Sunday services. With so many unknowns, the search for a path forward was a real challenge, but the circumstances revealed that singing together would continue to expose our choir community to risk. Instead, we will form a handbell choir!

Over the course of this pandemic, I have spoken to many choir directors and singers. Of those who've tried to sing with a mask and at a distance of 10 feet away from the closest singer, every one of them have expressed dissatisfaction with the experience. On the other hand... handbells are very easily heard from long distances, so the physical space between musicians is not a barrier to ensemble music making. Furthermore, we will not need to limit the number of people participating in choir, and they will not need to wear elaborate and uncomfortable singing masks. Regular masks will do.

The great tradition of handbell ringing is relatively unknown to our parish. It began at the end of the 17th century as a method for change ringers to practice their art without disturbing the entire community around them. Change ringing is the tradition of playing tower bells in continuously changing sequences such that no order is ever repeated. For example, it takes roughly 30 minutes to complete all the changes in a six bell peel. If you've ever attended a Sunday morning service or choral evensong at an English cathedral, your walk to the church was almost certainly bathed in the glorious sound of peeling bells!

As time went on, handbells earned their own repertoire, and handbell choirs became popular in English parish churches. Handbells provide a way for non-singing parishioners to offer music during worship.

Ringing handbells will be a new experience for our choir, but ultimately it is a lot of fun and I am grateful to have this option available to us. I am doubly grateful that we are able to lease a set of handbells from one of the finest manufacturers in the world, Malmark. The leasing program is fairly inexpensive and flexible, allowing us to return the instruments when we decide to resume singing.


The bells arrive in early September and our rehearsals begin the Wednesday after Labor Day.

On a closing note, if I haven't seen you at one of our fabulous outdoor 5pm services, I hope you will consider joining us in the coming weeks. It is so nice to gather together and see familiar faces.

Wishing everyone, especially educators and families with school-aged children, good luck and fortitude as you go back to school. I really believe that we are on the home stretch of a difficult era.

Bring a Friend to Church 5

S we head into Fall 2020, I would like to take a minute to review what the office of Family and Youth Ministries offered this summer. After much discussion with families with young children in April and May, Bob and I decided that we would offer an at-home summer program. We found a great curriculum by Illustrated Ministries called Camp Compassion. We offered this program for four weeks, each week with a different concentration: Compassion at the Table, Compassion for Your Neighbor, Compassion for Yourself, and Compassion Along the Way. As a part of this curriculum, we did Bible study, crafts, yoga, prayer and more. Bob and I delivered all the supplies necessary to 19 families at St. James's for a total of 38 children involved. At a time with so much on young families' plates, our idea was not to cause any stress for these young families, but to offer support. The feedback from the program was very positive. Children and parents seemed to enjoy it. For Bob and me, it was particularly fun to deliver the supplies and to see in person, all the wonderful children of the parish. A special thank you to Christine, Abby, Jane and Lily Cate Waterman for recording the yoga sessions. Also, thank you to Nora Willson who recorded the closing prayer sessions. Both of these offerings added so much to the program overall.

Also started this spring, was the Read-a-Loud sessions. After discussion with young parents, we decided to offer a recorded read-aloud of a children's book each week. From mid-May through August, Bob recorded me reading 15 different children's books from classics like "Stone Soup" to new offerings like, "I Am Enough." Links to each of these Read-Alouds can be found on page 7.

Also, we have continued to have the KFC -to-Go every Sunday at 9 a.m. since March 15. Interestingly, the attendance at KFC-to-Go has been better than inperson attendance on Sunday mornings. It has been just a small ray of sunshine in the midst of this storm.



I will also be calling parents over the next few weeks to see what they would like to see us do, and send out a survey to families with young children asking them about what would be helpful. Treasurer's Report / January-July 2020

Current Position: The Church's total Income for the seven months ending July 31, 2020 was \$38,936 less than the budgeted amount and expenses were \$14,022 under budget. As a result, the Church's net financial position at the

end of July, 2020 was a negative variance to budget of \$24,914.

<u>Income:</u> For the seven month period, Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) in total were \$27,578 less than budget. Current Year pledges were behind budget by \$17,440 and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings totaled \$10,138 less than budget. Income from outside groups using the Parish Facilities was \$8,909 under budget. Special Contributions were \$1,342 less than budget.

