



From the Rector's Desk

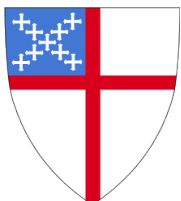

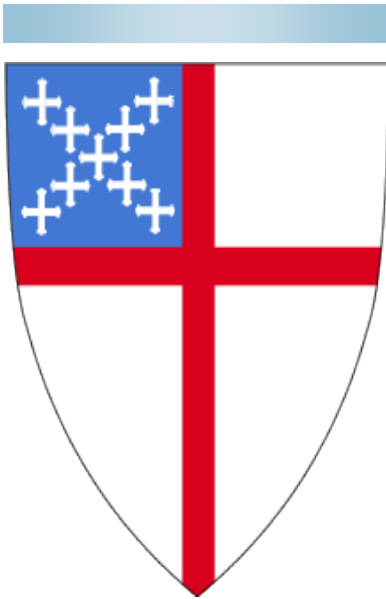

Treasurer's Report—April 2016

Current Position: April saw the Church's finances improve from a negative to a positive position vis a vis the budget. Although total income remained below plan by \$3,229, this represented a \$3,801 improvement over March when income was \$7,030 below budget. Expenses also improved

in April, moving from an over budget amount of \$4,913 at March 31 to below budget by \$5,884 at the end of April. The net result was a \$2,655 positive variance to budget.

Income: The improvement in Year To Date income during April was due primarily to Current Year Pledge Income going from \$7,981 below plan in March to \$3,539 below plan at April 30. Although Facilities Income was \$2,120 below plan, this was offset by Special Contributions which were \$2,658 over budget.

Expense: Major contributors to the improvement in Expenses during April were the following: Property: This expense category was below plan thanks to Utilities charges, General Maintenance, Insurance, and Snow Removal.

From the Associate Rector

DEAR Ones,

Summer is fast approaching, which means our schedules will be changed to accommodate hikes through the Connecticut wilderness, vacations to the Cape, and lazy days sunbathing in the backyard. I myself plan on spending a few days in Provincetown with friends and as many weekends (Friday and Saturday, for me) hiking.

With these glorious summer days ahead, I'm reminded that the long, easy days offer abundant moments for even the briefest time of spiritual reflection. There are several great resources available to guide you through your own daily devotional time, and one I encourage you to try is a new publication by Ian Markham called *Faith Rules: An Episcopal Manual*.

Many of you know Ian Markham, current dean and president of Virginia Theological Seminary and former dean of Hartford Seminary. Ian has preached at St. James's on numerous occasions, and has published more books than I can count on my two hands. After discovering Michael Pollan's *Food Rules*, Ian spent time developing a list of sixty-seven rules (or, helpful tips) for being an Episcopalian. "Rules" like:

1. Disconnect from the tech.
29. Start every day giving thanks for everything that is good.
50. You don't have to believe everyone else is going to hell.

For each "rule" there is an accompanying illustration by a friend and classmate of mine, Benjamin Hart, and a paragraph or two of explanation. The book closes on a rule regarding perspective:

67. Remember it is all about God.

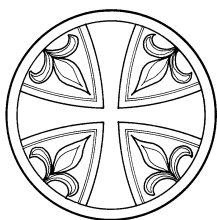
Once you are in the middle of this journey of faith it is very easy to lose sight of the big picture. There will be moments when all you can see are the challenges in your life or the chaos in your church or the immediate muddle right in front of you.

Perspective—this is the key. Remember we believe in a God who shaped a universe that is 13.7 billion years old. Remember that living on planet earth right now are 7.3 billion people. Remember it is likely that sentient creatures are on other planets. Perhaps there are other universes and the number of lives being sustained by God is phenomenal. And remember at the core of all creation, whether it is one universe or a hundred universes, is the Love Project.

Perspective helps. It locates our immediate worries. It also helps us to learn that most basic faith skill—the skill of trust. God has been around an awfully long time; God will take us through this season surrounding us with love and peace. Just trust.

With that I commend to you *Faith Rules* as a summer devotional. If you read one "rule" every morning or evening, you will have food for thought every day. Try it out, and let me know how it goes.

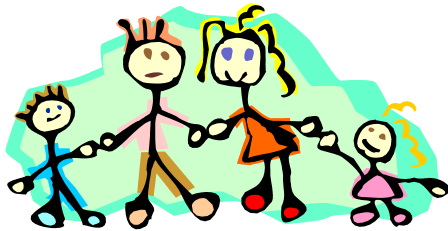

SPEND a fair amount of time in my school job helping kids write essays. Usually, it is a pretty awful experience. If Mrs. Hooper gets called to help you with an essay, most likely you are struggling and pretty much hate writing. Most kids also hate the tasks that are hard for them so it is pretty rare for me to get to work with a gifted writer. In fact, I must say, that I think this was a first for me.

One warm Thursday in May, I was asked to help a third grade boy with his essay. I begrudgingly began reading his essay, helping him with his punctuation, being annoyed with fact that he didn't have an eraser--all the regular annoyances of my school job. Then, it happened. I actually started reading what this wonderful young man had written, and it rocked my world. He was writing an essay about which he is an expert. He chose to write about himself. Here is chapter 2 of his essay:

"Chapter Two – Why I am Happy

I am usually happy because I have a great family, great friends and they all look out for me. If I am hurt, they help me and they never make me do something I don't want to do. Like if I don't want to go on a roller coaster, I don't have to go on it. My family does not stop helping me. They keep going. Like when I threw up for three days. After the fifth time I threw up, my mom still helped me. When I threw up for the tenth time, my mom did not stop helping me. Even when I threw up for the sixteenth time, she did not stop. She did not stop until I stopped."

