# From the Assistant Rector

EAR beloved community of St. James's,

Greetings! My name is Joe Rose and I am overjoyed to be joining you in September to serve as your new Assistant Rector. Through my prayers as well as some great conversations with Bob and my time with many of you during my visit earlier this summer, I feel a strong sense of call to St. James's. When Bob and I first met to discuss this possibility, he asked me to describe my theology in one word. My answer: "Community." When I preached at St. James's in June, it was inspiring to learn of the intentionality, creativity, and love that you bring to living the Gospel of Jesus Christ as a community. My wife, Heidi, and I were also moved by your incredible hospitality. Heidi told me that St. James's instantly felt like home. Yes, it did.

For the past six years, Heidi and I have served as co-executive directors at Trinity Church Wall Street's retreat center in West Cornwall, CT. At Trinity Retreat Center, my work included, among other things, leading multigenerational retreats and camps, sharing in the preaching and liturgical life, and developing a creation care ministry that featured a "Good News Garden" farm and a sanctuary for rescued donkeys. In May, I graduated from Yale with a Master of Divinity and a diploma in Anglican Studies. In June, after returning from a pilgrimage in Canterbury, England, I was ordained as a transitional deacon in the Episcopal Church in Connecticut. I previously served a 15-month internship at St. Johns New Haven. I received my Clinical Pastoral Education training at the VA Hospital in West Haven.



My path to ordination was a circuitous one. I am a native of the Pacific Northwest, where I was raised on the banks of the mighty Columbia River, amid central Washington's fruit orchards and farmlands. My conversion experience involved a gradual discovery of God as a teenager and in Army basic training at Ft. Benning, Georgia. The week after I turned 20, I was baptized at the Episcopal Church in my hometown. I went to college at Central Washington University, studied abroad for

a year in Northern Ireland, and decided to become a journalist. With journalism, I saw an opportunity to pursue a faithful vocation, giving voice to the voiceless, holding the powerful accountable, and helping my neighbors understand complex issues that affected their lives. Heidi and I met while working at a small-town newspaper. I worked as a journalist for 23 years, including at Wired magazine and The Oregonian in Portland, before feeling called to ministry. I began discerning a call to priesthood shortly after accepting the call to my retreat center ministry. Heidi and I have two daughters – Úna, 28, who lives in Seattle, and Eleanor, 22, who lives in Amherst. In my free time, I enjoy mountain biking, listening to vinyl records, reading, and going on walks with Heidi. We are excited to start exploring Elizabeth Park and other parts of West Hartford on our walks.

I'm looking forward to sharing more of my story with you and hearing each of your stories as we walk together as a lived expression of Jesus' story. After attending a recent staff meeting at St. James's to plan programming into 2023, I couldn't wait to get started. The plans for worship, music, teaching, and putting your faith in action revealed a community that is alive and filled with a strong sense of mission. I'm excited to start partnering with Bob, Alan, your incredible staff, and all of you to be co-creators with God in the good work that you do in West Hartford. Two of my great ministry passions are feeding the hungry and living into our baptismal vow to "strive for justice and peace among all people," respecting "the dignity of every human being." I'm excited to go deeper with you on those topics at the Feeding Ministry forum "I Was Hungry": Theological Reflections on Food, Justice, and Mission" in October. I am also devoted to family ministries, creation care, and ministries of healing and reconciliation. As a fan of pop culture, I also enjoy exploring where the sacred and the secular intersect. I think searching for God's presence and love in places where we don't normally look is a valuable spiritual practice. At Trinity Episcopal Cathedral in Portland, Oregon, I started the "alt.liturgies" ministry that offered worship services using contemporary music from acts as diverse as U2, Billie Holiday, David Bowie, and Radiohead.

