Dear Siblings in Christ,

I don't know about you, but I have had a very busy/eventful/fun summer. Thanks to the people, lay leadership of St. James's, and some wonderful and faithful clergy colleagues, I was able to step away from my responsibilities as rector of St. J's and take a time of sabbatical – a time away to rest, recharge, reconnect and explore.

From the Assistant Rector


EAR St. James's Parish,

I am overjoyed to be able to join you as the new Assistant Rector at St. James's Episcopal Church and thrilled to join this community in this role. This opportunity comes to me after years of discernment, prayer, and preparation within the Church's ordination process. In these first few weeks at St. James's I have been struck by how bonded and loving this community is. Your warm welcome speaks to the caring and creative approach to the gospel you have thoughtfully developed. I am eager to share with you more about my journey toward ordination and my hope for how I can contribute to the community in this role.

I did not grow up in a dyed-in-the-wool Episcopalian family. While my grandparents had a vital connection to the church, it was not something that shaped my childhood. It wasn't until my sophomore year of high school, when I stumbled across a small group of students gathering to reflect on scripture, that I first contemplated what a life oriented towards God could mean. This reflection began in high school but continued through college and into the first few years as a young professional. At this time, an Episcopal priest named Peter Moore gave me an opportunity to serve in a unique context. He founded FOCUS (The Fellowship of Christians in Universities and Schools), an inter-denominational para-church organization that offers New England boarding school students on-campus small groups, retreats, and summer programs. FOCUS offered me an extraordinary context to continue my discernment while engaging students with similar conversations. Initially, I thought I would take this role for a few years and head to seminary. However, I truly fell in love with the work. As it turned out, I led FOCUS's New England boarding school ministry for 13 years. There, I led small groups and camps, trained and recruited staff and volunteers, and worked to create safe, open, and dynamic contexts where students. I have found that God's care and comfort are for all people at all times. As we walk with Jesus, we may discover that we are more broken than previously thought, yet the love and embrace of God through Jesus Christ is inexhaustible and worthy of a lifetime of exploration.

I carried this conviction through my studies at the Berkeley Divinity School at Yale and into my ordination process. I also hope to bring that ethos into my work at St. James's. I hope my Youth Ministry experience can contribute to St. James's commitment to a healthy and dynamic space for youth. Bob and I have begun to plan this year's mission trip to Ecuador through PACH (Partners for Andean Community Health). Since so much of my spiritual journey has involved engaging with scripture, I am also eager to share this experience with the community. Beginning with a three-week exploration of the Gospel of Mark, I hope to offer engaging conversations centered on biblical texts. I am also eager to provide some engaging Adult Forums alongside Michelle and Bob throughout the program year. Finally, hospitality deeply enriches my family life regularly. My wife Nicole, whom I hope many of you have already met, and I always hope to fold people into our family by welcoming them into our home, especially to the dinner table. This kindness has been offered to us repeatedly, and we find it is often the ground from which community, trust, and joy spring. I hope that our hospitality can be grafted into the life of St. James's in such a way as to create a warm welcome for those seeking a community in West Hartford.

Thank you again for your warm welcome into the St. James's community. I am honored to have the opportunity to serve and grow as a deacon and priest. I look forward to meeting each of you and hearing more about what St. James's means to you. I genuinely believe that as we share openly with one another, we can experience God's love in our midst.

N most years, when I write my September/October newsletter, I am looking forward to reconnecting with all the young families at St. James's. In past summers, the attendance at the summer services was small, with families busy with other fun summertime activities. This year, that is not the case at all. Except for the last two Sundays of August, I had as many or almost as many kids at Kids For Christ (KFC) this summer than I have in the academic year. This has been a very joyful surprise for me. I think there are probably several factors that contribute to this, but I won't bore you with my thoughts on this. I am just thankful for all of those families that made a commitment to bring their children to church this summer. As I have said in the past, making church a priority when your kids are little helps them to make those relationships that support them later in life.