I was blown away when I read this. It is rare for a child or for that matter, anyone to be able to put in words what it means to be in a loving family. This child gets it in a way that is rare among us. He knows

that his mom will be there for him no matter what.

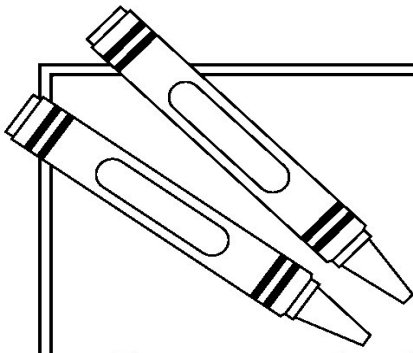
After rereading this essay, all I could think of is the blessing that we sometimes do at the end of the church service. You know the one, the one that says, live without fear, God has made you holy and he loves you like a mother loves her children. God is with us, all the time, when we are at our worst, when we are at our best. God doesn't stop until we stop. Just like this kid's mom. Wow. Then, I realized something a little scary. I almost missed really reading this child's essay. I was tired and hungry and hot and ready for the weekend. But by the grace of God I did not miss it. I was able to get out of my own way, and really see this child and how blessed he is. I didn't miss it. Thank God for that.

So, as we head into the summer, make the time to really see those you love. Be present with them. Go for a walk together. Eat lunch with the television off. Go to the beach. Don't miss it!

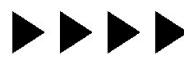

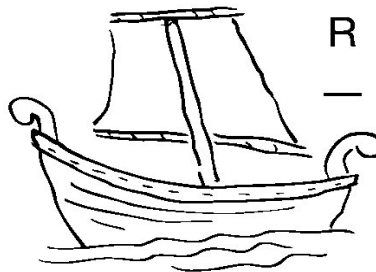

From the Organist & Choirmaster

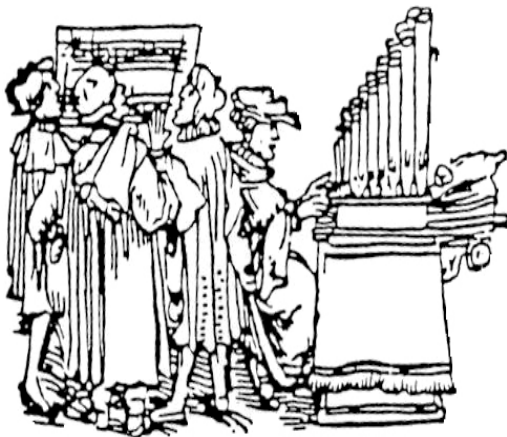
AS many of you know, St. James's is sending 11 high school seniors to college this year. Five of these young adults sing in the choir, and we will greatly miss their presence and voice.

With this in mind, it is especially important this year that we continue our recruitment efforts in order to sustain the strength and longevity of the music program. A choir is a constantly evolving ensemble. The most constant forces in a choir are the adult members who have made St. James's/West Hartford their long-term home. This core group, which includes three professional singers, provide a bedrock foundation for our choir. Above that bedrock runs a river of constantly evolving and growing children's voices. Picture the Hudson River: merely a stream at its Adirondack beginnings, but a mass of water one mile wide between Westchester and Rockland Counties. Just as the water in the Hudson River grows bigger with each mile and is at its most grand status alongside Manhattan before entering the Atlantic Ocean, a child's voice slowly grows in size and strength, reaching its most robust and valuable status right before the chorister graduates high school. If nature doesn't provide the river with tributaries, and if we don't provide the choir with new choristers, these critical cycles are broken.

The best time for a child to join the choir is in the second or third grades. Trying out the choir at this early age allows them the opportunity to work with me one-on-one and in a small group setting on Mondays from 3.45 to 4.30. By the end of the year, junior choristers learn the basic skills necessary to survive a choral rehearsal: finding your part within a score and following along; understanding basic rhythm; singing basic vowels correctly; learning to sing throughout your natural vocal range; understanding concepts of pitch and musical notation; and basic rehearsal terminology.

Once a junior chorister has gone through this training, he or she is ready to participate in regular rehearsals held Mondays and Wednesdays from 5-6.15PM. As a chorister grows up in the choir, he or she benefits from the challenge of a choral training in many ways. Choristers experience spiritual growth, build reliable musical habits, and learn the discipline needed to function well in a group. Choristers also gain confidence, self-esteem, stamina, courage, responsibility, and learn about cooperation, dependability, self-discipline, and self-reliance.

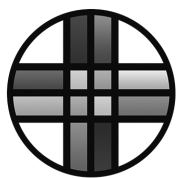

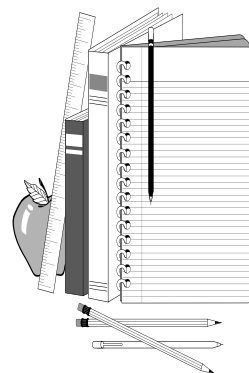

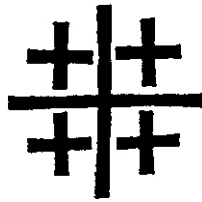
