From the Assistant Rector

ear St. James's Youth,

If I'm honest, I'm not sure I would have survived high school without the youth group at my church. So much of the rest of my week was filled with stress—there were the usual adolescent anxieties about whether I looked the right way, said the right thing, belonged to the right group. But then in addition to all of that, I had to make sure I had the most challenging courseload possible, all the right extracurricular activities and enough leadership positions to create a strong resume to get into the best possible college to ensure I had the best chance at success in my adult life. The pressure was enormous, all with the goal of pushing me toward some identity I wasn't sure I wanted, and toward a future I was told I needed to have, even though no one could tell me what it was.

But on Sunday evenings, it was different. My youth group was the one place I didn't have to have everything figured out. I didn't have to worry about saying or doing just the right thing, about accomplishments and awards and this unknown future that was supposed to guide my every decision. I could just be myself.

I'm not sure I even remember all that much about the things we did as a youth group. I know we ate dinner together, we played games sometimes, maybe watched movies other times? Those aren't the things that stuck with me. But what I do remember all these years later is that my youth group was the place I could always go to be reminded that I was loved exactly as I was. I didn't have to do anything to earn that. It was freely given.

This experience of being loved by my youth group was something that changed my life. And the future I was supposed to be preparing for in high school? Funny thing about that. It turned out that my future was actually here, in the church itself, hoping to create in our youth group a place like the one I knew, where people can feel loved, just as they are.

This starts with knowing that all love comes from God. And the natural extension of the work we'll do in our community is to take the love and acceptance outside church walls. So those are our goals for youth group this year. Love one another. Know we are loved by God. Share that love with the wider community.



We'll spend time getting to know each other better and having some fun together. We'll learn about God's love and what it's like to experience it in prayer. And we'll participate in loving service to God's people in the local community at Church

by the Pond and Hartford Catholic Worker, as well as in Ecuador on our mission trip. Ninth and tenth graders who are participating in confirmation class will have a chance to go deeper into the Christian tradition, to learn about the foundations of our faith that have led the church to where it is today. And we'll all ask questions about what kind of church we want for the future, and what part we will play in that future.

I hope you'll take this chance to come be a part of a community who loves you for who you are. We have some great things planned for the year, and I'd always love to know if there's anything else you have in mind that you'd like to do. I look forward to getting to know you better this year and to see what God has in store for all of us!



Treasurer's Report / June 2018

Current Position: Through the first half of the year, total Income was \$944 over budget and total expenses were \$5,457 less than budgeted amounts, resulting in a positive variance to budget of \$6,401.

Income: Regular Contributions (Current and Prior Year Pledges, Seasonal and Unspecified Offerings) for the six months were \$1,566 less than the total of the several budgeted amounts. Current Year Pledges were behind budget by \$3,637 while the other three categories were over budget by an aggregate amount of \$2,071. The Current Year Pledges deficit was substantially less at June 30 than at the end of May when it stood at \$20,506.

For the first six months of 2018, income from outside groups using the Parish facilities totaled \$16,553 or \$3,985 more than budget. Special Contributions for General Purposes of \$17,957 were \$691 less than budget.

Expense: For the period, Property expenses were \$2,494 under budget. The Church paid less than budgeted amounts for gas (\$2,116 less), for general maintenance and repair (\$1,763 less) and for water (\$430 less) whereas electricity costs exceeded the budget amount by \$1,032. Snow removal was a breakeven situation with payments exceeding budget by just \$50. Personnel: Personnel expenses for the six month period were \$1,174 over budget due primarily to the amounts paid for Lay Life and Health insurance exceeding the budget amount. Of the remaining expense categories, seven were under budget and three were over, the net amount being \$4,139 under budget.

FTER three Sundays in Maine, I was happy in mid-August to return to St. James's. I was looking forward to reconnecting with friends, hearing some nice music, and praying with a congregation that was larger and more diverse than the one on Peaks Island.

What I hadn't realized until that Sunday, was how much I missed the children of St. James's. On that mid-August Sunday, as I headed to the Narthex with the cross, I was thinking about the long drive Bob and I would be making later that day to pick up our new chocolate lab puppy, Theo. I had planned to read a book with whoever showed up that day—hoping that there were at least two or three to take into the parish hall for Kids for Christ. I had low expectations for that particular Sunday morning, but God and the Holy Spirit had something else in mind.

As the small group gathered, the children were all telling me about what they had been doing this summer. Some had been to their grandparents, some had been to the beach, some had a birthday party later that day—it was a typical conversation with a group of children. Then one of the Moms mentioned that she had taught the kids, "This Little Light of Mine" a few weeks before. At that point, the conversation shifted. They wanted to sing the song.

Once we were in the Parish Hall, we continued our conversation. Four-year-old Mack Raissian explained to me that the light in the song was God's love. That we needed to let God's love shine all around us. We shouldn't hide it under a bushel or let anyone blow it out. Pretty impressive for a four-year-old.

Of course, after that we had to sing the song. I added the verse, "Right here at St. James's Church, I'm going to let it shine." They sang that verse extra loud.