In the message to newcomers on our website, St. James's offers a welcome that reveals our inclusivity, faith, and commitment to multigenerational discipleship. It also describes our community as "fun-loving." That's powerful. That is, indeed, good news. In community, we find joy, because there is so much joy in doing the transformative, life-giving work of following Jesus. I believe that a faith community that loves fun is open-hearted, prepared to celebrate God's love for all people, and willing to keep growing in how we share that awesome love. A community that loves fun as it walks with Jesus also takes to heart Paul's letter to the Philippians, in which "joy," "rejoice," and "be glad" appear a combined sixteen times. With joy, we are more resistant to fear as we navigate challenging times and discern together where God might be calling us next.

I will join you on September 1. As I think about how I have been called to St. James's, I feel privileged that I will get to gather, pray, and grow with you as a deacon and as a priest. I look forward to hearing about how you experience God's love at St. James's. I look forward to sharing in God's work of changing lives in our community and beyond. And, yes, I look forward to having fun with you.

# From the Associate for Education & Music

## Our Summer With Mendelssohn: A Synopsis and Playlist

A number of folks who weren't able to join us have asked if I might offer a synopsis of our recent summer dive into the life and music of Felix Mendelssohn. Of course, I'm delighted to do so, and to report on a wonderful Wednesday-evening experience together. While making trips to and from a table filled with enticing snacks (from homemade parmesan crisps to smokehouse almonds and lemon hummus), we've enjoyed catching up, spending time with friends old and new, and savoring the incredible music and life story of one of history's greatest musical figures. From the masterpieces he somehow produced at age 16 to the oratorios and symphonies of his final flourishing, we've taken a fascinating musical journey through England, Scotland, Wales, Italy, Switzerland, stopping along the way to see the composer's paintings and sketches and to hear his endlessly colorful music. We've followed him into the enchanted forest, where he has brought to life sprites, royalty, young lovers, witches, druids and more, all through music. And finally we've followed him into the inner, mystical world of an ancient prophet and a first-century apostle, into the heart of their respective pilgrim journeys as servants of God.

### Finding his voice

We began by taking a look at who and what formed Mendelssohn and how he found his distinctive sound. With bankers on both sides of the family, and with a famous-philosopher grandfather, young Felix (and sister Fanny) had an enviable musical upbringing that included lessons with well-known composers, access to a house orchestra on Saturdays, and Sunday dinners with regular visitors such as the poet Goethe. This at least in part helps to understand how Felix became the most precocious genius in Western music history, writing symphonies at 12, an opera at 15, and universally-acknowledged masterpieces at 16.

### Painting

As a "graduation" gift, Mendelssohn was given a three-year journey through major European destinations in England, Scotland, Switzerland, France, and more. Over this time, the young composer cultivated his impressive skills as a watercolorist and landscape painter; musically, he sketched his immortal evocations of Scotland and Italy for piano solo, orchestra, and solo voice.

### Innovating

Mendelssohn was an old-fashioned composer who revered Bach, Handel, Haydn, Mozart and Beethoven. He revived interest in Bach and championed the music of Schubert. One snide critic noted his "fondness for the dead." Yet at the same time, Mendelssohn was an important and bold innovator, especially in two areas: he broke open concerto form, and, most important, he invented the tone poem, the single-movement, representational orchestral genre that in many ways defined Early Romanticism.

## Volunteers Needed at the Grace Church Food Pantry

**G** RACE Episcopal Church, Hartford, has a long-standing food pantry program for the community of Parkville, called *A Place of Grace*. The pandemic has greatly increased the number of participating families. The need has doubled over the last 2-3 years and increased by 25% in the past 3-4 months. Over 200 families receive food weekly from this Grace Church program.

Volunteers are needed. There are two types of jobs that need to be filled: one requires physical strength and involves lifting 10-15 pound small pallets of groceries. This occurs at Grace Church on Wednesdays from 9:00 - 12:00. The other volunteer opportunity is greeting and assisting people through the "grocery-style aisles" of the pantry as they select the various food items they need. Again, this is held at Grace Church from 9:00 - 12:00 on Thursdays.