In August and September, we will explore Old Testament stories with the kids. We are learning the stories of Jonah, of Abraham and Sarah, of Moses, of Isaiah, of Joseph, the books of Proverbs and Psalms. We talked about why we study these stories and we made some gross estimates about how many people have heard these stories in the thousands of years they have been told. In October, we will be studying Jesus's parables. Children love these stories and I am looking forward to exploring these stories with them.

Also beginning September 9, is the return of Mondays Music & More (3Ms). At 3Ms, children age 3 through third grade learn Bible stories and learn beautiful music. This is a program on most Monday afternoons from 4 to 5:15. I am very excited to work with Michelle Horsley, our new Director of Music. Michelle has some creative, fun ideas for the program, as well as bringing experience working with children and understanding how all children learn in different ways. I am very excited to see how 3Ms evolves under Michelle's leadership. Michelle and I are thankful that recently retired WHPS elementary school teacher Louise "Ms. Lou" Strillacci will return in a supporting role. For our middle school and high school students, we have two fun events coming up. First, on September 14-15 is the Youth Event at Camp Washington. This is a fun-filled weekend with an opportunity to reconnect with friends from camp and make new friends as well. Join us at this event, especially if you have experienced Camp Washington before. Cost is \$30 per child. Go to <u>campwashington.org</u> to register. On October 6, St. James's will be hosting the Diocesan-wide Youth Group on the Move! at our church. High school and middle schoolers from around the diocese are invited to St. James's for a great evening. More details to come in the next few weeks.

In closing, I was reminded this summer, as we studied Isaiah, of the saying, "A little child shall lead them." Please know that we have some amazing people of faith in this beautiful place—of all ages and sizes. As we all hunker down for the busyness that is back-to-school time and the beginning of a new program year, let's not forget to thank God for the blessing of our lives here together at St. James's and make the most of the incredible opportunities offered here!

From the Organist & Director of Music

EAR community of St. James's Episcopal Church, This is my first newsletter as your new music director! It is an honor to be here, following Alan Murchie's illustrious tenure. He leaves very big shoes to fill!

I look forward to many introductions over the coming months and I am very touched by your warm welcome. Thank you for your patience as I learn your names and get acquainted with this vibrant, large community! I'm thrilled to be here.

For now, I'll introduce myself a bit: I live on the first floor of one of those 100-year-old houses in Hartford's West End. I share my space with a truly comical amount of houseplants and my dear cat, Norman, who wandered in off the streets several years ago. My last position was as the music director for Trinity Episcopal Church (Hartford) and of The Choir School of Hartford, which is a non-profit organization for kids aged 8-18, offering intensive music education rooted in the Royal School of Church Music (RSCM). While at Trinity and the Choir School, I led several chorister tours to NYC and held other large-scale choral programs - Haydn's Missa Brevis in F, Runestad's The Hope of Loving in collaboration with Ekklesia Contemporary Ballet, Kodaly's Missa Brevis, Pergolesi's Stabat Mater, Lessons & Carols featuring under-represented composers, Birdsong, and Ramírez's Missa Criolla in collaboration with Chorus Angelicus, etc. From 2020-2024 I was also the Dean for the Greater Hartford Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, which does a tremendous amount of work in the area to provide organ scholarships, project grants, concert series, continuing education, and conferences.


Most recently I took a 10-week solo journey this summer, recognizing the once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to have a couple months for travel in between jobs. The trip began in Europe, but was mostly spent in Central and Southeast Asia (Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Malaysia, Indonesia, Vietnam, Thailand, India) I got to hear chant in the Orthodox churches of Georgia/Armenia, hike with some friendly moms in Kyrgyzstan, go birding near the Tien Shan mountains, play gamelan music in Indonesia, and trek through very remote villages in the Himalayas, among many other exceedingly memorable experiences. I feel extraordinarily grateful and, needless to say, I was very glad to return to my friends, cat, kitchen, comfy bed... If you're also a person who is fascinated by other cultures, I'd love to hear about it.