Then one of our young Biblical Scholars, Lyla Fisher (that is what I call her when she shows me just how brilliant she is) said that some people think God is an old man that lives in the clouds, but that God lives in each of us; that God is always with us, in our hearts. Wow. We went on to talk about how we share God's love with the world and how that is our job as Christians.

We did end up reading the book and coloring until it was time to rejoin the rest of the congregation. When I was sitting in the pew, I prayed to God that I was so thankful for these children in my life. I was thankful for their ministry in this place. On that Sunday, Lyla Fisher, a rising third grader, very reverently had jumped in as crucifer because we needed an acolyte. As she confidently led the clergy down the aisle to the narthex, filling in when she was called to do so, I was profoundly thankful for her as a fellow Christian, and very hopeful for what the future holds for our beloved church.

As I left the church after the service, I was reminded by a parishioner that in the book of Isaiah, it says so profoundly, "A little child shall lead them." We have some amazing people of faith in this beautiful place—of all ages and sizes.

As we all hunker down for the busyness that is back to school time, and the beginning of a new program year, let's not forget to thank God for all the blessings of our lives together at St. James's, and make the most of the incredible opportunities that are offered here.



A Letter from Molly Louden

HAVE been at St. James's for 15 years as the Priest Associate for the Healing Ministries, and it is time for me to move on and pass on the facilitation of the healing ministries. I do feel called to work more on facilitating Celtic worship and Celtic studies. The choice to step away is totally my idea.

I have enjoyed and appreciated being part of your lives and one of your pastors. We have shared times of great joy and great fun, and also times of loss and sadness. And, in the middle, just being together in regular life. Your generosity, your trust, and your openness have blessed my life and my ministry and, as a result, I have grown as a pastor and as a priest. Thank you from the bottom of my heart.

It has been a blessing for me to work with Bob Hooper. I was invited by Bob to see whether a healing ministry was wanted at St. James's 15 years ago. His generosity in sharing the pulpit and the table, and trusting my leadership of the healing ministries, has been remarkable. I also have had a lot of fun and laughs working with Bob. When I started, Joan Phelps was here as Associate Rector. I worked with Joan, Chris Craun, Julia Whitworth, and Curtis Farr. All of them were wonderful colleagues who relied on the healing ministries that we were able to offer. So, thank you, Bob, for your generosity, your humor, and for believing in my leadership. We have accomplished a great deal together in these 15 years. I feel we have made St. James's more accepting and helpful to folks who are seeking a healing place.

HEALING TEAM

When we began, the members of the healing team studied together and practiced with each other for two years before bringing the Sacrament of Healing to the congregation. Now, for over 10 years, we have been offering that sacrament at the 9:30 service every Sunday and the second Sunday at the 8:00 service. The team is divided into groups of four that work together at stations at the back of the church. Maybe the most gratifying accomplishment of the team is that the members all have grown more comfortable and confident in their own call to function as ministers of healing in this congregation and in their daily lives. Without their devotion and commitment, we would not have this ministry for the people of St. James's. I am only the facilitator. They are the ministers, and they will continue to practice their ministry among you.

PRAYER SHAWLS

We have blessed and delivered 250 prayer shawls, thanks to Cindy Welch, who has knitted most of them. Folks who have received these shawls find them to be a real source of comfort and warmth during their recovery, and long after. The shawl reminds them that the folks in their church are with them, praying for them.

CASSEROLE MINISTRY

This group of parishioners has delivered meals to individuals, couples and families. They have been delivered when there's a new baby, recovery from surgery or illness, a death, or any other need for a prepared meal. Thank you to all of our generous cooks.

SUPPORT GROUP FOR CAREGIVERS AND THOSE IN GRIEF

Some years ago the support group for caregivers and those in grief was formed. We have done wonderful work together, and the membership and content has changed according to the needs of those attending. We've gotten to know each other well through the sharing we do at our meetings. We have become a true support group looking out for the health and the quality of the lives of our caregivers and those in grief. We also have become resident experts on the resources available in the area.


PASTORAL CARE TEAM

In the fall of 2015 we added a Pastoral Care team of visitors. The visitors have particular folks, who cannot get to church. They are trained visitors. Some take communion. They keep confidence with those they visit. They are hidden ambassadors for St. James's and are doing important work.

I tell you all this because I want you to know the wonderful work that folks at St. James's and I have done in caring for different needs of our parishioners. It has been my delight and deeply gratifying to be part of St. James's. I have come to know and love many of you who worship here. I have been deeply touched by your trust in me, and I am indebted to Bob Hooper and to all the members of our parish who have been part of the ministries I have described. All of this adds up to 15 years of very satisfying work together. And I must reiterate that the ministers of healing in every category are still going to be taking care of folks at St. James's. I was only a point person and a facilitator.

With Charlotte LaForest as our new assistant rector, I am confident that, with Bob and Priscilla, we will find a way to extend this pastoral care ministry and healing to the young families and young singles in our congregation. In fact, there are already programs in place to help with groups of parishioners to get to know each other.

Please join us for a celebration of all we have accomplished together on **October 7 at the 9:30 service**. The celebration will be set in a healing liturgy. I hope all of you who have been part of this, and all of you who have benefitted, will celebrate with us.