## A Reflection By Doug Compton Why I Do What I Do At St. James's

T a very early age, I started going to church every Sunday. It was expected that I would join Mom for the weekly 9am service. There were times in high school when I went to the Catholic Church in the morning and my school's service in the afternoon. As an adult, my Catholic upbringing continued to send me to church every Sunday and all holy days. I was on church "auto pilot" for most of my life as an obligation to Mom. In the initial stages of my spiritual journey, there was little purpose other than to make Mom happy and my personal spiritual journey.

After the early death of a priest who I adored, I stopped going to church for the first time in my life. It took me about six months before I discovered that I was missing something in my life. It was time to explore someplace other than the Catholic Church to live out my faith. Kathy, my wife, was an Episcopalian, so I headed there with the intention of trying out several other denominations. It only took one service to know I had found a new home when I visited St. James's Episcopal Church in West Hartford.

As I was leaving after the service, an older gentleman introduced himself. This was first time in all my years of attending church someone approached me to have a friendly conversation. He asked me if I would like to come down to the kitchen and help make sandwiches. Why? How many? For whom and what's a church doing making sandwiches? I had never heard of any church that I attended making an effort to "feed the hungry". The following week, the same gentleman, Steve Cobb, asked me once again to join them in the kitchen-this time to make casseroles. The first week, we made 240 bologna sandwiches; the second week, we made enough Tuna Noodle casseroles to feed 100 people, perhaps more importantly, I was making friendships within the church community. This was the start of a new chapter in my spiritual journey: church now had a new purpose by engaging with the local community in a meaningfully, hands-on and understandable way. I soon learned:

- More than 400,000 people in CT are nutritionally deprived
- More than 120,000 of them are children
- 1 in 6 kids in CT go to bed hungry on a regular basis
- 32% of the residents in Hartford live below the poverty line

So, what could possibly be more meaningful than finding ways to feed those in need? Not just sending a check, not just talking about it, but direct action meeting a REAL need.

I continued heading to St. James's and then to the kitchen for several months, increasingly becoming more excited about the feeding ministries provided by the church. Selling my collection of hardcover thrillers, Easter lilies, poinsettias at Christmas, and mums, apples and pies in the fall. I became active in raising money for more food which went directly to folks living in local shelters and to stocking food pantries. Then the church developed a vegetable garden; the produce is distributed by Hartford Catholic Worker in a very underserved part of the City of Hartford. Planting, weeding, and harvesting, I became aware that **Religion was no longer a passive spectator sport for me, as my Rector, Bob Hooper likes to say.** Now church had a clearer purpose, and I had a ministry. Soon, I became a lector, then I was asked to become a vestry member, all the while meeting more people in the St. James community, learning more about my faith, and finding additional ways to engage with the community. Until Covid hit, I was serving the casseroles that we made on Sunday to the homeless in Hartford on Monday. Now the ministry had faces, and for the first time I was interacting with folks experiencing homelessness as people came into Loaves and Fishes, a Hartford food pantry, for what was probably their only real meal of the day. The need was so obvious and overwhelming.

In addition to the feeding ministries, St. James's provided other ways to actively engage the surrounding community by providing toiletries, socks, and school supplies for folks in living in shelters. What's more important than a meal and a pair of dry, warm socks? The basic necessities of life we take so much for granted became the focus of my new ministry, and this opportunity was given to me through the church. Jesus did not sit in the temple all day—what did he do? He reached out into the community; he fed people; he cured people; he cared for the outcasts within the community. As found in scripture: Feeding the less economically secure is part of serving one another, and as we serve others, we are serving Christ. *I was sick and you took care of me, I was hungry and you gave me something to eat (Matt 25:36).* 

And finally: Suppose a brother or sister does not have any clothes or daily food and one of you tells them, "Go in peace! Stay warm and eat heartily." If we do not provide for their bodily needs, what good does it do? In the same way, faith by itself, if it does not prove itself with actions, is dead (Jas 2:14-17, 26).

How can you engage in community outreach? The need is there. Head to church and learn how to become active in your faith community.