As for this coming music season at St. James's, we've got exciting stuff cooking! The music events we're planning for the 2024-2025 season are lovingly and carefully conceptualized to celebrate the wonderfully intergenerational community at St. James's; new collaborations with other musical ensembles and organizations; and to honor beloved, traditional choral works while also being intentional about programming musical diversity, with attention toward music of other cultures and folk traditions, as well as music of under-represented composers. In many ways, we hope to reach deeply within and beyond these walls!

Throughout these past few weeks of beginnings at St. James's, I have felt such gratitude for the building blocks that are already being laid. I am grateful for Bob Hooper's enthusiastic "yes's" and equally for his honest discernment. I'm grateful to Priscilla Hooper for her vibrant sundresses and even more vibrant generosity of spirit. I thank Rob Lofberg for his collegial warmth and genuinely collaborative nature. I thank Cheryl for her administrative help and her fabulous flexibility as we establish new systems. And, with deep admiration, I thank Alan for all the work he has done here in recent years, despite post-Covid challenges, to continuously curate a welcoming, skillful, and engaged musical community of all ages. And, outside professional connections, I am simply grateful to call him my friend. Thank you, dear siblings in Christ at St. James's, for your kind gestures of hospitality and welcome as we begin this journey together. Blessings truly abound!


SUNDAY, NOVEMBER 10TH - STORYTIME (5:00PM)

Treasurer's Report / January—June 2024

Summary of Current Position:

Through June, the church is short of its budget by \$30,228. Income and expenses both contributed to the shortfall as income is \$19,109 below budget, primarily due to lower than projected pledge payments. Expenses are higher than budgeted due to property and personnel expenses that are higher than budgeted.

Income & Expense Summary:

Income: Year-to-Date (YTD) actual income is \$19,109 below budget (or 4.0% below budget). Last month, income was \$29,440 or 6.8%, below budget. The following components impacted the income position through the end of June: Regular Contributions (Current-Year Pledges, Prior-Year Pledges, Seasonal Offerings and Unspecified Offerings) ended the month \$36,665 below the \$334,690 budget, or 10.9% below budget. Last month, Regular Contributions were \$43,912 below budget. Most of the shortfall in Regular Contributions is due to Current Year Pledges which are \$31,912 below budget (or 10.0% below budget), an improvement from last month's \$39,980 shortfall. A review of the pledge payments is underway. Facilities Income: Actual income of \$44,048 is \$3,603 greater than the budgeted amount of \$40,445. Last month, facilities income was \$746 greater than budgeted. Special Contributions, General Purposes: The primary component in this category is the Rector's Appeal contributions. At the end of June, actual receipts were \$14,300 higher than projected, a small reduction from May's overage of \$14,500. A review of the pledges has begun to assess the bucketing of pledge payments which may also impact the current shortfall in the current year pledges.

Expenses: YTD expenses are \$11,119, or 2.3%, above budget. As of end of June, expenses were \$8,600, or 2.6%, higher than budgeted. A few key expense categories in terms of their contribution to the overall variance through the end of June are: Property: \$4,157 over budget, caused by Gas expenses which are \$5,700 above budget. Personnel: \$5,490 over budget. Last month, Personnel was \$5,300 above budget. Components of the personnel expenses are being reviewed.

HANK you to all who helped with this year's annual drive for children and families. We filled a total of 170 backpacks with school supplies (a record). We also had an enormous amount of supplies donated this year, too much to count. The backpacks and supplies were delivered to the families served by Grace Church Food Pantry, The Bridge Family Center, Hartford Catholic Worker, and social workers at West Hartford's Morley School. Because of your generosity, many children began the school year better prepared.

We could also use some candy canes to add an additional holiday touch to the socks.