Expenses: Major contributors to the January - July expense results were the following: Property: Property expenses for the period were \$7,368 under budget. Maintenance supplies, lawn care and snow removal were \$3,951 under budget. General maintenance expenses were \$2,901 over budget and utilities were\$6,703 under budget due in part to the timing of payments. Personnel: Personnel expenses were \$1,914 over budget for the seven month period. Nine of the remaining expense categories were under budget by the aggregate amount of \$8,741 and one was \$173 over budget.

Moving Forward Update

In this strange time, we are making plans for how to move forward and come back together when it is safe to do so.



This update is meant to give you an idea of what is happening now, and what might happen next.

ORK continues to bring the St. James's community together in whatever ways are possible both now, over the summer and in the future. Our driving goal is to provide for the spiritual life of all parishioners. Here is what we know:

For now we continue to have Morning prayer at home, which can be found on the blog page and in weekly email, and a YouTube video service each week. We will also continue to offer the Outside @5:00 spiritual eucharist on the Walden Street side of the church, weather permitting. This schedule will continue until we have the ability to "live stream" church services, followed by CDC-regulated in-person services when that becomes safe. Once we get live streaming up and running, we will continue this as a regular offering. This means anyone who cannot physically attend church for any reason will always be able to participate.

That is a lot of information – here are some **Frequently Asked Questions** to clarify what we are planning:

How can I go to church right now?

Each Sunday there will be a YouTube video service and a spiritual eucharist offered outdoors at 5pm on the Walden Street side of the building. The videos remain on YouTube so you can watch or re-watch anytime you like. Links to these services can be found on the website. Please look for the weekly emails for details and what is happening when.

What is "live streaming"?

Live streaming is not a recorded video, but a real-time video feed broadcast from the church during a live service. In the short -term these services will not include parishioners in attendance, but when that is determined to be safe, there will be in-person services that will also be live streamed for those who cannot attend.

How do I access the live stream broadcast?

When available, access will be as easy as going to our website and clicking on the Livestream button on the home page. There will be no need to navigate Zoom or Facebook or any other program. You can use a computer, laptop, tablet, phone, or any other device that can access the internet.

Will I be able to watch these videos at a different time, after the service?

Yes, these broadcasts will be recorded and available on YouTube after a brief delay. Perhaps the day after the service. Links will be available on the website for Livestream and YouTube services.

When will it be "determined to be safe" to have in-person services?

We do not have a specific date for in-person services. We will continue to monitor the public health situation and take steps slowly and carefully, erring on the side of safety and not rushing to meet any particular date. Please be patient as we make these decisions with great care and attention to detail.

Are specific supplies needed before we can have services inperson?


YES! We need Clorox disposable wipes, or any other equivalent non bleach-based wipes. Greatly appreciated donations may be dropped outside the cloister entrance to the building. Thank you!

How will in-person services be different than they were before?

There are several ways we know of, and likely some we have not figured out yet. We will follow all CDC guidelines for religious services. Precautions will include:

- Communion: In the near-term there will be no communion.
 The bishops have advised us not to have communion in its traditional sense and that seems prudent. Instead we will continue to use the service we have been using for the videos. It is an Adapted Version of Eucharistic Prayer B, for a time when gathering with bread and wine is not possible.
- Symptom checks: Please consider your health, and the health of your family members before you decide to attend church. If you have a fever, cough, have spent time recently where the virus is circulating, or have any condition that puts you at higher risk of contracting severe Covid-19, please choose not to attend in-person services. Live streaming will be available for anyone who cannot or should not attend services.
- Music: There will be no singing at services. Scientific studies have shown that singing increases the range that individuals project particles and has been a major factor in superspreader events. Vaughn has been working hard to plan alternative service music and has decided to put together a Handbell Choir until singing is deemed safe. It is sure to be beautiful!
- Social distancing: This will require limited (1 out of every 3 pews) and likely assigned seats. Ushers will direct you to the next available pew so that we can accommodate as many attendees as possible. Seating will start at the front of the church and move backwards. Please accept your seating assignment and any other direction from the ushers without question. They will be specially trained to keep everyone as safe as possible.
- Face masks: Face coverings will be required for all attendees.
 A dedicated group of parishioners has been busy sewing masks to provide to anyone who needs one. Please wear your own face covering if you have one available that works well for you.
- Passing the Plate: Offering plates will be placed at the
 entrance for donations. If you are one of the many
 parishioners paying your pledges by mail during these times,
 please continue to do so. If you have not tried this solution,
 please consider it. Contributions should be mailed to St.

Timing: To allow for proper seating, we will ask you to arrive 15 minutes prior to service time. There will likely be only one service each Sunday.
