Republished from earlier this summer – it's that important

Dear St. James's Family,

I write today with a deep and joyful conviction: there is immense value in bringing our children and teens to church—not just for their sake, but for the sake of the whole community.

In a world that is often hurried, anxious, and fractured, church offers something radically different. It offers space to breathe, to belong, to question, and to grow. It offers a vision of love that is not transactional, a sense of identity rooted not in appearance or achievement, but in being created and cherished by a loving and liberating God.

At St. James's, we don't ask our children and youth (or anyone for that matter) to conform to rigid molds. Instead, we invite them to bring their full selves—their questions, their creativity, their doubts, and their dreams—and to discover that faith is not about having all the answers, but about learning to live with compassion, curiosity, and courage.

Here, they learn that their voice matters. That justice and mercy walk hand in hand. That the stories of Scripture aren't dusty relics but living invitations to seek truth and do good in the world. They see a Jesus who stands with the outcast, who lifts up the lowly, and who teaches us to love boldly, even when it's hard.

But perhaps most importantly, they see adults—you—who show up. Who make sandwiches and sing hymns. Who volunteer, mentor, and pray. Who model what it means to live a life of integrity and hope. Every Sunday, simply by being here, we bear witness to a different way of being human. Our children are watching. And they are being shaped.

So I encourage you—whether you're a parent, a grandparent, a friend, or simply someone who cares—to make the choice to bring our young people into this sacred space. It doesn't have to be perfect. They don't have to sit still. What matters most is that they are welcomed, that they are seen, and that they know they are loved.

Let us continue to be a church where all generations grow together, learn from one another, and embody the kind of faith that changes lives—not just theirs, but ours too.

From the Assistant Rector

EAR St. James's Community,

As I reflect on this past year at St. James's, I am overwhelmed with gratitude for the welcome, support, and encouragement I have received from all of you. I could not have imagined a better setting in which to begin my priesthood. While Nicole and I are excited about the opportunities that lie ahead, we can't help but feel a deep sense of sadness as we step away from the church that has so quickly become our home. This letter gives me the opportunity to name just a few of the many aspects of St. James's that I will deeply miss.

First and foremost, I give heartfelt thanks to God for the opportunity to work with Bob Hooper. Bob has patiently taught and guided me in learning the craft of the priesthood, offering wisdom within a context of professionalism, camaraderie, and true friendship. Our time together has been filled with meaningful conversations about the joys and challenges of ministry, the vocation of a priest, and the sacred balance of joy and sacrifice in this work.

Likewise, Priscilla's voice and presence have been invaluable to both me and Nicole. Her years of commitment to life within the Church have offered us insight, encouragement, and countless moments of wisdom that we will carry with us. Our partnership with the youth of St. James's was a particular joy, culminating this summer in our unforgettable trip to Ecuador—a time of shared adventure and lifelong memories. The group's thoughtful, organic contributions often led us to powerful shared reflections. The Wednesday morning Eucharistic community holds a special place in my heart as well. This faithful group extended abundant grace as I learned to lead the liturgy. I came to treasure the discipline of following the lesser feasts and remembering the saints of the Church. Our breakfasts afterwards were a source of fellowship and learning, helping me better understand the history, heart, and character of St. James's.

Nicole, Andrew, and I are also deeply grateful for the way you welcomed our whole family. This year brought us meaningful friendships full of encouragement and laughter. We will never forget the support and joy surrounding Andrew's high school graduation. It warmed my heart to see him connecting with adults over coffee hour—received not just as a teenager, but as a peer and friend on the cusp of adulthood. As a father and a priest, I could not have asked for a more supportive community for my family.

Though moving on is part of any vocation, we hope you know how sincerely and wholeheartedly we carry our gratitude. St. James's has left a lasting mark on my ministry and my spiritual identity, and its influence will accompany me throughout my life in the Church.

PipeScreams – Thursday, October 24 at 6:00 / 7:00 PM



Annual School Supply Drive

We could also use some candy canes to add an additional holiday touch to the socks.

OLY Eucharist is celebrated every Wednesday morning in the chapel at 7:00 followed by breakfast in the Parish Room. We hope to see you there!


Chalice Bearers Needed Volunteer to Host!
