From the Rector's Desk

Dear Friends,

I rarely get inspiration from Facebook. Facebook does provide humor, frustration, anger, and the joy of reconnecting with old friends, but not inspiration that speaks directly to what is in my heart. That is until just the other day. Someone had posted a quote from Walter Brueggemann that spoke right to where I think I find myself at the moment, as I believe many of you do. Walter is a brilliant theologian and Old Testament scholar who has been an important figure in modern progressive Christianity. The Brueggemann quote is:

"The prophetic tasks of the church are to tell the truth in a society that lives in illusion, grieve in a society that practices denial, and express hope in a society that lives in despair."

Over the past few weeks, it seems like every conversation I have had has included some expression of frustration and despair, which with everything going on in the world seems totally appropriate. I am not one to frequently experience despair or, for that matter, even infrequent emotion, but between the Delta variant, lingering vaccination rates nationally, the fall of Afghanistan, and the recent earthquake in Haiti, despair and frustration seem like the way to go.

As a Christian, and someone who believes strongly in the incarnational power of each person's ability to effect change and lend assistance when possible, I know that despair is not the only choice. No matter how old, young, educated, and no matter what our resources are, each and every person has the ability (and the responsibility) to be messengers of hope. How we are able to and how we choose to do this is as varied as the situation and the individual, but please know, that your light is desperately needed shining in the world today. If you find yourself feeling that light dimming, and despair like a basket covering it up, reach out so that others can help you shine.

While so much of this change feels bigger than any one of us, change and the need for hope are always present. As we begin a new program year here at St. James's, we are in the midst of many changes. With the departure of both Vaughn and Tim as they take on new challenges, we have the opportunity to explore what is next for us as a community. For many folks, change of any type can be concerning at the least and very frightening at the most, but with change always comes opportunity for growth both individually and communally. As Christians, change is not to be feared and avoided, but embraced and seen as an opportunity to practice hope.

As we begin the new program year here at St. James's back to our regular pre-COVID schedule (hopefully), I hope and pray that a new sense of hope will allow us all to speak with a prophetic voice that is so desperately needed at this time.

On a personal note, if you are finding yourself unable to move beyond fear to this place of hope, please do not hesitate to contact me so that I can travel that journey with you.

It is with sadness that I write to inform you all that I will be leaving my position as Assistant Rector at St. James's. My last day will be Monday August 30, 2021. My last Sunday with you all will be Sunday August 29, the Fourteenth Sunday after Pentecost. My fiancée Phoenix and I will be moving to Evanston, Illinois, where Phoenix will start a PhD program at Northwestern University in September. She will be doing an Interdisciplinary PhD in Theater and Drama, studying medieval drama and liturgy through the lens of contemporary thought. While we are both excited to move to a new place, meet new people, and learn new things, we are sad to leave West Hartford and the community we have discovered here.

I am in the process of seeking a new call in a parish in Chicago. Again, this is bittersweet. I look forward to learning from and with a new community in Christ's One Body, and yet I also long for more time with you all. I am full of hope, however. I trust that God is leading you deeper and deeper into everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

I am deeply grateful for the many moments of faith, hope and love that I shared with you. My faith has grown, and I have seen your faith grow, even in a time of isolation and anxiety. This is a miracle, like the time that Israel spent in Babylon, weeping by its rivers. They were exiled form their home, their community, their God, and they discovered that, in fact, God was still with them. I believe God has been with us all along, and God will never leave us.

I want to thank Bob for his loving leadership. His compassion for you all, and for me, has taught me much about being a priest.


Above all, I thank God for the time I have spent with you. I do not regard it as "ended," because I believe we share in

Please Help Us Welcome Jonathan to St. James's

T. James's is pleased to welcome Jonathan Smith as our new Lay-Curate. He is currently in ordination process in the Episcopal Church in Connecticut and recently completed his Master of Divinity degree from Harvard. Jonathan will be serving at St. James's beginning September 15 and will be with us until late spring/early summer 2022, when he plans to go on active duty as a chaplain in the US Navy. He was commissioned as a Navy chaplain candidate in 2018 and is currently completing a unit of Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) at Walter Reed National Military Medical Center in the Washington, DC area. In addition to regularly being the chaplain on-call for the whole hospital, his assigned units include the Emergency Department, Inpatient Psychiatry, Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI), and Dialysis.

Originally from San Diego, Jonathan is a life-long Episcopalian. He earned a scholarship to attend Shattuck-St. Mary's — a storied Episcopal

boarding school in Minnesota — before coming to Connecticut to attend Yale. He was a first-generation college student, completing his degree in history, with a concentration in the political history of the Soviet Union.

In the twenty years (give or take) between college and finishing divinity school, Jonathan had an adventurous career in documentary production and video journalism. His work took him as far north as the Russian Arctic for the History Channel and as far south as the Cape of Good Hope for the United Nations Association of the United States. He was awarded the US Coast Guard's Arctic Service Medal and is a licensed private pilot. Most importantly, Jonathan is the proud parent of Linus, an impossibly handsome (his words), two-year-old Blue Heeler/German Shepard mix. We expect to see lots of Linus around the campus during Jonathan's time with us.

Jonathan spent the final year of his divinity school studies attending classes remotely while working as a seminarian intern at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Nantucket, which, he says, was as close to being on a ship as was possible under the circumstances.

HOPE that everyone reading this newsletter had a restful and rejuvenating summer. I know that Bob and I did. We visited with family all over the country, did some small projects around the house, and took time to take some nice walks around Connecticut. As we head into September, there are several events for youth and family that we are planning here at St. James's.

The first event is the End of Summer Popsicle Social for families with young children. This event takes place on Monday, August 30 at 5:30 pm outside of the Walden Street entrance to the church. If you have young children, this is a chance to get together, have a popsicle, all in a socially distanced safe space. It should be a good time for all!

On September 19, all middle school and high schoolers are invited to a Scavenger Hunt in West Hartford center. This is an event that has been extremely popular in past years and we are happy to be able to do it again this year. The scavenger hunt will begin at church at 5:30 and end at 7. Please mark your calendars and plan to join us!

In October, I am planning a high school and middle school visit to the West Hartford Hauntings. The schedule for this event is not online yet, but I am tentatively planning it for Friday, October 29. More information to come as it becomes available.

As far as Sunday mornings go here at church, two areas of church life Bob and I are trying to figure out are acolytes and nursery care. In the case of acolytes, our plan is to have one teen who is vaccinated serve each Sunday as crucifer. We will add more acolytes on Sunday mornings as more kids become eligible for vaccinations. As for nursery care, we will be separating the children into two groups, mobile and non-mobile. This means we will need multiple

vaccinated high school students for each Sunday. Nursery care is a paid opportunity. As a safety precaution we will be requiring nursery care givers to be masked and acolytes to be masked except for when seated. At that point if they wish to remove their mask they may as they will be more than ten feet from any other person.



We believe that this is important for the children of this parish for both their mental and spiritual health. Plus, having youth back participating in church is good for the parish as a whole. After talking to many parents with young children, I have learned that without nursery care, church attendance just isn't possible.



Treasurer's Report / January-July 2021

Current Position: For the first seven months of 2021 the Church's finances were negative vis a vis the budget. Total Income for that period was \$13,358 less than the budgeted amount and expenses were \$3,196

under budget. As a result, the Church's net financial position at the end of July, 2021 was a negative variance to budget of \$10,162.

Income: For the period January 1 through July 31, 2021 Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) in total were \$18,796 less than budget. Current Year Pledges were \$19,766 less than the budget amount whereas Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings exceeded the budget by \$970. Income from outside groups using the Parish Facilities was \$1,845 over budget. Special Contributions were \$2,603 over budget.

Expenses: Major contributors to the January-July expense results were the following:

Property: Total Property expenses for the period were \$232 under budget.

Personnel: Personnel expenses were \$4,550 under budget for the period primarily due to Clergy and Lay Staff benefit expenses being less than budgeted amounts.

Of the remaining expense categories, five were over budget and five were under, the net amount being \$1,585 over budget.

Hartford Catholic Worker Food Bags

T. JAMES'S continues to partner with Hartford Catholic Worker to provide 30 bags of food twice a month for families facing food insecurity in the Hartford area.

Each bag contains: 2 cans of tuna, 1 jar of mayo, 1 can of soup, 1 box/bag of pasta, 1 jar of pasta sauce, 1 can of beans, 1 jar of peanut butter, 1 jar of jelly.
